Join Us at Our Monthly Board Meetings

We value your input and encourage all residents to participate in our decision-making process. Board meetings are held on the second Thursday of each month at 3:00 PM, and the public is warmly invited to attend. These meetings provide an opportunity to stay informed about current projects and ask questions during the Call to the Public. Your voice matters, and we welcome your attendance.

RV Hookups

Pinewood Sanitary District would like to remind everyone, especially visiting families and RV owners, hooking up RVs to residential cleanouts is prohibited. We appreciate your assistance and compliance.

Public Utility Easements

Contractors and non-contractors are prohibited from obstructing Public Utility Easements (PUE) with permanent structures. Before any work begins, they must call 811 and establish BlueStake notifications to ensure all underground utilities are properly identified. Additionally, permission must be obtained from all utility providers before utilizing or accessing PUE. Failure to comply with these requirements can result in safety hazards, service disruptions, and legal liability.

Utility Easement Access Required

All utility easements must always remain accessible, as PSD will be conducting essential repairs prioritized from the most severe issues to the least. Before work begins, we will make every effort to notify affected customers in advance; however, schedules may change as existing problems worsen and require immediate attention. While PSD will strive to provide notice whenever possible, advance notification is not guaranteed because these easements exist to ensure public safety and maintain continuity throughout PSD's collection system.

Important: If PSD is required to remove any obstructions to access easements for PSD lines and equipment, the homeowner(s) will be responsible for any associated costs. In some cases, costs may be shared between neighbors on both sides of the utility easement, depending on the specific situation.



COUNTY SHARES MUNDS PARK EARLY FLOOD-MITIGATION PLANS

Coconino County Flood Control District officials met with Munds Park residents on November 12, 2025, to explain the initial steps of a long-term plan that could alter how future storms impact the community. The meeting focused on two possible projects: a flood-retarding structure near Frog Tank and a smaller drainage improvement project near the Pinewood Blvd. bridge. Both ideas are at the very beginning of the planning process. Before anything can move forward, the Flood Control District must determine technical feasibility and then conduct comprehensive engineering studies, obtain federal approval, and meet stringent legal and financial requirements.

Why Munds Park Needs Major Flood Solutions

Flood Control District Administrator Lucinda Andreani and hydrologic engineer Scott Ogden from JE Fuller Hydrology explained that Munds Park has one of the highest flood risks in the county. The watershed that drains into the community covers about 45 square miles.

Updated modeling and real-world data from recent storms show that Munds Park is especially vulnerable during winter rain-on-snow events. When rain falls on snow or frozen ground, the water cannot soak in. Everything runs off at once. In 2019, this combination resulted in a sharp increase in flows through the wash, which closely matched the District's flood model. That match confirmed that the current model is accurate and reliable.

Why Earlier Solutions Did Not Work

A popular idea in earlier planning was to enlarge the natural channel that passes under the bridge over Interstate 17 near the golf course. The goal was to move water more efficiently out of Munds Park. However, updated modeling showed that opening up this natural channel would push higher flows into Munds Canyon and raise water levels for downstream property owners along Oak Creek. That type of result is considered an adverse impact, which is not allowed under floodplain rules or case law. Because of that, the District did not pursue that alternative at that time.

Possible Flood-Control Dam at Frog Tank

Ogden explained a new idea that could make a big difference for Munds Park. The District is considering building a flood mitigation structure near Frog Tank that functions similarly to a dam, but without a lake. Under normal weather, it would sit there empty. During a big storm, it would briefly hold back part of the floodwater, and then meter out the floodwater over a period of time reducing the impacts downstream.

Think of it as a safety valve. Instead of every drop rushing into Munds Park at once, the structure would take the punch out of the flood. During a big storm, the structure would hold some of the water in the open forest behind it for a short time, then let it drain out naturally after the storm passes.

Very early modeling indicates that this single structure could reduce peak flood flows by approximately half. Such a reduction could prevent Interstate 17 from overtopping, reduce the size of the floodplain in several areas, and make future improvements possible without increasing flooding for people who live downstream near Oak Creek.

