WE'RE A DARK SKY COMMUNITY

Learn how you can keep our skies dark, sparkley & clear.

In 1958, Northern Arizona became the birthplace of a movement that

has spread across the world: the movement to preserve our connection with the night sky.

Flagstaff and Northern Arizona have long been at the forefront of astronomy, both professional and amateur. Flagstaff was once nicknamed the "Skylight City" because of its spectacular view of the night sky. These clear skies were a major part of what brought Percival Lowell to Flagstaff to found Lowell Observatory, and of what brought the U.S. Naval Observatory to Flagstaff as well. Flagstaff's high elevation and dry climate make it a nearly ideal place for stargazing. Even today, on

a clear summer night, from many parts of Flagstaff one can see the Milky Way, a rare and special privilege for denizens of a city of its size.

Residents of Northern Arizona are afforded such spectacular stargazing due to efforts across our community. A large part of these efforts are Flagstaff's lighting ordinances, which are designed to both preserve the natural sky as a source of wonder for Northern Arizona's residents and

visitors, and to permit cutting edge research for the astronomers who work here. In 1957, Lowell Observatory acquired the 69 inch Perkins Telescope.

> A telescope this powerful could only realize its full potential under skies minimally polluted by city lights. Even at the time, Lowell Observatory's Mars Hill campus next to downtown Flagstaff was inadequate to the task, so Lowell Observatory placed the telescope on Anderson Mesa near Lake Mary, a location used for astronomical research to this day. Even at this more remote site, however, there were still concerns. A single searchlight could ruin the sky for sensitive observations for miles around. So Lowell Observatory astronomers petitioned Flagstaff's City Council to enact a regulation to

prevent searchlights from interfering with their work. Such an ordinance was enacted in 1958. While there was little fanfare at the time, in retrospect it was a momentous event: the world's first ordinance to protect a dark, natural sky.



Bear Jaw is a type 2 IA crew that is an extension of Pinewood Fire and Highlands Fire Districts. Bear Jaw has proven to be invaluable to our communities and many others as they deploy every summer to help the nation fight wildfires. The community clean-up has proven vital to reducing the fuel load in Munds Park and surrounding communities. In the past, the community clean-up has taken more than 20,000 bags per year of green waste. This reduction in fuel load gives Munds Park a better chance of being protected in case of a wildfire.

This year Bear Jaw will be receiving some extra help from Goodfellas Junk removal, a Munds Park local business. Goodfellas approached the Pinewood Fire District and asked to be a part of this year's community clean-up, Mike owner of Goodfellas stated, "The community clean-up helps everyone in Munds Park. It is just a small thing we can do to give back to the community that we live in." Mike hopes that with the help of Goodfellas, Bear Jaw will move more green waste out of Munds Park than ever before. Goodfellas plans on donating not only their time but also their equipment, including a truck and 16' trailer, and a 17' utility trailer. This additional manpower and equipment will help Bear jaw speed up taking green waste to the Willard Springs transfer station.

The Pinewood Fire Department and Bear Jaw would like to thank Goodfellas for helping make this year's community clean-up bigger and better than last year's, something that everyone in the community can appreciate.



HOW TO PREPARE YOUR HOME FOR WILDFIRES

Wildfire risk reduction steps that can make your home safer during a wildfire.

This year, Wildfire Awareness Week will be May 1st through May 7th and with the looming threat this year we have some information that will help you make your home safer in the event of a large wildfire. Munds Park has been a Firewise Community for over 10 years but reducing risk to wildfire in a community like ours requires constant care and attention. Please remember

to have your green waste on the street no later than April 25th for the Bear Jaw Green-waste Cleanup. Together we can keep our community safe.

1. HOME IGNITION ZONES

To increase your home's chance of surviving a wildfire, choose fire-resistant building materials and limit the amount of flammable vegetation in the three home ignition zones.

The zones include the Immediate Zone: (o to 5 feet around the house), the Intermediate Zone (5 to 30 feet), and the Extended Zone (30 to 100 feet).

