



LEAF PEEPING FLAGSTAFF STYLE

The answer to the question, "Are the trees turning in Flagstaff yet?" is "Soon, and very soon!" Dropping temps and shorter days make for fantastic fall foliage viewing from the end of September until late October.

Colors begin changing in the high country where the vibrant contrast of aspen trees crowned in flaming yellows sit against the dark green of spruce and Ponderosa pine, keeping your finger firmly glued to the shutter of your camera or smartphone. Want to join the fun? Here are a few suggestions of where and how to enjoy the autumn color show:

HIKE/RIDE

Hike or bike the Aspen Loop Trail from Arizona Snowbowl Ski Resort, located 14 miles from historic downtown Flagstaff. The 2.5-mile loop

Want more? The loop trail meets the Arizona Trail 0.9 miles from the trailhead. Take the Arizona Trail north (right) about 2.5 miles to a sign indicating that Bismarck Lake is .02 mile to the west (left). Follow that spur trail to the small lake in a large meadow at an 8500 elevation.

When not watching for foliage colors or the incredible views of the San Francisco Peaks, keep your eyes peeled for elk, deer or raptors.

From Flagstaff, drive north on US 180 for seven miles to Snowbowl Road. Turn right and go 7.4 miles on this paved road, and turn left into the lower parking lot of Hart Prairie Lodge at Arizona Snowbowl. The Aspen Loop trailhead is located at the north end of the parking lot.

DRIVE

Road trippers will love scouting the colors from the windows of their vehicles. For an easy Sunday-drive type experience, foliage enthusiasts follow Snowbowl Road up the mountain to Aspen Corner. You'll find parking and many local families taking photos for their Christmas cards in front of backdrops of brilliant aspen trees.

ATTITUDE OF GRATITUDE

Attitude of Gratitude: Gratefulness for "what is" is one of the most powerful tools for creating what is not yet there. You value, you give attention to, you honor whatever is before you at the moment. Gratitude recognizes how the positive things in our lives – such as success in our recovery process or our personal or professional life – are often influenced by multiple forces, such as the efforts of other people.

HAVE YOU EVER PLAYED TETRIS?

Tetris is a puzzle game where the player has to make different block shapes fit within a small space. Like any video game, if we do this day after day, our brains know what to expect, we anticipate, and train our brains to respond faster. For example with PAC man, you could judge how long the men would blink in your efforts to earn extra points, or how each screen map was progressively harder and how you could memorize the next map. Research has shown it only takes 5 days to train the brain to adapt to a new behavior, this is called the Tetris Effect.

The Tetris Effect can be highly beneficial in practicing gratitude. Recent studies have revealed the power of gratitude and what it can do for our brain. When we express gratitude or receive gratitude, our brain releases powerful chemicals including dopamine and serotonin, two neurotransmitters that are responsible for our feelings and emotions, moral judgments and for simply helping us to feel good.

How can we train our brain to use the Tetris Effect with gratitude?

Shawn Achor, author of the "Happiness Advantage" notes that when we are happy, and think positive thoughts, we smile, and that smile spreads to others, known as the "Ripple effect".

So, by searching for the positives, in a sense through rose-colored glasses, we eventually improve our attitude towards ourself and others. In reality, we can't ignore problems, however, we need to look for opportunities to improve and to see the positives in finding a successful solution. The consistency of gratitude that we need to train our brains means looking for the positive first, rather than searching out the negatives. Studies recognize how practicing gratitude in the home or workplace can improve the environment, and they are embracing the efforts to practice gratitude and cultivate a culture of gratitude. By cultivating gratitude in our environment, it really does improve the vibe.



- Notice the small things first. It's easy to get caught up in the big things that surround an injury, but small things are important. What small things have you accomplished that are really big successes in your therapy journey?
- 2. Every week, compliment a friend or perhaps another patient at therapy when you see them achieving their goals, or working hard. This shows you are rooting for them and creates a community of healing.


- 3. Write a simple thank you note to someone who has helped you along the way.



From Flagstaff, drive north on US 180 for 9.8 miles to Forest Road 151. Turn right onto the gravel road, which wanders through aspen and pine stands around the west side of the San Francisco Peaks. Proceed to Forest Road 418 and go east (right). FR 418 will turn into Forest Road 420. Watch for a sign that directs you to US Highway 89. Turn south (right) onto US Highway 89 to return to Flagstaff to complete the circle tour.