The District would need to secure approval from the U.S. Forest Service and fortunately the District has developed a positive strong relationship with the Coconino National Forest given all the post-wildfire flood mitigation that has occurred west and north of Flagstaff. However, if the project is not approved, then it would not move forward to construction. At this time, the project is at a conceptual level and the next step is securing the funding to conduct a Phase 1 Engineering Study to determine minimally the technical feasibility of the proposed flood mitigation structure. Ultimately to be constructed, engineering would need to be completed and funding secured. All projects must be technically, financially, legally and environmentally feasible.

The price will depend on engineering, soil testing, environmental review, and approval from the Forest Service. Very early cost estimates range from \$ 30 to \$ 50 million, but the District will not know the actual number until the engineering is at a 60% level.

A Smaller Project With Immediate Potential

Ogden also described a much smaller project at the Pinewood Blvd. bridge. During storms larger than about a 10-year event, water leaves the main wash through a low spot and floods streets before entering Odell Lake. A short containment berm could keep flows in the wash and remove several properties from the floodplain. This improvement appears feasible within the existing right-of-way and does not depend on the larger Frog Tank project. It is one of the few near-term options with a clear benefit, but solely for a limited number of properties.

Concerns About I-17 & Sanitation Risks

One resident asked what happens when a major flood pushes water toward Interstate 17. Ogden explained that Interstate 17 is a major transportation route for the region. When the highway closes, it disrupts travel, commerce, emergency response, and the movement of hazardous materials. Because of this, the District must consider Interstate 17 a top priority when studying long-term flood solutions. The District also plans to work with the Arizona Department of Transportation through the entire engineering process and when it reaches the stage of pursuing funding.

Ogden also addressed concerns about the Pinewood Sanitary District. He explained that the Sanitary District's wastewater lagoons can be threatened during very large storms. A storm similar to the major 2004 event, which is considered about a 50-year flood, can push floodwater toward the lagoon system. Stormwater also enters the system through leaking manholes during heavy rain, which increases the amount of wastewater the Sanitary District must manage during a flood. The next phase of engineering would include evaluating the positive impacts of the potential projects identified relative to the wastewater treatment plant. Benefits to the plant may also align for potential federal and state funding sources.

What Happens Next

Before anything can be built, the District must complete a full feasibility study. This study will confirm whether the concepts are technically sound, legally acceptable, and cost-effective under federal rules. It will also determine whether the Forest Service would allow a project on its land.

The study and early engineering design are expected to cost between 1 million and 1.5 million dollars, depending on how many projects move forward.

Why This Matters


Munds Park sits at the bottom of a large watershed. Winter storms are not going away. The District now has better data, clearer models, and a few early ideas that may offer real mitigation, but the process is complex and long. Residents can contact the Coconino County Flood Control District for more information. Public involvement will matter as the planning moves forward.



GINGERBREAD TRIFLE

BY NINA KNEADS TO BAKE



The kitchen is where the Christmas season begins, the place where preparations for celebrating with family and friends take shape. The steady warmth from the oven warms the house and everyone in it, and the scent of ginger and cinnamon fills the air, announcing the season as clearly as the wreath on the door.

What makes these moments settle into fond memories isn't the food. It's the people nearby, whether friends, family, or both. Children climb onto stools for a better view and sneak a taste. Friends find their way to the counter with the quiet ease

that comes from shared holidays, and the room fills with the gentle cheer that only Christmas brings.

Cooking together has a way of slowing the world down. You pass a spoon across the counter. You steady a measuring cup for a younger hand. You talk about nothing in particular while the scent of warm spice builds. It isn't about getting things perfect. It's about being side by side long enough for the spirit of the season to quiet us, slow us down if we let it, and enjoy those around us.

These simple hours tend to become the ones people remember. Not the gifts. The moments in the kitchen where everyone found something to do and felt welcome doing it.

So this year, let the kitchen earn its place. Turn on the music. Let the air fill with the good smells of the season. Invite your people into the work, even if it gets a little messy. The food will be finished soon enough. The memories will stretch a lot farther.

This gingerbread trifle is layered with moist gingerbread cake, homemade caramel sauce, and whipped gingerbread cream cheese filling. Perfect for a crowd during the holiday season!

