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

THE NIGHT THE BUGLE WEPT

A Memorial Day Reflection

Based on true events, this story honors the creation of "Taps" through a blend of historical fact and respectful interpretation.

It was July, 1862. The Civil War had bled into its second summer, and Virginia's fields bore its weight. Smoke hung in the air, mingled with the scent of wet earth, blood, and gunpowder. Across the lines, both Union and Confederate soldiers lay in exhaustion, some wounded, others staring blankly into the heavy dusk, their thoughts turned to their distant homes.

At Harrison's Landing, along the banks of the James River, Union General Daniel Butterfield stood outside his tent, weary and thoughtful. The battle at Gaines' Mill had just passed. His men had fought hard, suffered much, and now silence blanketed the camp like a thick quilt, broken only by the murmurs of the wounded and the crackle of distant campfires.

Butterfield, a man known more for bravery than sentiment, felt the weight of his men's fatigue, and the unbearable truth that many who had marched with him were now buried under Virginia soil. He thought of the bugle call used to signal the end of the day, "Lights Out," a French tune passed down through military tradition, and found it wanting. Too sharp. Too formal. Too European. It didn't reflect the sorrow, the reverence, or the grace he believed should accompany the close of a soldier's day.

He called for his brigade bugler, Private Oliver Wilcox Norton.

Norton, just twenty-two, had already seen more death than a young man should. But his hands were steady, and his ear for music keen. Butterfield handed him a scrap of paper, ink still drying. On it were a few bars of melody, soft and slow. No words. Just notes.

"I want this played at the close of day," Butterfield said. "Nothing more."

Norton took the melody and worked it on his bugle that evening. It was not martial. It didn't call men to arms or signal command. It spoke gently, sadly, with a reverence that pierced more deeply than any shouted order.

That night, as the sun slipped beneath the horizon and the last of the crimson faded from the sky, Norton stood by his tent and played the tune.

Three notes in, the camp fell silent. Men who had been talking, or praying, or writing home, paused. The mournful, winding melody hung in the air like breath on cold glass.

They didn't know the name of the song. It didn't have one. It was just a goodbye. A soft prayer for the fallen. A promise that they would not be forgotten.

Within days, the melody passed through camps like wind through trees. Other buglers picked it up. Officers began requesting it for funerals. No orders were issued. No regulation changed. Yet somehow, from battlefield to battlefield, the tune spread, not with fanfare, but with a kind of sacred gravity that needed no explanation.

Later, it would be given a name, Taps. The word likely echoed an old tradition, the soft drum taps once used to signal the end of day in military camps.

Its origin was debated, as stories often are. Some romanticized it, adding legends of fallen sons, wounded soldiers, whispered goodbyes. But the truth, like the song itself, was simpler and quieter. It came not from a dramatic tale of death, but from a general's desire to honor his living men and those who no longer could hear the bugle's call.

Butterfield never sought recognition for composing it. He saw it as an offering. Something solemn and small, to carry the weight of the unsaid.

And the words we now associate with Taps, words often spoken silently in our heads as the tune plays, came later:

Day is done, gone the sun

From the lakes, from the hills, from the sky

All is well, safely rest

God is nigh.

When Taps plays, heads bow in a quiet remembrance.

Taps has echoed over the graves of unknown soldiers and generals alike. It has whispered through the silence of Arlington and sounded across the beaches of Normandy, the jungles of Vietnam, the sands of Iraq and Afghanistan. And every time, it asks the same thing: Remember.

Taps does not glorify war. It mourns. It honors. It tells us that someone's son, daughter, father, or friend gave everything. And now we must carry their memory, and understand that freedom is not free.

NEED TO KNOW

Attention Pinewood Residents!

The Pinewood Sanitary District is gearing up for a busy summer and wants to keep everyone informed about important activities and opportunities.

Jetting Operations Starting March 29, 2025, the District began jetting operations to clean and maintain our sewer systems. This high-pressure water process clears blockages and cleans pipes, as required by the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) and the Arizona Attorney General's office. The Consent Judgement document is available at www.PinewoodSanitary.com. The District must camera inspect every main line in Munds Park, which includes jetting before inspections to identify potential issues.