MADJACK'S MUSINGS

THE TREES OF MUNDS PARK



Juniper Tree

Let's talk trees. Specifically, the magnificent native trees that are unique to Munds Park. I'm focusing here on the Big Five: our Ponderosa Pines, Alligator Junipers, Lombardy Poplars, Gambel Oaks and Quaking Aspens. There are many other species scattered about Munds Park, including maples, pear and apple, blue spruce, pinyons, etc.. All thrive above 6000' elevation and should be considered one of the most distinguishing features of our beautiful community.

Ponderosa Pine

Surely the big boy on any block as many are over 200 hundred years old and can

live as long as 400 years! Perhaps you've noticed the beautiful red bark on the older trees such as the one pictured here with our arms stretched around its massive girth. It may just be the largest in Munds Park and is located on the east side of Lake Odell near the bottom end of the Crystal Point trail. Perhaps you've noticed the deep red bark on the largest trees. This bark forms after 50-90 years and serves to help protect them from most forest fires. They can grow up to 150' tall and serve as a source of food and shelter for numerous species of birds and animals. Fun fact: did you know that northern Arizona has the world's largest stand of Ponderosa Pines? But they sure can be messy around your deck, huh? Starting in spring with the heavy yellow pollen, then the pinecone buds as they mature only to be chewed and scattered by the squirrels. Not that I'm complaining though, since they provide supreme privacy and shade in our front yards and decks.

Alligator Juniper

So named because its bark resembles an alligator skin these trees can grow to 40' tall with diameters up to 7'! See the pic here for a huge specimen located on the back side of the Crystal Point trail. They can live to 500 years old, and I would guess this one is well over 100 years old. They're less messy than the pines and have beautiful blue-gray scale-like leaves. It is considered a favorite for wood fires as well due its hardwood and fragrant odor.

Lombardy Poplar

These fast-growing trees are unique for their vertical height (up to 60') and narrow crown reaching only up to 8' at full maturity up to 50 years. I planted eleven of them in a row in my side yard to provide an awesome privacy screen and windbreak between my neighbor and myself. They were 6' tall when planted and now are over 20' tall just 6 years later. The diamond shaped leaves are massive and exhibit the most brilliant yellow colors in late fall. If you're a golfer, you may have noticed some massive specimens with two-foot diameters at our own Pinewood golf course.

Gambel Oak

These deciduous trees can grow 30' - 50' with a crown of up to 15' wide. They may grow as a single trunk or multi-trunk stemmed tree with the leaves turning a nice brown/yellow in the fall. They're often the last leaves to emerge in late spring and the last to drop in late fall.

Quaking Aspen

Ah, the best for last, our Quaking Aspens so named since their leaves appear to tremble or 'quake' in the wind. They grow to 40' to 50' tall with a spread at maturity of 20' to 30'. Their bright yellow canopies contrasting with their white bark in the fall season are a showstopper as you may have noticed on the drive to Snowbowl around the San Fransisco peaks.

So, that's (what I consider) the Big Five of our magnificent trees here in Munds Park. Hope you enjoyed this article and I'll be back with more MadJack's Musing next spring. Enjoy the fall and winter seasons everyone!

YOUR GO-TO BULB PLANTING GUIDE

GARDEN'S IN THE PARK

Each spring, beautiful displays of tulips, daffodils, crocus and more can be seen throughout Flagstaff and Munds Park. These and other spring-blooming bulbs provide bright spots of color during the still chilly and sometimes gray months of spring.

But to get that spring beauty you need to act now. Spring blooms need to be planted the previous fall in order to guarantee that you'll get beautiful flowers by next March or April.

Warner's Nursery recently got in our first shipment of bulbs and we wanted to share this go-to planting guide to get you started.

PLANNING

In addition to making sure you get your bulbs planted in September or October, you might want to consider planting a variety of bulbs that will bloom at different times during the spring season. You'll also want to arrange your various bulbs by their height to increase the aesthetic appeal of your display.