Ingredients

Gingerbread Cake

- 3 cups all purpose flour
- 1½ teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 11/2 tablespoons ground ginger
- 1½ teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 3/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 cup unsalted butter room temperature
- 11/2 cups light brown sugar packed
- 3 large eggs room temperature
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3/4 cup molasses
- 1 cup whole milk room temperature

Whipped Gingerbread Cream Cheese Filling

- 16 ounces cream cheese room temperature
- ³/₄ cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 2 tablespoons molasses
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 1 cup heavy whipping cream

Caramel Sauce

- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 5 tablespoons unsalted butter cold
- ½ cup heavy whipping cream cold
- ½ teaspoon salt

Instructions

Gingerbread Cake

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F (177°C). Grease two 9 inch round cake pans, and line the bottoms with parchment paper.
- 2. Whisk flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, ginger, cinnamon, nutmeg, and cloves together in a medium sized bowl.
- 3. In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar together until fluffy and lightened in color, about 3 minutes. Add eggs, vanilla, and molasses. Mix until well combined.
- 4. Add in milk and dry ingredients alternatively starting and ending with flour (3 additions of dry ingredients, 2 of milk).
- 5. Pour batter evenly into the prepared pans. Bake for 23-28 minutes, or until toothpicks inserted in the center of the cakes come out clean. Let cool on a wire rack for 5 minutes, and then turn cakes out of pans and let them cool completely on a wire rack.

Whipped Gingerbread Cream Cheese Filling

- 1. In a large bowl, beat cream cheese and sugar until well combined. Add ginger, cinnamon, cloves, molasses, and milk. Mix until well combined.
- 2. Whip heavy whipping cream in a medium bowl, until stiff peaks form. Fold half the whipping cream into cream cheese mixture. Gently fold in remaining whipping cream. Chill in the refrigerator until ready to use.

Caramel Sauce

- 1. In a heavy bottomed saucepan, heat sugar over medium heat until melted, stirring constantly.
- 2. Once melted, immediately remove from heat and stir in butter and heavy whipping cream. The mixture will violently bubble.
- The caramel will stop bubbling when the ingredients are well combined. Stir in salt and pour caramel into a small bowl to cool completely before using.

Assemble

Cut gingerbread cake into 1 inch square cubes. Place a layer of cubes in the bottom of trifle dish. Drizzle ¼ of the caramel over cake, and then place a layer of whipped cream cheese over the cake and caramel.

Repeat 2 more times and finish with a layer of whipped cream cheese and a drizzle of caramel over the top.

Cover trifle and place in refrigerator for at least 4 hours or overnight. The trifle needs time to settle and for the flavors to marry. Decorate with gingerbread men before serving, if desired.

AT THE EDGE OF TOWN

Tim Smith & His Daughter Zoe's Vision for Munds Park's Front Door

When you pull off I-17 into Munds Park, you pass a stretch of land that looks, at first glance, like any other commercial edge along a highway. Gravel, trees, a wash cutting through it, and construction and movement of earth that will soon reveal itself.

For Tim Smith and his daughter Zoe, that 26-acre parcel west of Munds Park, south of Agee's, is not just another stretch of interstate frontage property. It is the land they have been quietly shaping, and the spot where they believe Munds Park could gain both practical storage and something it has never quite had: a shared, thoughtfully planned front porch.

Tim bought the land around 1999. He has made a living as a builder and developer, and he likes to joke that floodplains have followed him from job to job. This one is no different. The maps have shifted twice since he closed on the ground, so every shovel of dirt is tested against charts and elevations.

"It looks simple when you drive by," he said, "but there is a lot going on under the surface."

Tim believes that shift could quietly improve the look of Munds Park neighborhoods.

"If we can move some of the bigger units out of side yards and shared driveways and into a lot that functions well, it cleans up the streets," he said. "That feels like a win for everybody."

Respecting the Floodplain

When construction equipment rolled in and trees started coming down, many in the community wondered what was happening along the wash. Tim says the changes were part of a calculated plan to follow floodplain regulations and improve water flow, not disrupt it.

According to county flood rules, a landowner can raise ground in one area only if they remove the same amount of soil from another. This ensures the wash still has the capacity to carry stormwater during heavy rains. On this property, that meant digging out one section of the floodplain so another section, where the RV storage pad will go, could be built up without increasing flood risk.

"It's basically a trade," Tim explained. "We remove material from one spot to deepen the channel, and that allows us to raise another area while keeping the water flow the same."

The elevated pad, he said, remains about a foot below the mapped flood level and should safely accommodate RVs without affecting nearby properties. As for the trees that were removed, Tim clarified that they were located outside the official flood zone and were cleared only as part of the necessary grading work.