Residents must ensure clear access to all easements. Please keep easements free from debris, vehicles, and other items. Many easements are obstructed by fences, sheds, and other structures. Workers will attempt to minimize disruptions, but access through driveways, gates, and other entry points is required for inspections. Clearing obstructions and providing entry to easements will support efficiency and compliance with state requirements. The District appreciates your cooperation.

Odell Lift Station Construction for sewer main replacement and removal of the Odell lift station will start between May 19-23, 2025, and continue until completion. Expect trucks and construction equipment near the worksite.

Stay Informed and Involved The Pinewood Sanitary District values resident involvement and cooperation. Your participation is crucial for the success of our operations and community well-being. Board meetings are held on the 2nd Thursday of the month at 3 pm.

SLEDGEHAMMERS & HEART *Munds Park Celebrates a New Chapter for Fire Safety*

Under blue skies on May 2, 2025, the sound of cheers and the swing of sledgehammers marked more than just the start of construction—it signaled the beginning of a new era for the Pinewood Fire District.

The long-awaited groundbreaking for the new Pinewood Fire Station wasn't just about steel and cement. It was about community. Residents turned out in force—selling t-shirts, showing support, and celebrating the result of years of shared work, fundraising, and belief in what this station represents.

In his remarks at the ceremony, Fire Chief Josh Tope, reminded everyone that this building is more than just a facility—it's a promise. "Today, we break ground not just on a new fire station, but on a future rooted in readiness, resilience, and unity," he said. "When our community calls, we will answer."

That sense of purpose was echoed in every thank you the chief delivered—from the firefighters and fire board who stuck with the plan through thick and thin, to the Fire Auxiliary, whose tireless fundraising efforts have long backed the department. Whether through organizing tournaments or selling gear, the Auxiliary helped keep momentum alive.

Special thanks went to the Pinewood Country Club and Gary Pierce for donating the skate park property for the new station site, and to Cindi Eagleton and MBC Properties for helping house the fire crew during the transition. Contractors Willmeng Construction and Perlman & Associates were also recognized for their role in making the vision a reality.

But perhaps the most striking applause came for the community itself. Local businesses and families—including the Agee family, who raised over \$160,000—were honored for rallying around the cause. Their collective support helped push the station from drawing board to job site.

It was the voters, though, who made it official. The successful passing of the General Obligation Bond transformed community enthusiasm into action, and broke ground not just on a building, but on renewed trust in what can be done together.

As the dust rose from the first ceremonial swings, it was clear: Munds Park isn't just building a fire station—it's building a legacy.



FTC CRACKS DOWN ON HIDDEN FEES IN SHORT-TERM RENTALS

Short-term rental hosts—take note. A new Federal Trade Commission rule takes effect May 12 requiring full price transparency for listings on platforms like Airbnb and VRBO. The rule bans hidden fees and mandates that the total price (including all known fees) be displayed more prominently than any other pricing information in ads or listings.

Key takeaways for STR hosts:

- No more vague charges like “service” or “processing” fees.
- The total price must include cleaning, resort, or admin fees—anything a guest must pay.
- Taxes and optional add-ons can be excluded, but only if clearly disclosed before checkout.
- Bait-and-switch pricing or misrepresenting refund policies is prohibited.

Airbnb has already adjusted its display settings to meet the rule. Hosts on other platforms should act now to ensure compliance. Violations may result in penalties. For full details, visit [FTC.gov](https://www.ftc.gov).

Memorial Day kicks off more than summer. It kicks off fresh food season—ripe produce, real beef, and meals that start close to home.

Buying local means your fruits and vegetables are picked when they're ripe, not early to survive transport and storage. That's why they taste better. Fresh food should be fresh, not engineered for shelf life.

Local beef isn't run through a system of antibiotics, growth hormones, and chemical washes. It comes from animals raised at home with care, not speed. When you buy direct from a farmer or rancher, you're investing in clean food, healthy land, and a food system that values quality over volume.

So this Memorial Day, we invite you to buy local and treat yourself, freinds and family to honest and flavorful food. Here are five ways to support our farmers and ranchers—no greenwashing (fake eco-labels), no middlemen, just great food.

ONE Shop Farmers Markets

Local farmers markets aren't just quaint—they're lifelines. Every dollar spent at a farmers market keeps a grower in business and great food on your table. Even better? Fruits and vegetables that haven't been shipped across the country hold more flavor and more nutrients. The shorter the trip from harvest to plate, the better it is for your health and your tastebuds.