Early spring blooms include hyacinth (10 inches) and crocus (4 inches). In the middle of spring is when your muscari (12 inches), tulips (24 inches), and narcissus (16 inches) typically bloom. Late season blooms include allium (35 inches), bearded iris (36 inches), and Dutch iris (20 inches). If you combine a variety of bulbs in your garden bed, you'll give yourself about 100 days of spring beauty.

PLANTING

Spring blooming bulbs need well-draining soil and at least partial sun to bloom their best. Amend your soil (we recommend Warner's Supreme Planting Mix) and mix to a depth of 12 inches to create a loose, well-draining soil texture.

When planting, place the bulb facing upward with the pointy end or "nose" sticking up in a hole about three times as deep as the bulb is tall. For your typical larger bulb - such as a tulip or daffodil - that means a planting depth of about eight inches, while a smaller bulb might only need four inches of soil depth.





FERTILIZING

Your spring bulbs need to

be fertilized with bone meal or dutch bulb food, which are both high in phosphorus. Either one can be added to the bottom of the hole and mixed

with a small scoop of mulch before placing the bulb and covering it with soil. (Top dressing with fertilizer after planting will not have the same positive effects.)

Sprinkle a little blood meal in the bottom of the hole and around the finished top area to ward off any pesky animals that might want to make a meal of your newly planted bulbs.

WATERING

Give your bulbs a good soak right after planting. Other than that, as long as we receive at least 2 inches of snow every 10 days, your bulbs won't need additional water during the winter. If we have a dry winter, water your bulbs thoroughly at least once per month.

In the spring, when shoots begin to appear, start watering your bulbs about once a week, providing a deep soaking each time. However, take care not to overwater as this can cause the bulbs to rot.

SPRING FERTILIZING

Once you see growth in the spring, feed your plants with a high-quality fertilizer until the bulbs flower, when you should stop and just enjoy the show!

Maintenance

After your bulbs flower, you can be left with the leaves, which many consider messy or unattractive. Resist the temptation to cut them off; they are necessary for the plant to photosynthesize and produce energy that will be stored in the bulb for the next year.

One easy solution to hiding the mess is to layer planting beds so that the remaining bulb foliage is hidden by emerging spring perennials. Another solution is to trim back the flower stems and leave the foliage as a green accent. Once that foliage has turned yellow or brown and died back, it can be removed.

Our days are still warm and it's still a great time to be outside. Enjoy the weather and add a beautiful spring accent to your garden by planting bulbs such as tulips, daffodils, crocus, and iris. You'll be glad you did next spring when you are able to enjoy your amazing display of spring color!

SOUR CHERRIES & SWEET DISASTERS

Pamela's Culinary Tale

There are so many excellent reasons why I don't cook, and none were made clearer than by the recent discovery of a backyard sour cherry tree chock-full of soon-to-be ripe fruit and what happened next. It is cozied on two sides by a

small pear tree and an equally modest apple tree, neither of which has much fruit this year. I may get enough apples for a pie, but after you hear what happened next, I am not sure you would sanction the efforts. The cherries were on the bumper-crop scale, begging to be picked.

How do I know they are sour cherries? Good ole Google came through again. It seems the leaves of the trees are a dead giveaway. If there are six or fewer pairs of veins off the central one, it's sour. Ta-da! This tree is small enough for me to hand-pick most of the cherries. And the ones I can't reach fall like little bombs when its small frame is shaken.

This does require bending down and reaching the ground, my noisy, creaky knees aching. I decided that

the fruit is worth the pain. It's only once a summer.

I have dealt with cherry trees up here in Munds Park before.
The setting of the fruit depends on the kind of fickle spring Munds
Park experiences. A freeze after blossoming will kill any fruit setting.
Most years, that's what happens, but not with this tree this year. I even have cherry pitters, three actually. I can make it a social event, sharing the crop with two other friends whose fingers can bend and grasp, which is not always easy for a certain age group. It's a thankless but necessary task

Cherries last well in the fridge for a good week or more after picking. I pitted over 150, about a tenth of what I picked, and put them in a two-quart, glass-covered casserole dish on a burner with a little water, setting it to medium-low to let them simmer. After mashing them, tasting them, and

adding a minimum amount of sugar, I continued simmering.

Here's where the clear message of 'I'm not a cook' comes in. I engrossed myself in a book to while away the time while the dish was finishing cooking. By the time I remembered my stew, I had converted any sugar and most of the cherry juice into a black, cement-like second bottom in the glass dish. And because it was covered, the bubbling cherry syrup

had boiled over, running inside my electric cooktop and coating the entire surface with sticky, dark red goo.

