# THE BLUE COLLAR PHILOSOPHER

The Renaissance, Reformation and Age of Reason

It has been a long time since the world experienced a transition like we see today. Every generation faces change, but few experience sweeping transition. Our turmoil feels unprecedented and disorienting. But history bears a record of another period that shines light onto today's events.

## History can guide us.

Enlightenment-era philosopher David Hume said, "Pretexts and appearances no longer deceive us ... mankind are so much the same, in all times and places that history informs us of nothing new or strange ..." Writer Henry St. John, of the same era said, "History is philosophy teaching us by examples ... we must ... reflect and meditate on the characters we find described, and the course of events we find related there."

## Yes, history is our guide.

Historical precedent of our world is in the wake of Gutenberg's printing press, roughly the years 1500-1800 AD. Societies abruptly changed directions in the periods we call the Renaissance, Reformation and Age of Reason, also called the Enlightenment. Ideas that had been impotent due to isolation became prolific with the rise of movable type. Historian

Elizabeth Eisenstein called the advent of printing "a communication revolution." American writer Nicolo Mele calls today's internet "radical connectivity."

Connectivity spread ideas across Europe, uniting people that were ready to act. It was a revolution of innovation, invention and upheaval. Ideas assaulted ordered institutions; monarchs fell, wealth shifted, religious order shook. Embedded institutions crumbled before the wave of released and realized human energy.

Thinkers like Francis Bacon and Isaac Newton established a new basis for understanding our world through reason and process. The scientific method replaced superstitions and technology became the Industrial Revolution.

The medieval economy measured national wealth by the amount of money in the king's treasury. Medieval economic models were based on limited commerce, tightly controlled by established guilds. Moral philosopher Adam Smith's seminal work, "The Wealth of Nations," created the basis for a capitalist economy with the idea that a free market would generate wealth and well-being for many individuals as well as for the nation. Laissez-faire capitalism would raise standards of living for the masses.

Indentured serfs moved from servitude to cities brimming with jobs and new opportunities. A middle-class emerged and people who were recently poor became wealthy. The nobility struggled to accept this "new money" as their influence and power waned.

Ideas of government confronted monarchs and the entrenched belief of divine right to rule. Selfdetermining government installed laws and human rights. The idea that all men are created equal and endowed with unalienable rights swept away eons of aristocratic rule by edict and decree. The rule of law replaced the rule of man.

Corruption in the Catholic Church had been rampant for years as isolated voices called for reform. Martin Luther, an obscure professor of theology posted 95 theses, or arguments, on a church door with the intent of sparking debate. Luther's original intent was to restore the Church from within, not to break away. But a group of like-minded monks printed and distributed the arguments. They found an eager audience and the Protestant Church emerged.

What does it mean to be born into a time whose only precedents are the Renaissance, the Reformation, and the Age of Reason? None of us asked to be born into such a time, but here we are. We feel our foundations shift under feet.

# WEEKEND GETAWAY: TWO HISTORIC HOME TOURS

Experience Arizona pioneer life by exploring preserved historic homes on two different walking or driving tours offered in the Snowflake Taylor area. Trace the lives of the families and ancestors of early Mormon settlers when you enter a cozy hand-scribed log cabin

complete with comfy handmade quilts in Taylor or climb the stairs of a large Victorian home in Snowflake or see the WWII memorabilia in the home of the mother, who waited in vain for her boys to return home from war.

Two distinctive tours cover different areas, and many visitors enjoy splitting the tours up over two separate days.

## SNOWFLAKE HISTORIC HOME TOUR

Pick up a map of the self-guided walking or driving tour of over 100 historical homes and buildings at the Snowflake Chamber of Commerce located at 113 North Main Street in Snowflake. Forty-five of the Snowflake Historic Home tour homes are listed on the National Registrar of Historic Places.

Step over the threshold into eight of the homes that experts have restored as mini-museums. You'll come across historical exhibits that help you imagine the lifestyle of the Arizona pioneers, ranchers and the generations that followed. Spend a quiet moment inside one of the preserved homes, which are available Monday (by appointment only) and Tuesday through Saturday between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. If you wish to tour all the homes, allow 1 1/2 to 2 hours. To make an appointment, call the Snowflake Chamber at 928-536-4331.