2. LANDSCAPING AND MAINTENANCE

To reduce ember ignitions and fire spread, trim branches that overhang the home, porch, and deck and prune branches of large trees up to 6 to 10 feet (depending on their height) from the ground. Remove plants containing resins, oils, and waxes. Use crushed stone or gravel instead of flammable mulches in the Immediate Zone (o to 5 feet around the house). Keep your landscape in good condition.

3. ROOFING AND VENTS

Class A fire-rated roofing products, such as composite shingles, metal, concrete, and clay tiles, offer the best protection. Inspect shingles or roof tiles and replace or repair those that are loose or missing to prevent ember penetration. Box in eaves but provide ventilation to prevent condensation and mildew. Roof and attic vents should be screened to prevent ember entry.

4. DECKS AND PORCHES

Never store flammable materials underneath decks or porches. Remove dead vegetation and debris from under decks and porches and between deck board joints.

5. SIDING AND WINDOWS

Embers can collect in small nooks and crannies and ignite combustible materials; radiant heat from flames can crack windows. Use fire-resistant siding such as brick, fiber- cement, plaster, or stucco, and use dual-pane tempered glass windows.

Be Informed. Be Ready. Sign Up.



The Coconino County Emergency Notification system provides emergency warnings and information, sign-up is easy, 60 to Coconino.az.gov/ready and create your account. Or call 928-679-8311.

6. EMERGENCY RESPONDER ACCESS

Ensure your home and neighborhood have legible and clearly marked street names and numbers. Driveways should be at least 12 feet wide with a vertical clearance of 15 feet for emergency vehicle access.

- Develop, discuss, and practice an emergency action plan with everyone in your home. Include details for handling pets, large animals, and livestock.
- Know two ways out of your neighborhood and have a predesignated meeting place.
- Always evacuate if you feel it's unsafe to stay—don't wait to receive an emergency notification if you feel threatened from the fire.
- Conduct an annual insurance policy checkup to adjust for local building costs, codes, and new renovations.
- Create or update a home inventory to help settle claims faster

When I was asked to write this article, I wanted to share a special recipe with a good story behind it. I pondered for weeks on which recipe I would like to share, and I felt my sister's Baked Spaghetti was the best recipe. It's not only a fun memory, but it's really good and really simple. I hope you enjoy this walk down my memory lane.

About 20 years ago, I was at my sister's house one evening, and she said she was making dinner for me. Yeah, I was going to eat and did not have to make it, SCORE! Until she told me what it was, baked spaghetti?!

Baked spaghetti? What the heck is that, and the craziness of baked spaghetti seemed, well, unsavory. I had to give her grief, all while she was making it, a few imaginative face makings and some vocal comments had to be made. We're sisters, and giving grief is part of the gig.

Anyone who has a sibling, especially a younger sibling, knows the older one is always right. Right? Not this time! Once the spaghetti was done baking, the house smelled really good! At this point, I'm quietly wondering how much she will make me "literally" eat my words. After the dish cooled down, we dug in. Wow! It was so good and so simple to make. Now that's my kind of dinner to make for sure! As you can imagine, I was apologizing all evening. I had to. No way to get around this one. She just shared a yummy and easy dinner with me! So yes, to this day, anytime Baked Spaghetti comes into a conversation, I get to hear all over how she made me eat my words. She does take pride in that triumph of hers!

This truly is an easy dish, and all FIVE of our children love it! I hope you enjoy it, and feel free to modify it to your own liking!

BAKED SPAGHETTI

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder (we love garlic, I actually use minced garlic)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- ½ yellow onion (less or more, your choice)
- 1½ pounds of hamburger
- 16 oz diced tomatoes
- 1 package spaghetti
- 1 package of cream cheese
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- Shredded cheddar (enough to spread over the top)

Directions

- 1. Melt butter in a large skillet and add the next four ingredients. Cook until onion is translucent, add hamburger meat, and cook until done.
- 2. Add diced tomatoes and allow to simmer for about 10 15 minutes.
- 3. Cook spaghetti (I cook until al dente) and drain water.
- 4. Get a 9x13 pan, spray with Pam or any nonstick spray and add spaghetti to the bottom. Mix sour cream and softened cream cheese, and spread on top of the spaghetti. Add the meat and sprinkle with a good amount of shredded cheddar.
- 5. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.
- 6. Allow to cool down for a bit. This also helps it to set and is easier to serve.