You know it's fresh when it's picked the same day. It snaps when you break it and needs nothing more than a pinch of salt. That's not just food; it's timing and care you can taste.

TWO Buy Beef from a Rancher, Not the Grocery Store

Most beef in the U.S. comes from massive commercial packers built for volume, not quality. Steaks, roasts, and ground beef are processed at high speed, treated for shelf life, and packaged to look fresh—even when they're not. Many cuts are gas-flushed for color, hauled across state lines, and labeled "Product of USA" even if the animal was raised elsewhere.

Buying direct is different. The beef comes from a single animal, raised with care and processed locally. It's not blended with thousands of other cows or rushed. It's personal. It's honest. And it tastes the way beef should.

Whether you're stocking your freezer with a quarter share or just picking up a few steaks, buying direct means you're choosing integrity over shortcuts—and getting meat with flavor that earns its place on the plate.

Ask for Local, by Name.

When you're standing under those fluorescent lights at the meat counter, don't be afraid to ask: Where was this beef raised? If the answer's vague, or worse, "I'm not sure," you've got a choice to make. Because buying local isn't just a feel-good gesture, it's a way to reclaim your plate. Choosing not to buy is a quiet protest against a system that treats beef like a lifeless product, packaged, pumped full of additives, and pushed through for profit. And the truth is, many people can't tell the difference, because we've been eating factory beef for so long, we've forgotten what good beef even tastes like.

But we don't have to settle. When you buy directly from local producers, you're doing more than feeding your family well. You're choosing food you can trust, flavor you can taste, and the ranchers who are working hard to raise cattle the right way. Factory beef is often bloated with fillers, hormones, and shortcuts designed to fatten cattle fast and keep older meat looking artificially good on the shelf. Real beef doesn't need tricks, it just needs time, care, and respect.

THREE Understand What's at Stake

Every time farmland is lost to development, that's one less acre growing food. It's not just open space disappearing. It's our ability to feed ourselves.

As Claudia Hauser put it: "Golf or food. Pick one." That's the reality. Land can only serve one purpose at a time. When we choose development over agriculture, we lose more than just scenery.

Supporting local farms and ranches means protecting land, water, and a way of life that's already stretched thin. This isn't about nostalgia. It's about necessity.

Without small, working farms, we don't have food security. We have a fragile system built for speed and volume, not quality or care.

FROM RANCH TO FLAME *The Ultimate Steak Lineup & The Best Grilling Tips*

This isn't just dinner. It's Memorial Day weekend. It's the sound of laughter off the deck rail, the smell of smoke curling through the pines, and the clink of cold drinks on a warm afternoon with family and good friends.

But it's also something more. It's the freedom to gather, to feast, to live fully, made possible by those who gave everything so we could.

A great steak belongs here. Not the kind sweating in plastic wrap under fluorescent lighting, but the kind raised with care. If you're going to grill, make it count. Shake hands with your butcher. Meet a local rancher. Pick out something worth the sizzle.

Here's our best picks, from most affordable and underrated to most premium and luxurious:

Flat Iron

Cut from the shoulder, this steak is affordable, juicy, and criminally underrated. With great marbling and a tender bite, it loves a hot grill and a cold beer.

T-Bone

Two steaks in one and shaped like a trophy. You get part tenderloin and part strip, and it wants nothing more than salt, fire, and your undivided attention.

Filet Mignon (Tenderloin)

So tender you could cut it with a sideways glance. It's lean, elegant, and perfect for those who love texture over fat.



Rib-Eye

The rock star of beef. Rich, fatty, flavorful. No sauce, no fuss, just a hot grill and a little salt. Watch for flare-ups—this one sizzles like a firecracker.

Cowboy Steak

Basically a rib-eye that hit the gym and kept the bone. It's dramatic. It's primal. It looks like something you'd see in a Clint Eastwood movie. Grill it, carve it, and let people applaud.

Porterhouse

The T-bone's older, more intimidating brother. This is steak with swagger. Big enough to share, but who says you have to?

Whether you're firing up a thick cowboy cut or going all-in on a porterhouse, the steak is only half the story. The rest comes down to how you treat it, from fridge to flame.