## Stinson Museum: 1873

Monday - Saturday 10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m.

102 North 1st Street East, Snowflake, Arizona

Sometime around 1873, Rancher James Stinson built the adobe ranch house that now houses the Stinson Museum. In 1878, he sold his cattle ranch, Rancho de la Plata, to Mormon colonizer William J. Flake for \$1100 worth of Utah cattle. Flake, the founder of Snowflake, transformed the ranch into a township. His first wife lived in the adobe home that is now the museum that contains collections of ancestral Puebloan pottery, antique cowboy gear and ranching tools.

## James Madison Flake Home: 1895

First Street and Second Street North, Snowflake, Arizona

Climb the long staircase up to the second level of this three-story Victorian home, complete with a widow's walk. British carpenter Ralph Ramsey who also did fine woodworking for the Salt Lake City Tabernacle created the Victorian brica-brac and other woodwork.

## Osmer D. Flake Home: 1890

161 North Main Street, Snowflake, Arizona

This 1890 Greek Revival is now the Heritage Inn Bed and Breakfast. Built by the son of Snowflake founder William J. Flake, this home is impeccably restored and filled with period antiques and all the latest hotel amenities.

## John A. Freeman Home: 1893

110 North Main Street, Snowflake, Arizona

This beautifully restored home has been called "one of Arizona's best and most intact examples of Gothic Revival style." You'll want to spend a little extra time inside the peaceful and relaxing space of this historic pioneer home made of locally fired red brick. Although John A. Freeman was born in 1860 while Abraham Lincoln was in the White House, he lived to see modern conveniences. He was an early adapter, buying the first automobile in Snowflake, helping to bring electricity to Snowflake, enjoying airplane rides and serving the community as Arizona State legislator and county commissioner.

## Jesse N. Smith Home: 1906

Second West Street and Center Street, Snowflake, Arizona

This pretty Georgian Colonial Revival is only one of four homes that Jesse N. Smith built for his four wives who lived in Snowflake. In 1878, he came to the Arizona Territory with Erastus Snow to explore the area for suitable places to establish Mormon settlements. Later Smith was called to serve the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints in Snowflake, and he returned. He is depicted on the Snowflake Monument at the corner of Center and Main and was known for quieting unrest among cattle thieves and outlaws.

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# THE VIEW FROM HERE A BOBCATS LAMENT

When I was a kid in the late fifties, my Dad was a classic Arizonan and drove a well-worn International Harvester pick-up. The truck was equipped with a 30-06 and a 222 rifle in the gun rack behind his head, a Shakespeare casting pole along with a couple of vintage bamboo fly rods folded up behind the seat; a .22 pistol, a pair of binoculars, and a carton of Sir Walter Raleigh

Cigarettes in the seat beside him. Under the seat were miscellaneous boxes of shells, reels, fishing lures, flys and a couple of replacement fan belts, just in case we had some trouble.

I remember one fall morning, probably about 1958 or 1959, coming over the back road from Mormon Lake to Munds Park. We had just dropped down the hill from Bert Lee Park into Casner and the old "Binder" was rattling along over the rocks and bumps in the road. There was virtually no traffic over that road back then and we surprised a bobcat that darted across the road and up the hill to the right in a flash. My Dad stomped down on the brakes and in an instant we slid to a stop. In a single fluid motion he crushed out his cigarette in the ashtray on the dash, had the door open, his rifle out of the gun rack and crouched low as he ran up the hillside in the direction the bobcat had run. My mother and I sat in the seat waiting, anticipating, listening for the shot. I'm sure we were both mentally rooting for the bobcat. "Run fast Baby!!" The shot never came.