THE VIEW FROM HERE

O'NEIL SPRING AND LAKE MARY

In the late 1870s, few men had settled in the wilderness high country of Northern Arizona. The Atlantic and Pacific railroad would not be built across Northern Arizona, and the Babbitt family, who would go on to great fame as Coconino County entrepreneurs, would not step down from the steps

of a passenger car in the booming metropolis of Flag Staff for another few years. Most of Northern Arizona's sparse population was attracted to the rich gold fields of the Bradshaw Mountains or the lush grasses and rich earth of the Verde Valley. Cold winter snow kept men moving west along the Beale Wagon Road toward California or southwest down the Overland Trail around the head of Sycamore Canyon into the new town of Prescott.

Jim O'Neil was one of the earliest men to settle in the vicinity. Originally from Kentucky, he entered the sheep business at Date Creek west of Prescott before moving to the San Francisco Mountain region because of the dry conditions in the low lands. His sheep got water from what came to be O'Neil Spring in the area now known as Kachina Village. Jim O'Neil, along with John Clark, William Ashurst, Ira Gosney and Charles Odell would become Northern Arizona's biggest sheep ranchers. As Flagstaff was established and grew, O'Neil was selected as the first voting inspector in the original Flag Staff voting precinct. By 1886 as he prospered, he also ran a store on San Francisco Street in Flagstaff.

In the early days, one of the leading industries besides raising sheep and cattle was the very large Ayer Saw Mill (later sold to the Riordan Brothers.) This mill sat in the middle of the largest continuous stand of virgin ponderosa pine timber on the face of the earth, and the railroad had been given alternating sections for miles on either side of the track. In this, the glory days of the industrial revolution, steam power was the ultimate technology. Steam-powered locomotives brought logs in from the woods, steam-powered cranes lifted logs off rail cars, steam-driven sawmills cut lumber from logs, and steam-powered loaders put that lumber back on cars for shipment. When electricity first came to Flagstaff, it too was powered by steam generators located at the Riordan Mill.

Steam comes from boiling water. Heat came from burning sawdust and scrap left over from the milling process, so fuel was no problem. Water on the other hand was in short supply.

Flagstaff had Antelope Spring (now called Old Town Spring,) on the hill above the mill. During wet years this spring did OK but during a dry spell it would not produce enough water for the town folk and stock, much less run a sawmill.

The next nearest spring of any consequence was O'Neil Spring about eight miles south of town. The Riordans bought the water rights from Jim O'Neal and built a large stone pumphouse in the field below the spring to bring water into town. O'Neil Spring served the mill and town until 1903 when again the demand for water had grown so large that both Old Town and O'Neal Springs were not enough. That was the year Tim Riordan built a dam across Clark Valley and named the new reservoir Lake Mary for his daughter, Mary Riordan.


So next time you're buzzing along Interstate 17 headed into Flagstaff look for a little slice of History. The old stone pump house building can still be seen in the lowlands of Pumphouse Wash immediately west of Interstate 17 in the field just north of the Kachina Village Exit.


O'Neil Spring itself is in the aspen grove at the west end of the clearing. Pumphouse Wash runs from there into Oak Creek and is quite pretty as it becomes much deeper near Oak Creek Canyon.

If you get out into our spectacular Northern Arizona backwoods, please do not litter and try to leave the area cleaner than you found it.





HIGH ROAD TO TAOS, NEW MEXICO

The 1969 cult flick Easy Rider brought attention to Taos, New Mexico's counterculture, but Taos was counterculture before counterculture was cool. Take this road trip along the High Road to Taos, and discover New Mexico's intriguing subcultural

diversity. Find fun in offbeat towns with curious names like Córdova, Chimayó and Trucas that speak to long Spanish legacies. Discover ancient roots of Picuris and Taos Pueblos still inhabited by tribal people. Wind through frontiersman Kit Carson's mountainous backyard.