"I get why people are concerned when they see trees come out," he said. "But in this case, it was done carefully and by the book. The goal is to manage water properly, not push it into someone else's yard."

The First Phase: RV & Toy Storage

The only part of the long-term vision currently underway is an RV and toy storage facility at the back of the property. The plan is to start with open-air spaces, then add enclosed storage buildings as demand grows. Around 200 spaces are included in the initial layout, though that number may shift based on what the community needs. The Smiths hope to open the facility in early 2026 and will share updates through the Pinewood News. Reservations are already being accepted. See the ad on page 14 for contact information.

The storage facility is not designed to be a field of exposed rigs. A seven-foot perimeter fence of corrugated metal and expanded wire surrounds the space, offering a clean, modern appearance. The entire facility will be gated, with keypad access, security cameras, and operating hours generally set from morning into early evening.

Lighting is a frequent concern in a dark-sky community, and Tim has made it a priority from the start. The planned fixtures follow Flagstaff's dark-sky standards, using low-mounted, amber-colored lights that reduce glare and limit skyglow. Only a small number of poles will be installed, just enough to ensure safety and visibility without flooding the area with light. The goal is to protect the night sky, not light up the forest.

"We do not need to light this up like a shopping center," he said. "We just need to see who is there and keep it safe at night."

When the Smiths first drew up the concept, they pictured Phoenix area residents storing their rigs here instead of dragging them up and down the hill every weekend. Early phone calls and inquiries have surprised them.

"So far the interest seems to be right across the street," Zoe said. "A lot of Munds Park residents are tired of losing their carport or garage to a fifth wheel all summer."

Some of the calls have come from owners of high-end diesel coaches who want a secure, screened home for their investment. Others are simply looking for a place to park an extra vehicle so the driveway is usable again.

Exploring Options for a Shared Community Space

Ask Tim what comes after the storage yard, and he doesn't pull out a glossy master plan. He talks instead in sketches and "what ifs."

Standing on the open ground near the highway, Tim gestures toward a natural bowl formed by the wash and grading work, with a tree-lined slope rising behind it. "This could be an amphitheater one day," he said. "Stage at the bottom, trees as the backdrop. Movies, music, community events. It's already shaped for it."

Then the conversation turns to food.

This year he planted his first real garden on the hill above, just to see what would happen. Pumpkins sprawled. Vegetables came in faster than his family could eat them. Friends went home with armloads.

"I have never gardened in my life," he admitted. "We still ended up with more than we needed. It felt like something we should offer the community."

The Smiths imagine a community garden where locals can reserve plots, share water, and grow food together. Nearby, the flat open space could host a farmers' market with real parking, rather than vendors

setting up in improvised lots. They are clear about one thing: they do not want to run the market themselves.

"We know enough to know what we do not know," Zoe said. "There are already people in the region who run true farmers' markets with real produce and quality vendors. We would rather work with someone like that and focus on being good land stewards."

Over time, Tim can see the strip becoming a small-town center of sorts. A café that serves local food. A place for yoga classes. Shared paths that connect to the forest instead of random cuts through fences.

"What Munds Park does not really have right now is a common meeting place that feels like the heart of town," he said. "We have the room here to try to build something like that if people want it."

They are big fans of models that already exist nearby: a Rimrock shop that roasts its own coffee and stocks local eggs, produce, and prepared foods; Camp Verde farms that sell directly to families; and the growing number of restaurants in the region that focus on fresh, lighter meals.

"Munds Park is full of people who hike, bike, and want to feel good," Zoe said. "The land here could support that kind of lifestyle in a practical way."

Respecting the Land & Setting Boundaries

Owning a wide-open parcel next to the woods comes with its own troubles. Over the years, drivers of off-road vehicles have cut locks, sliced fences, and even driven over gates to reach the forest illegally. They tear up the ground and let cattle out. They break things because they want a shortcut.

That history shapes how the Smiths think about their space. If they add gardens or markets, they will likely create pedestrian entrances or turnstiles to keep vehicles out.

"We want people to enjoy this place," Zoe said, "but we have to protect it too. There is a balance between open and overrun."

Shared Easement, Shared Frustrations

There is an old easement running in front of the Chevron, Agee's (now no longer in business), and neighboring parcels. You cannot talk about this land without touching it.