The bobcat, Lynx rufus, also known as the wildcat is the most common of the cat family to be encountered in Arizona's deserts and mountains. Rufus means red and this refers to the rust-colored tinge of their glossy coat. While they are fairly common, like all wild felines, they are very intelligent and extremely reclusive. This, combined with their tawny spotted coloration which blends well with their environment makes them very seldom seen. A mature tom bobcat will stand 16 inches at the shoulder, weigh up to 40 pounds and measure up to 36 inches long. Females are generally slightly smaller. They have large pointed ears and a characteristic fringe behind their cheeks, making their head seem much wider than it actually is. They also have a wirey stub tail that twitches as they hunt. These cats have long muscular legs and very large feet. They have retractile claws and leave a characteristic round track with four toes showing in the footprint. You are more likely to hear a bobcat than to actually see one and male yammering, sounding much like a domestic tom cat on steroids, and can most likely be heard during the mating season. Bobcats mate once a year, usually in February or March, and when the kittens are born the mother drives the male away. Male cats of all species are known for killing their young. The female will select a den, usually in the rocks on the side of a canyon, but sometimes in a hollow log or under a fallen tree. Depending on the age and condition of the female, two to four kittens are born with their eyes closed. Looking much like domestic kittens at first, the young nurse for the first six weeks or so.

The mother cat continues to hunt and slowly weans the litter onto solid food. As the kittens develop, the mother will bring back live catches so the kittens can learn to hunt for themselves. Bobcats eat a wide variety of insects, cottontails, jackrabbits, rats, mice, chipmunks, rock squirrels, and birds. They will also occasionally kill deer and antelope fawns. If the kill is large the family will feed on the carcass for a number of days caching or trying to camouflage what's left.

In Arizona, trappers account for most bobcat mortality and the skins are highly prized because of their soft downy fur. My dad killed a bobcat once during javalina season down in Bloody Basin, but the Casner bobcat got away clean. I recently came across one of his descendants on a hike up to Crystal Point. I came around a corner and we spotted each other about the same time. He turned in a silent blur and left me to feel a surge of adrenalin, my quickened pulse and a true sense of joy at our meeting. Something I will not forget any time soon.

If you get out into our spectacular mountain backwoods, please don't litter and try to leave the place better for your presence.

## TAYLOR HISTORIC HOME TOUR

The historic and engaging Taylor Historic Home Tour includes five different Arizona heritage sites. First, visit the log home of a Mormon pioneer midwife who delivered over 1,400 babies. Next, get a sense of Arizona Territory life inside the thick sandstone walls of an authentic home. Finally, view the vintage bass drum that was hauled across the plains on the back of Brigham Young's carriage with the first company of Mormon Pioneers in 1847.

## The Taylor Museum

## 2 North Main Street, Taylor, Arizona: 928-536-6649

Housed in the restored A.Z. Palmer & Sons/Hatch Brothers Store in the center of Taylor, the museum depicts the history of Taylor from its settlement to the present. Initially a community-gathering place, the A.Z. Palmer & Son Store provided nearly everything local ranchers needed, including ice cream and food supplies to gas and insurance. Today, some Arizona history artifacts are gathered with recorded narrations to add detail to your guided tour. For example, you'll view the over 180-year-old Jennings Drum brought to the West on the back of Brigham Young's horsedrawn carriage in 1847 and the anvil used for Taylor's unique Independence Day celebrations.

## Margaret McCleve Hancock Log Cabin: 1884

Southeast corner of East Willow Street and Main Street, Taylor, Arizona

In 1879, Margaret McCleve Hancock and her husband Mosiah L. Hancock left Utah to help settle Taylor. Upon her arrival, she ministered to the needs of the sick and served as a midwife." Born in 1838 in Belfast, Ireland, Margaret McCleve married Mosiah in Utah after making the 1300-mile journey from Illinois to Utah with the 1856 Mormon Handcart Company. Mosiah and Margaret raised thirteen children in this small hand-scribed log cabin. Later, the place served as a schoolhouse for first and secondgrade-schoolers during the 1914/15 school year. In the grove behind the Margaret McCleve Hancock Log Cabin stands a small fort built with logs transported from Fort Wingate, New Mexico.