Start your road trip after a good night's rest at Rancho de Chimayó Hacienda in Chimayó. The historic adobe B&B is across the lane from the world-famous Rancho de Chimayó Restaurante, where it's difficult to decide between fiery green chile or savory red chile to top traditional New Mexican cuisine. Can't decide when the server asks, "Red or green?" Order like a local and say, "Christmas." That means both.

After breakfast in the Hacienda's charming garden, drive southeast on County Road 98 to El Santuario de Chimayó. Step back in time as you push open the heavy, carved doors, smell the burning candles and experience the colorful retablos—religious figures painted on wood—and bultos—wood sculptures— prevalent in Spain during the late Middle Ages. Spanish conquistadores brought the spiritual practices to New Mexico in the 1600s, and today the traditions continue.

When leaving El Santuario parking lot, zero your odometer and turn right at the stop sign. Then, backtracking on 98, and turn right onto Highway 76. You'll have opportunities to stop at art galleries dotting the High Road to Taos, but don't miss Oviedo Carvings and Bronze at 2.4 miles. Meet the working artist, or chat with wife Pat, whose family has lived in these parts for over three centuries.

Continue north on 76 to 80 at 4.4 miles. Turn right into Córdova or continue on 76. Córdova is a tangle town of narrow, medieval-like streets and alleyways where even the 1832 adobe church is difficult to find. If you're adventurous, this authentic colonial town, known for its santeros—carvers—who fashion saintly bultos from piñon wood, will remind you of villages in Spain or Peru. However, if you are not so daring or are driving a large vehicle, skip this maze, which is on a short spur off the main road.

From the Córdova turn-off, climb to 7.4 miles and visit a hilltop cemetery so picturesque that here Robert Redford filmed key scenes of The Milagro Beanfield War, a story about the struggle to preserve New Mexican culture. Then, at 9.1 miles, turn left to follow 76 or park along one of the narrow streets of Trucas, a place where teenagers, after a morning of trout fishing, pop wheelies on their quads to impress the occasional tourist.

The easy ride through the quiet countryside passes by Las Trampas and its San José de Gracia Church. 18th Century adobe buttresses and wooden belfries against mountain skies make a perfect photo op.

To explore Picuris Pueblo, turn left onto New Mexico 75 at 22.2. In .6 miles, turn right onto Pueblo View and continue to tribal offices to purchase self-guided tours of the old pueblo and church. Native leaders from here and Taos Pueblo helped lead the province-wide Pueblo Revolt of 1680. Return the way you came to the intersection of 75 and 76 and continue straight towards Taos.

Watch for elk after turning left onto New Mexico 518 and climbing into the high country. Carson (named for Taos

rabble-rouser Kit Carson) National Forest trails branch off into tall pines, and soon scenic overlooks reveal Wheeler Peak, New Mexico's highest, to the northeast.

Back down in the piñon-juniper country at 46.9, a sign indicates the end of the High Road to Taos, but you'll diverge from the mainstream and continue your counterculture quest. Turn left at the T onto Highway 68 and then immediately turn left under the blinking light. Rest at San Francisco de Asis Church, renown for inspiring more photographers than any other New Mexican church. Avant-garde artist Georgia O'Keefe couldn't stop painting its sculpted backside.

Follow 68 north into Taos. At Kit Carson Road (51.8), turn right and immediately turn left into Barela Lane. Historic Taos Inn is recommended for your overnight stop as it is home to the High Road's best margarita, the consistent "Cowboy Buddha." Sleep in a registered historic landmark where locals come for live music and Doc's Chile Rellenos. Make the inn your outpost while poking around galleries. Don't miss Harwood Museum, which exhibited Easy Rider Dennis Hopper's art and other counterculture projects. Peek in on Harwood's fascinating collection of retablos and bultos.

The following day, head north on 68. In .4 miles (52.3), continue on 68 or detour to Taos Pueblo, a UNESCO site continuously inhabited for over 1000 years.



In the years since then, Flagstaff and Coconino County have expanded their efforts to protect the wonders of our natural skies. For example, street lights are shaded so that their lights are directed down, and are built to shine in a color that is minimally obtrusive for research and stargazing. Dark sky protection must be balanced with safety and commercial interests, but using proper methods and lighting types we can maintain a spectacular sky while still meeting our community's lighting needs. Many

cities, counties, and regions all over the world have followed Flagstaff's example and adopted ordinances to help preserve a natural sky. These range from our neighbors in Arizona like Sedona and Tucson, to major metropolitan areas like San Diego County, to communities around the globe like Bisei Town in Japan and Møn in Denmark.