Prep Like A Pro

- Pull your meat out of the fridge an hour before cooking. Cold meat cooks unevenly, don't rush it.
- Trim fat down to about an eighth-inch, remove tough silverskin, and pat that steak dry.
- Season like you're on a mission. Salt generously at least 30 minutes ahead. Add pepper just before the grill. That's it. Anything more is window dressing.

Grill Like A Master

- Get those grates blazing hot for 15 minutes. Scrape 'em clean, oil them up.
- Set up a two-zone fire: one side scorching hot for searing, the other cooler for finishing.
- Sear your steak over direct heat. Give it a quarter turn to show off those grill marks, flip once, and move it to the cool zone to coast to perfection.

Know your temps:

- Rare: 120–125°F
- Medium-rare: 130–135°F
- Medium: 140–145°F

Pull it early. Carryover heat is real. Let it rest under a loose tent of foil before slicing.

Slice against the grain. Sprinkle with salt.

A Few Extra Moves If You Want a Legendary Steak

- Reverse sear thick cuts: slow roast first, sear last.
- Butter baste with thyme. It's worth it.

Great Meat Deserves Good Company

Get your sides from the local farmers market. Grilled corn. Fresh greens. Heirloom tomatoes that taste like summer. Let the beef be the star, but give it a red carpet to walk down.

Celebrate freedom with a fork in one hand and gratitude in the other this Memorial Day weekend.



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
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


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
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OUR AMERICAN FLAG

Long May it Wave

The “Stars and Stripes” is a powerful symbol of the United States, representing freedom, liberty, and the ideals upon which our nation was founded. Sometimes referred to as “Old Glory,” a moniker given to it in 1824 by merchant seaman, Captain William Driver, the flag originated with the Flag Resolution, adopted by Congress on June 14, 1777. However, most historians agree that the American flag—as a sovereign flag—did not occur until 1782.

In September 1814, Francis Scott Key witnessed British ships bombard Fort McHenry and wrote a poem that ultimately became our national anthem—The Star-Spangled Banner. The poem reflects that fact that our flag represents the enduring ideals of freedom, courage, and most importantly, resilience. Despite battles and struggles throughout the years, the flag continues to inspire a sense of courage and hope. It serves as a reminder of our nation’s past, present and future and evokes a strong sense of national identity and pride. Its unifying symbolism was noted by Adrian Cronauer who said, “Our flag is not just one of many political points of view. Rather, the flag is a symbol of our national unity.”

The thirteen red and white stripes stand for the thirteen original colonies, while the fifty white stars on a deep blue background represent the fifty states. Even the colors are significant. In 1782, the flag’s designer Charles Thomson, described the colors’ symbolism this way:

- Red: Symbolizes valor, courage, and the sacrifices made by those who fought for the nation.
- White: Represents purity, innocence, and the ideals of liberty and justice.
- Blue: Stands for loyalty, vigilance, perseverance, and justice, reflecting the nation’s commitment to these principles.

The embodiment of freedom and patriotism, the American Flag serves as a unifying emblem of strength and the shared history of the American people. For many of us the flag represents a more personal sense of

appreciation for those who have fought to ensure the safety of our Republic and its citizens. None of us should never lose sight of the fact that our American flag is also an acknowledgment of sacrifice and honor.

But sometimes the waving banner of our nation is no longer suitable for display and at that point they should be disposed of properly.

DO NOT ever throw the flag in the trash or recycle bin or use the flag for any purpose other than its intended display before retirement.

To respectfully dispose of an American flag, follow the guidelines listed in the U.S. Flag Code. (4 U.S. Code Chapter 1).

The flag should be retired with dignity. It should be destroyed in an honorable manner by burning it when it is no longer fit to be flown due to wear or damage.

According to the U.S. Flag Code, the flag should be properly folded and then burned in a clean hot fire until it is reduced to ash. Finally, dispose of the ashes by burying them or scattering them in a dignified location.

However, it’s not always possible to dispose of a tattered flag by burning it, especially in fire prone areas like ours. There are organizations, such as the American Legion, or Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), or Boy Scouts, that hold flag retirement ceremonies and will accept your worn flag for disposal.

Although the US Code says that burning is the preferred method to dispose of a flag, people also do so flag via burial. If you choose this, place a folded flag in a dignified wooden box and bury it.