## Standifird Home: 1890

## 304 S. Main Street, Taylor, Arizona

John Henry Standifird and his children co-founded Taylor in 1878. In 1905, John's son, Aquilla Standifird, purchased the distinctive 1890 stone house that the Brimhall family built. In 2004, Aquilla's son, Jack Standifird, donated the Standifird Home to the Taylor Heritage Foundation. Walk through the Standifird Home with a guide and see original family heirlooms donated by the many Standifird descendants.

## **Pioneer Museum and The Jane Hatch Camp: 1930**

50 S. 400 East Street, Taylor, Arizona

Originally built to house meetings held by the local branch of Daughters of Utah Pioneers (DUP), it now contains treasured artifacts of pioneer settlement times. Soon after completion, DUP President Kate B. Carter dedicated it as "The Jane Hatch Camp." Townsfolk adopted the house and contributed building materials, labor, and maintenance over the years. In November 1987, the LDS Church deeded the building to the 20-30 Club, a Taylor social group. A decade later, the 20-30 Club collaborated with the Taylor/Shumway Heritage Foundation to create the "Pioneer Museum." Filled with authentic pioneer memorabilia, doors to the Pioneer Museum opened to the public on July 5, 1997.

## **Shumway Schoolhouse**

One block east of State Highway 77 on the Old Shumway Road, Taylor, Arizona

Built from locally-fired soft red brick, the restored 1900 schoolhouse remains in the heart of Shumway, Arizona, less than five miles/eight km south of Taylor. The voices of its frontier children have grown quiet, yet today visitors can see their names etched into the soft bricks. With its vintage furnishings and treasured photographs, the Shumway Schoolhouse has been recognized as a living legacy.

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# **BE EMBER AWARE!**

Will your home survive when the embers arrive? During a wildfire, thousands of embers can rain down on your roof and pelt the side of your home like hail during a storm. If these embers become lodged in something easily ignited on or around your home, the house will be in jeopardy of burning. Embers coming into contact with flammable materials are the primary reason homes are destroyed during a wildfire.

By being ember aware and taking action ahead of time, a homeowner can substantially reduce the ember threat. Your home can survive when embers arrive. Munds Park is a Firewise community and has always been proactive in wildfire prevention. When it comes to wildfires, Munds Park residents have been fortunate and know how real the danger is.

It's essential to create a defensible space around your house to improve its chances of surviving a wildfire. A few tips on what you can do to protect your home:

- Remove leaves and pine needles from your roof and gutters.
- Remove "ladder fuels," which include tree limbs, so the closest limb is 6'-8' from the ground.
- Move woodpiles at least 30' from the house.
- Remove leaves, pine needles, and other combustible materials from under decks.
- Use a non-combustible material like gravel up against your house and choose plants and flowers that are deciduous, herbaceous, low resin, or non-resinous.

These are just a few ways we can protect our homes against wildfire. To learn more about what you can do to protect your home, please come to our **Community Safety Day Event on June 25**, **10-1 pm at Munds Park Community Church.**

# BBQ BRISKET TIPS FROM MATT AGEE

Central Texas is known for many things, from the balmy summer weather to the notorious biting gnats that caused an itch only soothed by a coat of clear nail polish and, of course, incredible BBQ. My best memory of that beautiful area was my introduction to barbecue.

When I was a kid, I walked into what looked like an abandoned building with my parents, passed an open fire pit, and stood in line for a meal. I watched the man behind the counter expertly slice off brisket slabs, placing them on a sheet of brown butcher paper, and asked us if we wanted a slice of bread with the meat. The business, back then, was called Kreuz' Market in Lockhart, Texas, and, even with a name change (it's now called Smitty's), the establishment

remains one of the top five barbecue restaurants in the entire state of Texas. When we returned to Lockhart last summer, I was pleased to see that very little had changed other than the name. The brisket was just as good as my boyhood memory.

When Kim and I decided to bring barbecue to Munds Park, memories of Kreuz' Market became my inspiration. Building an open pit at the entrance was something that, unfortunately, would have been frowned on by county officials, so we compromised by installing a twenty-eight-foot smoker. And we are proud to report that our customers, who are familiar with Lockhart barbecue, tell us that we are right up there with the city's best.