In 1991, Flagstaff was designated the first International Dark Sky City by the International Dark-Sky Association, an organization dedicated to promoting natural, non-light-polluted skies all over the world. International Dark Sky cities are designated as such to recognize exceptional work in preserving or recovering dark skies. Flagstaff remains a world leader in this regard.

You can help keep our skies beautiful for all of Northern Arizona's residents and visitors. If you keep the tops of your lights properly shaded, more of the light will stay near the ground, where it is needed, rather than go upwards where it is wasted and pollutes the natural sky. To be extra sure of the effectiveness of the light's direction, check for the International Dark-Sky Association's (IDA's) seal of approval on the light. If you don't use more light than you need, you can actually improve visibility by reducing glare, reduce energy costs, and also help keep the night sky closer to its natural state. Using lights only in the times and places that they're needed will also save energy and help preserve a natural sky. Timers and motion sensors are invaluable aids for this, but simply placing lights thoughtfully and remembering to turn them off when they are not in use is also effective. Working together, we can maintain Flagstaff's access to the incredible natural wonder of the night sky, and let it continue to live up to its old nickname of the Skylight City.





Of the many telescopes found on Lowell Observatory's central Flagstaff campus, the most prolific and recognizable is the Clark Refractor. Nestled among ponderosa pines, the Clark Dome is the first thing you see as you embark on the winding road that leads up to Mars Hill. In the observatory's earliest days, Percival Lowell himself used the Clark to study the surface of Mars, searching for signs of intelligent life. His theories on the subject fostered massive public interest in astronomy and sparked the imaginations of science fiction writers for generations to come. Nearly a century later, the Clark would be used by a team of scientists and artists to create painstakingly detailed maps of the Moon's surface for use on the Apollo moon mission.


SPRING & SUMMER WEATHER OUTLOOK

Spring Outlook (Fire Season)

With a drier and warmer than average end to the winter months, attention is turned to what we can expect for this spring and fire season. The latest fire season outlooks from the Climate Prediction Center show odds tilted in favor of warmer than average temperatures. However, equal chances exist for above, near, or below average precipitation near the Munds Park area during the April-June time period. Granted, April-June is climatologically the driest part of the year, so it does not take many rain/snow events to put an area above average for precipitation during this time of year. As with every spring season, there will also be bouts of windy days, so hold on to your hats!








Now is a great time to ensure you have defensible space around your property in order to protect you and your family from wildfire, if one were to threaten your neighborhood. The following graphic provides guidance for how to create defensible space around your home that could be affected by wildfire. The sooner you plan for fire season, the better prepared you will be.

Summer Outlook (Monsoon Season)

Looking farther ahead to monsoon season, the Climate Prediction Center is indicating odds tilted in favor of wetter than average conditions for portions of central and southern Arizona. Munds Park is right on the fringe of equal chances, but these outlooks can easily shift farther north or south with each subsequent issuance. As is typically the case, the Climate Prediction Center is indicating odds tiled in favor of warmer than average temperatures across Arizona this summer.

Flash flooding is one of the deadliest weather hazards during monsoon season across northern Arizona. Always check the forecast at weather.gov/flagstaff before you head out. When encountering a flooded roadway, turn around, don't drown!

GARDENING IN THE PARK

THE (MANY) HEALTH BENEFITS OF GARDENING

Spring has fully arrived in Northern Arizona and, if you haven't already started, it's time to plant your garden.

The prospect of beautiful flowers and home-grown vegetables is probably motivation enough to go play in the dirt, but if you need another reason, how about this: numerous studies show you will be healthier, and live longer, if you garden.

One main reason is that foods you grow yourself are tastier and slightly more nutritious than their supermarket counterparts. Vegetables like peppers and green beans have nutrients that can degrade in transport – losing some of their healthful properties on the way to your table.