A final option for disposing of an American Flag made from synthetic material, is to recycle it. Some slag companies will accept old flags and use the material to make new ones.

This Memorial Day, as we recognize those that gave their lives serving in the U.S. Military, take a moment to examine your flag. If it is faded, frayed or torn, it is time to retire that flag, dispose of it properly and replace it with a new Star-Spangled Banner.



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

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WINGS OVER ARIZONA

BABY BIRDS

Spring is nest-building and raising-young time for birds, and that all comes with some amount of peril for the parents and the babies. The parents must choose a safe place for the nest and ensure their young stay fed and in the nest until they are ready to fledge. Most bird parents will then still help the fledglings learn to hunt and seek shelter until they are capable on their own.

Finding a baby bird on the ground can be alarming, but knowing how to respond can make all the difference in keeping it safe. During spring and summer, fledglings—young birds learning to fly—often leave the nest before they're fully skilled, which can lead to confusion for well-meaning humans. Here's how to tell if a bird needs help and what you should do.

Step 1: Observe before acting: First, determine if the bird is a nestling or a fledgling. Nestlings are very young, often featherless or with only a few downy feathers and cannot survive outside the nest. Fledglings, on the other hand, are fully feathered and may hop on the ground as part of their natural development. If the bird is a fledgling, it's best to leave it alone and keep pets away. Its parents are likely nearby, continuing to feed and protect it as it learns essential survival skills.

Step 2: Return nestlings to the nest: If the bird is a nestling, it does need help. Look for the nest in nearby trees or shrubs. If you find it, gently pick up the bird and place it back in the nest. Contrary to myth, birds do not abandon babies that have been touched by humans. If the nest is unreachable or destroyed, create a makeshift nest using a small basket or container lined with soft tissue and place it in a safe, shaded area near where the bird was found. Observe from a distance—if the parents return, there is a high chance of success.

Step 3: Contact a wildlife rehabilitator: If the baby bird is injured, cold, or the parents don't return within an hour or two, it's time to call a licensed wildlife rehabilitator and then follow their advice. Do not attempt to care for the bird yourself, as improper handling can cause harm. Fallen Feathers (Peoria), Liberty Wildlife (Phoenix), and Runnin' with Wildlife Rehab Center (Verde Valley) are excellent wildlife rehabilitators.

I've had reports of nesting nuthatches, chickadees, bluebirds, swallows, and warblers – and I'm sure there is activity from many other northern Arizona species. The birds are doing their best to brave the elements, ward off predators, find food, and raise another generation of these critical animals of our shared earth.

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GARDENS IN THE PARK

PROTECTING YOUR GARDEN FROM SPRING FROSTS

As spring settles in and the winds ease up, it's a joy to see your vegetable garden come to life, with leaves unfurling and future harvests just beginning to take shape. But don't let those rising spring temperatures fool you - late spring frosts can still pose a serious threat to young plants.

Fortunately, cool-season vegetables like peas, kale, spinach, cabbage, carrots, radishes, broccoli, and scallions are built to handle Flagstaff's unpredictable weather. These frost-hardy favorites can roll with the punches of a chilly night.

For warm-season crops like tomatoes, eggplants, cucumbers, or melons, however, you'll need to plan ahead. These heat-loving plants just don't do well in the cold, and here in northern Arizona, frosts can sneak in as late as mid-June. Waiting until then to plant means your growing window might be too short for a fruitful harvest.

The good news? With a few smart strategies, you can protect your warm-season veggies and give them the head start they need.

1. Stay Frost-Aware

Keep a close eye on your local forecast, especially during those transition weeks in late spring. Weather can change quickly, so it pays to be proactive. At Warner's Nursery, we provide frost alert text messages for just this reason - ask us how to sign up and get notified before your plants get nipped.

2. Choose the Right Varieties

Some vegetable varieties are bred specifically for shorter growing seasons. Look for fast-maturing hybrids, particularly in tomatoes, that will thrive in our cooler climate and shorter summers.

3. Pick the Perfect Spot

Raised beds are a great option for northern Arizona gardens. They warm up more quickly in spring, which helps young plants establish faster. Adding organic mulch can also make a big difference—mulch acts like a natural blanket, helping regulate soil temperature and retaining moisture.