Choosing the right cut of meat is an important element in preparing and serving brisket. Cuts are graded as Select, Choice, and Prime, with each grade further broken down into lower, middle and upper grades. We use

Choice certified Angus (CAB), which grades at the top third of Choice.

We commonly smoke a whole brisket called a Packer Cut that weighs between 10 to 18 pounds and has a layer of fat, referred to as the fat cap, on one side. Both sections of the brisket, the flat and the point, are attached by another layer of fat. We look for a brisket with a constant layer of fat on the top side and a thicker, flat (at least an inch thick) side.

Trimming the brisket is a crucial step that can affect the smoking process. The fat cap has to be trimmed at, approximately <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inch thick. Any thin areas of fat must be trimmed off. We use a rub of equal amounts of kosher salt, coarse salt, and ground pepper before smoking.

Smoking the brisket is, of course, a very important element in the quality of the final product. The cuts are smoked for five to six hours to preserve the bark, then removed and wrapped in peach paper and placed back in the smoker for an additional five to eight hours. The temperature must be monitored to keep it as close to 250 degrees as possible. Each portion of the brisket is served fresh daily because we never hold over any left-over meat from one day to the next.

We hope these BBQ tips help you with your 4th of July BBQ, and if you feel like just kicking back this holiday, we are open!

Serving our great community is an unmeasurable reward, and, for our success, we thank you, Munds Park!

It's not just the extra water that's wonderful: monsoon season also brings cooler temps, higher humidity in the air and cloud cover. It's a welcome relief given that the "new normal" for northern Arizona is hotter and drier summers.

And now for the bad news:

Monsoon rains, even when plentiful, typically don't provide enough water for your garden to thrive. There are few plants (mostly native or extremely acclimated to our local weather) that can live on what nature provides alone. The rest require that we learn to water well.

## **Rainwater Harvesting**

However, the monsoon rains can be part of your watering well strategy. With the prospect of a decent amount of rain this monsoon season, it might be time to invest in a rain barrel if you don't already have one.

There are two main reasons to use rainwater harvesting systems. The first is water conservation, of course, and being able to use the water that comes from nature instead of turning on your tap. But the other reason is to manage and store rainwater runoff and prevent flooding on your property.

While there are several water reclamation methods available, rainwater barrels are probably the quickest and easiest water conservation method you can set up for your home garden.

First, you need to choose your location on a level, elevated surface so you can get pressure out of the hose at the bottom of the barrel. The next step is to align the barrel with your downspout to capture the rain from your roof. Then connect the hose and place it in your garden. It's that simple.

But you can't just count on rain – even rain captured in barrels - to keep your garden green all summer long. This is particularly important for newly planted trees, shrubs, flowers and veggies waiting for monsoon season. They need water now.

## Hand Watering vs. Drip Irrigation

You can try hand-watering, but this takes a lot of time and effort and will waste a great deal of water. Why? Because water rushes out at such a high rate from a hose (an estimated 400 gallons per hour) that you lose most of it to runoff. Most of the water will not get more than an inch or so down into the soil.

Your garden needs moisture that's delivered slowly and steadily so that it penetrates further and gets down to the roots. That encourages them to grow deep, which makes for healthier and stronger plants. That's why we are big fans of drip irrigation at Warner's Nursery. Drip irrigation systems fully soak your plants and have a higher efficiency rate than overhead sprinklers or hand-watering.

Plus, using a drip system lets your plants "breathe." In addition to water, roots need air. Sprinklers and hand watering produce puddles that can displace air in the soil, but because drip irrigation works slowly, drop by drop, it never displaces the air in the soil.

Drip irrigation is not as expensive as many people think. For 100 feet of watering, it will cost you upwards of a few hundred dollars to have a system professionally installed. You can also do it yourself for about \$100. With the gallons of water saved and the plants gardeners don't have to replace because they have dried out, the cost can be recouped very quickly.