Ever tasted a homegrown tomato fresh from the garden? It's nothing like ones you buy from the store, because store tomatoes often are picked "green" to allow them to survive the trip to your market. That early picking, however,

means they haven't had a chance to fully develop their flavor.

If your fruits and vegetables are tastier, you are likely to eat more of them, meeting federal guidelines to generally increase your intake of fresh, unprocessed foods. And if you are worried about our short season, please know that Warner's selection of fruits and vegetables are specifically suited to high-altitude growing. We can also help you with what you need to grow organically, making sure your food is chemical-free.

Diet and nutrition aren't the only reason that gardening promotes good health. Numerous studies show a link between gardening and a happier, more stress-free life.

- A Dutch study had 30 people perform a stressful mental task then randomly assigned them to either read or garden. The gardeners not only reported being in a much better mood than the readers, their levels of cortisol – the "stress hormone" – were significantly lower than the other group.
- A long-term study in Australia followed almost 3,000 60-year olds for 16 years and showed that daily gardening tended to reduce the risk of dementia.
- A third study, this one in the United States, indicated that gardeners –
 who get to see a physical manifestation of their work either in beautiful
 blooms, stately trees, or colorful fruits and vegetables generally report
 greater self-esteem.

Lastly, there is the exercise benefit from getting up, getting out and getting to work in your garden. The US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommend "moderate-intensity level activity" for about two and a half hours each week, which can reduce the risk for obesity, high blood pressure, type 2 diabetes, osteoporosis, heart disease, stroke and cancer. Gardening is one of the activities that meets the moderate-intensity threshold. And those who pick gardening as their preferred activity tend to exercise almost an hour longer each week than those who walk or bike.

Gardening helps keep you limber because it involves exercising both your arms and legs, with particular emphasis on hand dexterity and strength.

But just like you would warm up your legs before a run, it's important to stretch out your hands and to not push yourself too hard to avoid hand

or wrist injuries. Those with knee issues might want to consider raised beds to make it easier on these joints. Finally, make sure you wear and use the appropriate gear, including gloves and well-designed tools to protect your hand and wrists. And don't forget the sunscreen, although you might want to wait 10 minutes in the sun before you apply it, so you can benefit from the extra Vitamin D.

Lastly, gardening can be solitary or social, both of which have their benefits. A quiet hour or so in the garden can be just what you need after a hectic day. On the other hand, gardening can be a great family activity – I know it's something I really enjoy with my sons!

HISTORY OF THE PPOA

We will continue to work with the Coconino County Sheriff to try to enforce the speed limits throughout the park, and with other county officials to eliminate hazards on our roads as well as cleaning out the ditches so the water runs freely when we have our monsoon rains.

Each year the Pinewood Property Owners provide scholarships for students who live in Munds Park and graduate from a Flagstaff school. These scholarships provide \$1500 per semester, and if students maintain a good grade average, they are available for four semesters. 

GREAT OUTDOORS

END OF THE WORLD - BACKPACKING/CAMPING

It is labeled East Pocket on a map but known to locals as "The End of The World," the perfect nickname for this climactic viewpoint. Flagstaff sits upon a lofty plateau carpeted in high-elevation pine forest, but just south of town, the bottom drops out. Below a craggy rim of volcanic rock, the

land takes a precipitous plunge into an entirely different world of red rock and sandstone towers. This is the realm of Sedona, and End of The World overlooks all of it.

WHAT MAKES IT GREAT

It would be completely worth it to drive out here just to see the view and turn around, but the best experience is to pitch a tent at the End of the World and take it all in. There is no established campground, but this is national forest land that allows dispersed camping for free. Tall pines on the rim offer ample shade but open abruptly at the edge to reveal the stunning vista. On the relatively flat drive through the forest, you may start to doubt that you are approaching anything so dramatic. Just hang in there, and all of a sudden a break in the trees will reveal a glimpse of something entirely different.

The vantage is southward across Verde Valley. The rugged terrain directly below is the Red Rock-Secret Mountain Wilderness. Wilson Mountain rises out of this to the southeast and Sedona peeks out just behind it. Further out in the valley are the towns of Cornville, Cottonwood, and Clarkdale. The opposing mountains are the Black Hills, and lights of Jerome are visible on

their flanks at night. Staying after dark is definitely recommended, because sunsets from here are amazing as golden light slides along red rock cliffs.