4. Use Season Extenders

Protective tools like water-filled plant protectors (commonly known as "walls of water") are a game-changer. They store heat during the day and release it at night, creating a cozy microclimate for your plants. Plus, they help warm the soil - essential for strong root development.

5. Go DIY for Extra Protection

If you're handy, you can build your own mini-greenhouses using PVC pipe and clear plastic sheeting. Create a simple frame, drape it with plastic at night, and remove it during the day to let your plants breathe and soak in the sun.



6. Quick Frost Fixes

Caught off guard? Lightweight blankets, sheets, or even row covers can provide overnight frost protection in a pinch. Just be sure to remove them in the morning so your plants don't overheat.

7. Water Wisely

Moist soil retains heat better than dry soil, so watering your garden ahead of a frost can help buffer your plants from cold stress. Just avoid overwatering, as saturated soil can freeze and damage the roots.

Growing warm-season vegetables in northern Arizona definitely requires a little extra care—but the reward is so worth it.

That first bite of a juicy homegrown tomato or crisp cucumber will remind you why you took the time to protect your garden from spring's final frosts.





EXPLORING THE MAGIC OF ANTELOPE CANYON

A Journey Through Northern Arizona's Natural Wonder

On a recent trip to Page, Arizona, we were immersed in some of the most breathtaking landscapes.

It was our first visit, and the beauty of the area left us in awe. We spent a few days exploring, and one place stood out above all: Antelope Canyon.

Located just outside the city of Page, Antelope Canyon is a photographer's dream and a natural marvel that's hard to describe in words alone.

These shafts of light transform the canyon into a living, breathing piece of art. Standing there, with sunlight cascading down onto the smooth red rock, felt almost otherworldly.





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WHAT TO DO IF YOU SEE A RATTLESNAKE

Tips from Arizona Game & Fish

So you've spotted a rattlesnake. Take a breath. This isn't a showdown. Here's what matters most: rattlesnakes don't want a fight. If you give them space, they'll usually slither off without incident. The problem comes when people panic, grab a weapon, or try to play hero. Don't.

STEP 1: Stay Calm & Step Back

If the snake isn't coiled, rattling, or moving toward you, it's not in strike mode. Back away slowly. Sudden movements make things worse. No yelling, no stomping.

STEP 2: Don't Try to Kill It

Most bites happen when people try to kill or handle the snake. In Arizona, it's also illegal to kill native wildlife without a legitimate reason. So unless the snake is cornered in your home or attacking your dog, step aside and let it move on.

Bonus: many snake sightings are actually harmless bull snakes, which look similar but help control rodent populations, do not kill them.

STEP 3: Make Your Yard Boring

Snakes are there for one reason: food. That means mice, rats, or other small prey. If you don't want snakes, remove what attracts them.

- Keep grass trimmed short.
- Store firewood away from the house.
- Don't leave birdseed or pet food outside.
- Seal holes or gaps around your home's foundation.

STEP 4: Use a Flashlight at Night

Warm evenings are prime rattlesnake hours. If you're walking the dog, taking out the trash, or heading to a campsite, carry a light. You can't avoid what you can't see.

STEP 5: Stick to Trails

When hiking or walking outdoors, stay on marked paths. Snakes tend to avoid high-traffic areas but love quiet corners, tall grass, and rocky outcrops. Watch where you step and never reach blindly into brush, woodpiles, or under rocks.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU'RE BITTEN

It's serious, but survival rates are very high, especially if you follow these steps:

- Call 911 immediately. Don't wait to see how it goes.
- Stay calm. Panic increases heart rate, which spreads venom faster.
- Keep the bite lower than your heart. Immobilize the limb if possible.
- Remove rings, watches, or tight clothing near the bite area before swelling begins.
- Do not apply ice, cut the wound, use a tourniquet, or shock yourself with electricity. All of that is outdated and dangerous.

The goal is to get medical help as fast and safely as possible. Don't drive yourself if you can avoid it.

WHO TO CALL FOR SNAKE REMOVAL

Flagstaff Wildlife Control

Joe is a licensed wildlife expert who handles snake removals and other animal encounters around Munds Park. He's local, experienced, and gave out his personal number for a reason.

Leaving a rattlesnake alone can significantly reduce the risk of being bitten. In fact, more than half of all rattlesnake bites are provoked by the person who was bitten.



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
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