## Watering Guide

Although watering requirements can change depending on weather conditions, here's a general guide of how often you need to water different types of plants.

For trees and shrubs, the first three weeks after transplanting are probably the most vital and require the most water. During that time, plan to water generously at least once a day, preferably in the morning when it's cooler. If using a drip system, plan to have it on for 20 to 30 minutes. After that, you can plan on watering every other day through the fall and then two to three times a month during the winter.

Small shrubs and perennials should be watered two times a day the first week they are planted, then once a day for the next two weeks, then every other day through the fall and two to three times a month during winter.

In-season vegetable gardens need lots of water. We recommend watering two to three times a day, for 10 to 15 minutes each time.

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# **BIRDS OF MUNDS PARK** *Birding in Iceland*

The first important birding advice I confirmed while in Iceland is that when on a birding trip, you should always have two pairs of binoculars. Fortunately, I had brought two, because on the first day I dropped my best pair, which created misalignment of the lenses and rendered those binoculars unusable. I was grateful to have my spare.

The second important tip was to go with the flow... and that was

fairly easy with a planned trip led by a Rockjumper Birding Tours guide. There were eight of us, all very nice, serious birders with diverse backgrounds and reasons for being on the journey. I always learn something new when meeting up with new people. For example, do you know that there is a Facebook page

dedicated to birding memes?

Iceland, a Nordic island, is the most sparsely populated country in Europe, with lava fields, glaciers, geysers, waterfalls, and erupting volcanoes. Tourism is an important part of the economy, and the hospitality industry folks speak both Icelandic and English, so it is a very easy country to visit if you are a one-language person like me.

As for birds, Iceland's bird list is small

compared to other countries such as Costa Rica, which boasts 800+ species. Iceland's species list is 120, and we were able to see 71 species on this trip. Some of the Icelandic birds we saw are also found in northern Arizona and include the Peregrine Falcon, Northern Pintail, Gadwall, Merlin, Mallard, Starling, and Rock Pigeon.

Iceland does not have warblers like we have in the States, but they do have many species of waterfowl. The highlight was several great looks at the Harlequin Duck, a bird that rivals the beauty of the Wood Duck. The Whooper Swans were numerous, we easily saw over a thousand, and Arctic Terns were plentiful as well, often nesting in fields that were fenced off by landowners so sheep and Icelandic horses would not disturb them.

Besides the Atlantic Puffin, one of my favorite birds was the Common Snipe. It is a squat shorebird with an extremely long bill for probing in muddy ground, and it is hard to detect on the ground because it is camouflaged so well. But in the air it is easily recognizable with its long bill and the sound made by air passing through its fanned tail. Throughout the U.S. we have Wilson's Snipe, but the Common Snipe may only occasionally be seen in North America in the Aleutian Islands of Alaska.

We saw a pair of White-tailed Eagles, the female sitting on the nest and the male nearby. The White-tailed Eagle is a massive raptor, all dark brown except for its white tail and light brown head. Its wingspan is seven to eight feet. In an earlier article I reported that Bald Eagles have a wingspan that wide, and a reader replied that comparison was a bit of an exaggeration. I agree, a better Bald Eagle wingspan comparison in a typical house is the length from the top to bottom of a door frame, about six and a half feet. That is still mighty big!

Upon returning to Munds Park and yellow pollen everywhere, I was happy to see our resident birds busy with their lives: Red-Winged and Yellow-headed Blackbirds at the golf course ponds, House Wrens filling up multiple nest boxes to the top with sticks, Mountain Chickadees nesting in in our front yard nest box, Steller's Jay yakking at us, a Cassin's Vireo calling from the very top of the trees, the American Robin taking a long bath in the bird bath, and the ever-present and opportunistic American Crows. The crows are rather quiet now, but wait until August when the fledglings have left the nest and are begging loudly and constantly to be fed by their parents.

Lastly, I thoroughly enjoyed the food in Iceland: salmon, char, lobster hotdogs, licorice ice cream, and fish and chips. If you go, take warm clothes and a camera – the geysers, waterfalls, coastlines, fiords, and glaciers are amazing.