Googling again on how to rescue the damaged dish: pour boiling water on it, let it sit, repeat if necessary. No such luck. I still have gobs of fresh, unpitted cherries calling. With my hand still aching from round one, I decided to try the other method of pitting: cook first, mash, put the mashed meat through a wire

sieve, discard the pit remains, add sugar to taste, and reheat to dissolve the sugar. Then ladle the preserves into lidded glass jars to cool.

You'd think I would have learned about the possible boil-over action. Nope. Our home will have a burnt cherry aroma for years when I cook. That's another good reason not to.

I have managed to jar ten jars of jam to give to friends. It's good in plain yogurt, cottage cheese, on ice cream, toast, waffles, pancakes, in a crisp pie crust, on chicken, pork, or just plain by the spoon.

Regarding the black-bottomed glass dish; my handy mate took a chisel to it and, after chipping away for a long time, managed to remove all the burnt-on residue, bless his heart.

And as for those few apples on the trees back there. Would you really, seriously trust me to make an apple pie?

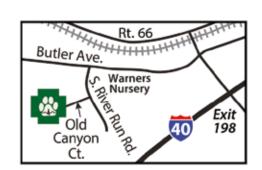



BOOK REVIEW

THE EXTRAORDINARY LIFE OF SAM HELL

Known mainly for his Seattle-based thrillers, masterpieces of craft and plotting, Robert Dugoni took a major departure in his novel, The Extraordinary Life of Sam Hell.

It was a grand gamble, resulting in a beautifully crafted coming-of-age story.

Sam Hill always saw the world through different eyes. Born with red pupils, he was dubbed 'devil boy' or 'Sam Hell' by his classmates at Our Lady of Mercy, the Catholic school his mother, Madeline, fights to get him into.

Once there, he faces loneliness, alienation, and daily ridicule, especially from David Freemon, a merciless bully who torments

him daily, and Sister Beatrice, the school's principal, who in her own subtler ways is just as vindictive as he is.

"God's will" was what his mother called his 'condition'. Her words were of little comfort. but Sam persevered, supported by his mother's devout faith, his father's practical wisdom, and two supportive misfit friends.

African-American athlete Ernie Cantwell and free-spirited Michaela Kennedy allow Sam to survive his troublesome years at OLM. In high school, Sam finds every milestone tryouts for the basketball team, senior prom, being named class valedictorianpresenting new challenges. But his friends, along with his wonderful mother, give him the courage to find his own path no matter what that may look like.

"I actually started this novel ten years ago," says author Bob Dugoni. "The premise came to me, but I didn't have a character. The idea rattled around in my head for months. Then, I was reading the newspaper and stumbled on an article about a boy in Australia denied admittance to a Catholic school because he had red eyes. The principal, a nun, expressed concern that the boy would be disruptive because the children called him "The Devil Boy." That was all I needed to get rolling."

Dugoni wrote the first draft in six weeks, but he was still struggling to find a central theme to pull the scenes together.

"The theme came to me while visiting my mother and discussing the death of my father to cancer," he said. "I expressed how unfair it was when she said, "It's God's Will." I desperately wanted to believe she was right, and that belief was exactly what Sam Hill wanted also. He wanted to believe his mother was right. That common thread helped me finish the novel."

I think the loyalty and unwavering support shown to Sam was the true driving force of this story, which goes back and forth between the past and present over forty years. Sam becomes an ophthalmologist and finds himself meeting the same problems (sometimes even the very same people) in his practice, but recognizes a kernel of himself in them, and is thus able to help them.

By the end of the book, I felt fully satisfied with each storyline, the character development and the emotional payoff. I especially enjoyed the ending of the book, how Sam cares for his elderly parents, and his tenderness with the boy he planned to adopt.

Dugoni closed many loose ties in the story, which I appreciated. Plus, the epilogue was a surprise. I didn't realize that the author has a family situation that gave him the courage and inspiration to tell the story of Sam Hell.

The Extraordinary Life of Sam Hell is evidence that a skilled writer can tell a story that draws you in and embraces you, regardless of genre.