WHO IS GOING TO LOVE IT

End of the World is a popular summer weekend getaway for the high school

and college-aged crowd, but there is still solitude to be found if you come during the week or choose one of the more marginal camping spots. There are several small clearings accessible from the main road that are suitable for setting up camp. Though the 23-mile dirt road seems long, it is passable for any car except when too wet, and this is still a very easy trip from Flagstaff. Come for one afternoon or for a whole weekend and enjoy one of Northern Arizona's many unexpected natural wonders.



Take Historic Route 66 west out of Flagstaff, then turn left on Woody Mountain Road. Follow this road, which turns to dirt, for about 23 miles. Do not take any side roads until you can see the

break in the trees to your right. This is the End of the World. Choose any of the pull-offs here to enjoy the view.

Camping is allowed with a 14-day limit. Fires are permitted except during explicit seasonal closures. Because this is an unmaintained public camping area, be sure to practice Leave No Trace ethics and thoroughly douse all fires. Woody Mountain Road is closed during winter.

AS HIS MEMORY FADES, VETERAN FINDS JOY IN BONDING WITH VOLUNTEER

Bright and early, every weekday morning before she heads to work, Meredith Bartlett shows up at her friend Larry's house. The Navy veteran is always waiting with a smile and a hug. Together, they take his dog for a walk around the neighborhood.

That little stroll is just a slice of Meredith's day, but it's everything to Larry.

After a serious fall a few months ago and increasing memory decline, the 75-year-old didn't feel safe venturing out alone anymore. Meredith helps him stay active and his wife Connie knows he's safe.

And it's all thanks to Legacy Corps, an AmeriCorps program. Through a partnership with Arizona State University and Hospice of the Valley, volunteers like Meredith are trained to support military veterans living with dementia.

"It's the most rewarding thing I've ever done," Meredith says with absolute sincerity, "helping someone who appreciates it so much. I look forward to seeing him every day. I'm his friend, but he's my friend too."

She takes Larry to doctor's appointments, the grocery store, post office or bank. The two often plan "adventures" to places like the Heard Museum, Desert Botanical Garden and the Penske Racing Museum. A few times they've made pasta, rolling the dough, pressing and cutting the noodles. The goal is to enjoy the day, whether it's a good or a difficult one.

"I don't know what I'd do without her," Larry confesses. "She's my guardian, she holds my hand. She puts up with an old guy who can't always think of the right words." A tear slips from his eyes as he continues. "It's magnificent and beautiful and very emotional for me. If she can't come, I really feel a day of loss."

Meredith's background is in speech pathology, "so I love the challenge of helping someone who may have difficulty communicating, as dementia patients often do," she says. "Larry is interesting and funny and entertaining. I wasn't expecting to be so full of joy doing this, but it's really wonderful."

Without these outings, Larry is pretty sure he'd be sitting in front of the television all day watching reruns.

"I look forward to the doorbell ringing and her coming in the door," he says.

"She's a very positive person. Life is sad sometimes, but learning how to laugh at it makes the sadness disappear. She understands me and it just makes my day."

These visits also improve quality of life for Connie, who is exhausted working two jobs and being Larry's caregiver. "Knowing he's happy and going places to have fun alleviates a lot of guilt and stress," she reflects. "It's such a godsend. Dementia is a family disease. Even though Larry's kids help us too, they work and have families of their own, so it takes a village. Meredith is part of our village."

As a single mom who works full time, Meredith admits it's not easy finding time to volunteer. "But it's so worth it," she says. "When you realize how much

your visits mean to someone who depends on you, and is so grateful for your time, it will change what you think is important and what you should make time for."

Hospice of the Valley is looking for more Legacy Corps volunteers to visit dementia patients in need of compassionate support. This program provides the volunteer with a monthly allowance and a college tuition award after a year of service, which may be passed on to a child or grandchild.



Two years ago, the State of California shut down all conferences in the state and we all went home after just two days. The rest of the USA followed soon after. It was exciting to be back among so many great authors in person.