According to documents Tim has reviewed with his attorney, a 50 to 60-foot-wide ingress and egress easement was created decades ago to guarantee access across the frontage to several parcels and to public utilities. It runs parallel to the highway and includes the strip where Agee's and Chevron customers often park.

For many years, that easement functioned quietly in the background. As businesses grew busier and Munds Park saw more visitors, the same strip began filling with cars and trucks. When Tim leased part of his land to a construction company during the interstate project, their heavy rigs sometimes could not get through. Utility vehicles faced the same squeeze.

From Tim's point of view, that turned a legal access question into a safety concern. He says he asked that parking be pulled back, that "no parking" signs be posted along the easement, and that he even offered to lease a portion of his own property as a fenced seasonal parking area for Agee's and their customers. The offer, he says, was declined by the property's owner, representative.

Meanwhile, petitions have circulated in the community in support of continued parking near the restaurant, and many residents understandably worry about what changes to that strip could mean for a local business they enjoy. As of this writing, the legal questions about how the easement can be used and by whom are being handled by attorneys. The Smiths say their goal is to secure clear access for their land, their tenants, and utility providers, while leaving room for nearby businesses to find workable parking solutions on land outside the access corridor.

Looking Ahead

For now, what is actually happening on the ground is straightforward. RV and toy storage will come first. Munds Park residents will have one more option to store their rig currently occupying the carport.

The rest is still a conversation.

Community gardens. A farmers' market with real parking. Maybe an amphitheater. Maybe a handful of small local businesses. None of it moves forward without partners and neighbors. None of it works without people who want open space, good food, and a place to gather.

"This place has a lot of potential," Zoe said. "If we do it right, it can become something that serves the whole community. A place for people to come together, enjoy good food, connect with neighbors, and enjoy themselves. That is our hope."

Snow had arrived overnight and did what snow always does in Munds Park: it made everything quiet enough that you could hear yourself think, which Donovan found both pleasant and mildly unfamiliar in our noisy world.

Donovan was on his way to visit Peanut, the woodland mouse who lived near the old pine, when he noticed something odd. A soft glow flickered near the old oak tree, warm and golden, and definitely not coming from anything he'd misplaced. Donovan had once lost a library book for three whole days, so he knew the signs.

When he reached the tree, he found a bright lantern hanging

from a limb. A note dangled from its handle.

For whomever needs a bit of light this Christmas Eve.

"Well," Donovan said, "that sounds like everybody."

He took the lantern and hurried to Peanut's house, which took longer than expected because he walked carefully—the sort of careful reserved for breakable things, especially when you're headed toward a mouse who worries easily.

Peanut opened the door. "Donovan! You're glowing."

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A Champagne cork pops and suddenly the room feels brighter. Its backstory is just as lively, with a monk, an Englishman, a scattering of royals, and winters so cold politicians kept their hands in their own pockets. Pour a flute and let's see how the bubbles began.

A Cold Problem Creates Bubbles

The Champagne region of France became the unlikely birthplace of the world's most famous bubbles. Back in the 1600s, winemakers were making still wine, and the region's icy winters kept sabotaging their efforts. The cold temperatures would halt fermentation and push the yeast into dormancy. Once spring arrived and the bottles warmed up, the yeast restarted its work, creating a second fermentation, and trapped carbon dioxide inside. Suddenly, there were bubbles.

Help From Across the Channel

The English were unintentionally pushing Champagne toward greatness. In 1662, scientist Christopher Merrett recorded how sugar could be added to encourage a second fermentation. It was the first known written explanation of deliberate sparkling winemaking. English glassmakers were also producing bottles with coalfired furnaces, which made the glass far stronger than anything produced in France. Those sturdier bottles kept the wine from exploding during secondary fermentation. Without these advances, Champagne might have remained a regional curiosity.

By the 1700s, sparkling Champagne moved from accident to obsession. French aristocrats prized the drink, and Madame de Pompadour, the mistress of King Louis XV, was one of its most famous fans. She supposedly said, "Champagne is the only drink that leaves a woman beautiful after

drinking it." The wine soon spread throughout royal courts in Europe and became a symbol of celebration, sophistication, and status.