Well done, Mr. Dugoni! I'm giving this one 5 stars.

CURIOUS READER ABOUT MUSHROOMS

We recently received a query from a reader curious about a specific mushroom they encountered - thank you for reaching out to us! While we're unable to offer direct identification services here at the paper, we absolutely appreciate your curiosity and trust in us to assist.

To aid you on your mycological adventure, we have put together a general guide to mushroom discovery, encouraging safe and informed exploration:

It's a little magical how a small theater troupe can walk through the door and instantly transform the space around them.

That's exactly what five talented actors do so effortlessly as part of Phoenix Theatre's Partners That Heal program. They travel all over the Valley, using improv, music, storytelling and movement to engage and delight audiences of every age and ability.

Recently, they visited Hospice of the Valley's new Dementia Care and Education Campus in central Phoenix. They spent time with residents at the Assisted Living Center, members of the Adult Day Club and preschoolers in the adjoining Child Center. Working in perfect harmony, they lead people

who are living with dementia on a spontaneous journey that unlocks their imaginations.

"We all have that child inside of us and we let them be kids again. We give them a chance to play," says PTH member Mike Lawler. "And we feel like we're part of the care team."

Marshal Glass agrees. "This light goes on inside of them and it's just wonderful to see. Then the staff tells us the patient's never done that before!"

The actors harness joy by sparking happy memories with familiar songs and stories.

"We come in and people who are showing no emotion or expression

immediately start remembering moments," shares Sally Jo Bannow. "Somehow, it taps into their imagination and creativity."

"We want to get a smile on people's faces. I get chills just thinking about it," Kim Manning gushes. "That's the whole reason we're here."

"You can tell they're so connected and waiting for more," adds Brian Sweis. "It's so rewarding and we just feel honored to be a part of that."

Partners That Heal has visited more than 70,000 people in our community over the last decade.

"They appeal to preschoolers, they appeal to someone who's in their 70s and 80s with dementia. They meet everyone

where they're at," says Dementia Campus Enrichment Coordinator Angela Hofler.

"Their stories might be about someone's favorite animal, or maybe we're all going on an African safari, and the next minute we're waterskiing in the ocean having ice cream. They bring so much fun to us. We are lucky to have them spreading their magic and touching so many lives!"

CAN YOU RELATE?

Have you ever met someone rich and/or famous and stammered and stuttered your way through an awkward conversation because they were somebody and you were not? I have. It is embarrassing.

We lived in Little Rock before we moved here. The regional YoungLife director was a member of our church. And I was involved with what they were doing on high school and college campuses in the area. I was a regular at their Christmas parties for their staff, volunteers, and supporters.

At one such party, I met a guy and his wife who were active supporters of the ministry. He was friendly and nice, easy to talk to. I asked about his kids. They were elementary age, not in a YoungLife program yet. They were too young. But he stayed involved because he was in the program when he was in high school, and it had a profound effect on him.

The night was casual, but he was neatly dressed in a starched button-down shirt. Still, he was not shy about getting down onto the dirty floor and into the mix of the games and activities of the staff.

When things settled down and the refreshments were served, I got to know him a little better. At one point, I asked him his name. That should have been a clue. Because the next question was about as embarrassing as it could be. I asked him what he did for a living. Seems innocent enough. Except, he had just introduced himself to me as Bill Dillard. That's right. As in Dillard's Department Stores. It is headquartered in Little Rock. His grandfather started the chain. He laughed. Thanks.

The famous, wealthy V.P. of a major corporation might have been hard to connect with. But the guy that played the games on the dirty floor with the student leaders was easy to relate to.

Not too long ago, Queen Elizabeth died, and her funeral was broadcast live on our televisions. It was an elaborate affair. At one point in her ceremony, Prince Charles (he had not been installed as king, yet), Prince William, Prince Harry, and Prince Andrew stood vigil around the Queen's coffin. They stood in silence. It is much easier to relate to a guy who was born in a stable, to dirt-poor parents, who struggled to make ends meet as a hard-working, blue-collar carpenter. Jesus was born in dirt, was raised in dirt, and gets down and dirty with those of us who live in and stir up dirt.

Jesus is the King. He is Royal and Elite. He is the CEO of the universe. But He is the only Royal Elite CEO whom we dirty peons can relate to and connect with. He gets us. 