Cara Black

THREE HOURS IN PARIS (2020)

In June of 1940, when Paris fell to the Nazis, Hitler spent a total of three hours in the City of Light—abruptly leaving, never to return. To this day, no one knows why.

Author Cara Black offers one explanation, with her Kate Rees, a young American marksman who has been recruited by British Intelligence to drop into Paris with a dangerous assignment: assassinate the Fuhrer. She is armed with a rifle, and vendetta, and fierce resolve, but no formal spy training. When Kate misses her mark and the plan unravels, she is on the run for her life, while wrestling with the suspicion that the whole operation was a set-up.




Why I'm reading – Black has encyclopedic knowledge of Paris (this is her 20th book set there), as well as WWII history and spy craft. I also love the idea of a Day of the Jackaltype female protagonist.

ABOVE THE BAY OF ANGELES (2020)

A single twist of fate puts a servant girl to work in Queen Victoria's royal kitchen.

Isabella Waverly only means to comfort the woman felled on a London Street. In her final dying moments, she thrusts a letter into Bella's hand. It's an offer of employment in the kitchens of Buckingham Palace, and everything the budding young chef desperately wants: an escape from the constrictions of her life as a lowly servant. In the stranger's stead, Bella can spread her wings.



Arriving as Helen Barton from Yorkshire, she pursues her passion for creating culinary delights to serve to the delighted Queen Victoria herself.

Best of all, she's been chosen to accompany the queen to Nice. What fortune! Until the threat of blackmail shadows Bella to the Riviera, and a member of the queen's retinue falls ill and dies.

Having prepared the royal guest's last meal, Bella is suspected of the poisonous crime. An investigation is sure to follow. Her charade will be over. And her new life will come crashing down—if it doesn't send her to the gallows.

Why I'm reading – I don't read much historical fiction, but this premise is so interesting. Rhys Bowen has written more than 40 novels, and is a Left Coast Crime winner, plus earning multiple Agatha and Maccavity Awards.



'The most exciting development in spy fiction since the Cold War.'





WHAT MAKES GOOD FRIDAY GOOD?

"Give Jesus your life.

He will give you better."



Steve Bowyer Pastor, Munds Park Community Church

I was never a bad kid. But I did my share of stuff that got me punished. My family believed in spanking. That may be where I learned to dance.

You know the routine. Either your

parents did it with you, or you did it with your kids. I would get in trouble, be sent to my room to think about it. Do not let anyone tell you thinking about it is as bad as getting it. My mom could do more with a hairbrush than just updo her hair.

Occasionally, there was no waiting for it. Whatever she had in her had was applied to my backside.

I think I turned out pretty normal. I guess you would have to ask my wife. I know my mom loved me and did not 'spare the rod and spoil the child.'

I learned there are consequences for bad behavior. Love and consequences go together.

As a kid, I thought that I would give anything to be able to do whatever I wanted; good, bad, or otherwise; knowing I would never get punished for the bad stuff. I appreciate it now. And looking back at the spankings, and the groundings, they were nothing, really. They hurt at the time. But compared to the trouble an adult can get into and the consequences that can follow, they were nothing.

Good Friday is the Friday before Easter Sunday. Why is Good Friday, good? There are two reasons.

"We all, like sheep, have gone astray. Each has turned to his own way." (Isaiah 53:6 and quoted by Paul in Romans 3:23)

The common denominator behind everything we do that God has told us not to, is our selfishness. We want what we want. We consider our options and choose the one that seems best for us.

I remember my kids, and my own attitudes when I was a kid, and I see this fundamental truth. No one taught me or my kids to be selfish. We came out that way. Then, as adults, if we do not do something about it, selfishness continues to be the primary consideration for what we do.

We all do it. Some do it worse than others. From time to time, we all turn to our own way. Even doing it only once violates the basic rule God gave us to consider others before ourselves as modeled by Jesus. And by breaking the rule we deserve to be punished.

> What makes Good Friday good? First, Jesus took the punishment we deserve for breaking a rule that God laid down for us. We all do it. We all deserve it. No, we do not deserve to be let off the hook. But Jesus did it for us.

"But He was pierced for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on