Protecting the Name

With popularity came imitators. By the 19th century, sparkling wines from all over the world tried to pass themselves off as Champagne. Producers in the actual Champagne region refused to let that slide. The French government stepped in to protect the name. If the wine did not come from the Champagne region, it could not use the name. That rule still stands under strict international agreements.

A Story in Every Sip

Today, Champagne is not reserved for royalty. It appears at weddings, birthdays, quiet achievements, and celebrations. People reach for it when life feels big and quiet moments worth celebrating. Each bottle carries centuries of discovery, effort, and craftsmanship.

Not Everyone Was Thrilled

At first, winemakers saw it as a problem, and they had a point. Bottles were exploding because the pressure kept building, and cellars became dangerous. Still, this "flawed" wine had fans, especially across the English Channel.

Dom Pérignon's Real Role

The famous story says Dom Pérignon invented sparkling wine and shouted, "Come quickly, I am tasting the stars." It is a great line, but history gives the credit elsewhere. Dom Pérignon did not invent sparkling wine. What he contributed was technique. He perfected grape blending, improved clarity, and worked tirelessly to stop bottles from bursting. His influence shaped the quality of Champagne, even if he was not the father of the fizz.

COASTAL CALM & IRISH CHARM AT SHANDON HOTEL & SPA

A rejuvenating retreat on Donegal's Wild Atlantic Way offers soulful spa rituals, breathtaking scenery and warm local hospitality.

If you ever dream of escaping to a place where nature calms your spirit and spa days unfold like poetry, then follow me to the quiet edges of County Donegal, Ireland. Tucked along a rugged sweep of coastline on the Wild Atlantic Way, the Shandon Hotel & Spa is a coastal hideaway where green hills roll into the sea, rainbows arrive on schedule and the pace of life slows to a kindhearted Irish rhythm.

I discovered this restorative refuge during a recent trip to Ireland's far northwest—one of the country's most remote and least-visited regions. Although Donegal has earned accolades as one of the world's most beautiful coastal destinations, it remains delightfully uncrowded. Even better, Shandon Hotel & Spa is still something of a local secret. Northern Irish women have quietly claimed this 4-star retreat as their sisterhood sanctuary for years, slipping away for spa weekends and celebratory getaways. Visiting Americans? Rare. Which makes the cultural experience not just authentic-but heartwarming.

My stay began before dawn on a calm Irish morning. I woke in my spacious Executive Suite to a blush of light rising over Sheephaven Bay. As the sun climbed, the water shifted from pewter to gold, reflecting

soft ripples against the grassy hills. Wrapped in a cotton robe, I brewed a French press coffee and settled by the picture window to watch the day arrive.

A hearty Irish breakfast set the tone for the day ahead—fluffy eggs, rashers of bacon, brown bread thick with Irish butter and servers who chatted like old friends. Then it was time for what Shandon does best: soul-soothing spa rituals.

Shandon Spa is housed in a separate stone building above the sea. Its floor-to-ceiling windows frame scenes of sheep grazing on nearby pastures, giving guests the sense of sinking into the rhythms of rural Irish life. Before my treatment, I sipped tea in the relaxation lounge, letting the view do its quiet work.

Warm lamplight and the scent of essential oils welcomed me into the treatment room, where my therapist's steady pace and gentle method seemed designed to unravel every tight muscle from shoulders to toes. Afterward, I drifted back to the lounge, loose and luminous. A spa attendant appeared to escort me to a private outdoor soaking tub

overlooking the countryside. "Prosecco or orange juice?" she asked. I chose bubbles. The Irish way, I've learned, often leads to celebration.

Shandon's thermal suite invites lingering. Indoors are a hydrotherapy pool, sauna, salt room and heated tile loungers reminiscent of a Hammam. Outside, a communal wooden hot tub sits on a terrace high above the coastline. Just steps away, an icy plunge pool dares you to be bold. I took the plunge. My shriek echoed, but my spirit felt wildly alive.

The beauty of basing yourself at Shandon is how easily it connects you to Donegal's natural wonders. A scenic coastal drive took our group to Horn Head Cliffs, where massive sea stacks and dramatic drop-offs form one of Ireland's most cinematic panoramas. Another day, we toured the Crolly Distillery, home to handcrafted whiskey and a fascinating tale of Donegal resilience. Glenveagh National Park, with its castle, formal gardens and mountainous trails, made for a perfect final-day pilgrimage.

But the moment that stitched Donegal into my heart happened not on a cliff or in a spa, but inside the hotel ballroom.

Shandon hosts monthly dinner-theater nights—lively events where locals arrive in busloads, dressed to sparkle and ready for fun. The performance during my stay was "ABBA Sensation," and by the time "Dancing Queen" filled the room, we were all on our feet. I found myself swept into a circle of Donegal women who sang, laughed and welcomed me as if I were one of their own. Later came "Rock the Boat," a beloved Irish wedding tradition involving synchronized seated dancing that defies adequate explanation. You have to see it. Better yet, you have to join in.

Travel, at its best, draws you closer to the soul of a place. At Shandon Hotel & Spa, that soul feels unmistakably Irish—warm, generous and full of joyful mischief.

As I packed to leave, I paused again at the window. Another rainbow—Donegal's parting gift—arched over the coastline. I took a deep breath and let thankfulness sink in. For the spa treatments that restored me. For the landscapes that humbled me. For the people who folded me into their laughter. And for the reminder that sometimes the most meaningful journeys are the ones we didn't know we needed.

If you're considering a winter escape, let the wild beauty of Donegal be your balm. And if you go, give yourself over to the spa, the sea air, the slow mornings and the music that inevitably pulls you into the moment. Shandon Hotel & Spa is worth crossing an ocean for.

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


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THE GREAT GAME COMEBACK



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A CHRISTMAS CHURCH BUILT IN FAITH BY FLAGSTAFF'S FIRST FAMILIES

On December evenings in downtown Flagstaff, the small Gothic chapel on Cherry and Beaver looks as if it gathered sunlight in its stones just for this season. Its gargoyles keep steady watch. The bell tower guides anyone who needs a reminder of where peace can still be found. Locals call it the Pink Church, though its true name is the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Chapel. Built in 1930 from local volcanic stone, it stands quietly at 16 West Cherry Avenue.

The story reaches back to 1888, when Flagstaff was a tough railroad town and Catholic families had faith but no resident priest. They carried permission from the bishop and a determination that did not bend. With their own hands they

tower lead you. Read the bronze plaque. Step inside if the doors are open. Stand in the colored light and remember the families who finished their church in time for Christmas 1888, the craftsmen who lifted the glass into place in 1930, and the volunteers who crated small windows in 2022 so the rest of us could keep standing here. Not every miracle comes with trumpets. Some arrive as a humble chapel that holds back the dark and turns winter into something gentle.

help, because a fragile treasure

heals when neighbors show up, not

when they hope someone else will.

built a brick church south of the tracks and worked hard to finish before Christmas. A visiting priest arrived in time, celebrated the first Mass on Christmas Day, and the church took its name from that moment. Nativity was not chosen for sentiment. It was the truth of the

calendar, set in brick and later in stone.

As the town grew north, the parish moved with it. In 1930 they built the present chapel, a modest Gothic landmark with its slim tower, pointed arches, and stained-glass windows that spill color across the floor like bright beads scattered on wood. Those windows were designed and painted by Jesse Earl Fink with hand-blown German glass, showing how far beauty can travel to find a home.

Step inside on a winter night and the quiet feels alive. The air carries a hint of pinyon smoke from the neighborhood. When a car passes, the windows answer with a soft shimmer. Even the gargoyles seem less like warnings and more like guardians. People still marry here, mourn here, and gather here when the doors open for prayer or special events. Though it is not a full-time parish today, it remains under the care of the San Francisco de Asís community and continues its steady life as a working chapel.

The Christmas thread never loosened. That first Mass in 1888 set a pattern, and every December since has pulled on that original line of hope. If you pause long enough, the building tells the story for itself. The tower rises like a simple statement of trust. The nave holds its breath the way a singer does before a carol. The windows turn daylight into a book of color that shifts as the clouds move. A historic marker outside offers the short version, but the deeper one waits inside, where the light settles softly on coats and faces and makes you stand a little straighter.

A recent chapter is quieter and just as faithful. Years of winter and sun wore at the stone and slate. Volunteers formed Save Nativity BVM and stepped forward to repair what time had strained. In June 2022 four small ventilator windows were taken out, shipped to a conservation studio in California, restored, and returned. Work like that rarely draws attention, but it keeps the story alive for the next generation. Open-house days welcome the community to see the progress and to

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


