Aids Domestic Violence Cause

Gail Van Deurzen knows how to get things done.

The Munds Park resident has supported the community through board service and fundraising on behalf of the Pinewood Property Owners Association, the Pinewood Sanitation Department and the Pinewood Fire Department Auxiliary. "Just about everybody's got my name and number," she said.

When Gail heard that Keri, a local domestic violence victims' advocate, needed groceries for an abused mother in Flagstaff, Gail bought a grocery gift card and arranged to meet with Keri. That was two years ago.

Now Gail and the Munds Park community are among the primary benefactors of Northern Arizona families assisted by Keri's organization, Protective Mothers Justice. Keri formed the informal networking group in 2013 as a way to help domestic violence victims establish new lives away from their abusers. Because the work is sometimes dangerous, Keri asked that her last name not be used.

Both Keri and Gail took up the cause to help victims of domestic violence, and the people of Munds Park have answered their call.

"I have become the central drop-off point for donations" Gail said. "If Keri gets a specific need, she sends me an email. I put that on the Facebook page. Within 24 hours, my deck is full of everything. It just comes! This community is so caring and so giving."

THE VIEW FROM HERE

The Melvina Munds and Myron Carrier Family, Munds Park Pioneers

Melvina Munds was born in Roseburg, Oregon, on November 18, 1858, the 1st child of William Madison and Sarah (Cox)

Munds. She followed her father and younger brothers, Jim, Neil, and John, to Arizona in 1876 at age 18.

Myron Aldelbert Carrier arrived in the Verde Valley 5 years later in 1881 and first stayed with the William "Bill" Nichols family, who had a herd of milk cows near Jerome. Carrier had been born in Oneida County, New York, December 22, 1842, and as a young man had served in the Union Army; Co. A., 117th Regiment, New York Infantry. The unit was originally stationed around Washington, D. C., but then moved south and fought in various battles. Carrier was taken prisoner and spent time at Libby Prison in Richmond, Virginia, known for having windows with bars open to the elements, thereby increasing the inmates' discomfort. Carrier was freed in a prisoner exchange but blamed his lingering poor health on his Confederate

prison experience.

medicine. It was there he married Harriet Jane Lindsay, September 27, 1867. The couple moved first to Nebraska, where two daughters, Nellie Moroa and Ethel

Jane, were born and then to Michigan, where Dr. Carrier practiced medicine for seven years. Harriet Carrier died in 1881, and Myron left his children with relatives in New York to come to Arizona, arriving in the Verde Valley shortly thereafter. He invested in mining claims and cattle and provided medical service for the rapidly growing community in the Verde.

Melvina Munds and Myron Carrier were married on September 27, 1884, in a ceremony conducted by Rev. J. T. Pierce in Flagstaff. The couple then spent summers at Munds Park and lived winters in Spring Creek near her father along a tributary of Oak Creek. The couple was rarely apart.

Myron Carrier was active in the Democratic Party and was elected Yavapai County Assessor in 1886, which he held

through 1888. He was also elected many times to serve as a district supervisor representing the Upper Verde District of the Democratic Party.

The Carriers built a log cabin and corrals near Munds Canyon's head in Munds

Following the war, Carrier traveled west in a wagon train spending a winter just outside Salt Lake City trapping. After much thought about seeing so much sickness and misery in Libby Prison, he returned east to take up the study of

THE QUICK COOK HANGS UP HER APRON

Not a virus reaction, but old age and a genetic gift from my dad has made it very difficult for someone who loves cooking and tasting food. I simply am unable at this point to know if something is delicious, and that means I can't honestly encourage you to try the foods I create. Therefore, this is my last column, and I am very sad about that.

But you all should keep cooking and experimenting and trying new cooking techniques and ingredients. The kitchen has always been my happy place, and I hope it is yours as well.

Mini-Bundt Cakes

Cherry Garcia CopyCat Ice Cream

This month's foods are ones that I have made in the past and can vouch for as tasty and, given it is February, I am sharing red foods! And what else is V-Day about, other than love? Sweets! So here you go. Recipes to make for your sweetie(s)!

I always thought Cherries Jubilee fit that wonderful category of being easy to do with dramatic impact. Created for Queen Victoria in the late 1800s, this dessert has drama. My version of this simple dessert, traditionally made by cooking fresh cherries and using a couple of different liqueurs, can be even easier using canned cherry pie filling and one alcohol.

Because my recipe is not like the original, I call mine Jubilant Cherries. I figure they're pretty happy guys with the extra sugar and alcohol.

I typically use brandy or sherry, but you can use other fruit liqueurs such as Kirsch, Chambord, Cointreau, Limoncello, or other favorites.

Have sugar, alcohol, and lighter or matches at the ready. Light the cherries in a spot that won't set off your smoke alarm!

Ingredients

- 1 cup wine
- 4 tablespoons gelatin powder (like Knox)
- 1/2 teaspoon stevia (optional)
- 2-4 tablespoons maple syrup

Note: The amount of maple syrup you use will depend on (1) how dry your wine is and (2) how sweet you want your gummies! You'll have to taste it as you go and add more as needed. Also, you can double or triple this—it works just the same!

JUBILANT CHERRIES

Ingredients

- 1 can of cherry pie filling
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 3 tablespoons brandy

Directions

Heat cherries in a skillet to almost boiling. Remove from heat and sprinkle on the sugar. Immediately drizzle on the liqueur and light a match close to the skillet, flaming the cherries.

Scoop flaming cherries onto dishes of vanilla ice cream or, alternatively, wait for the flame to die down and scoop on then. Delicious!

GUMMY WINE HEARTS

Even grown-ups like the childhood association of gummy snacks. But these are NOT for the kiddos. While they won't make you tipsy, it's still best to keep alcohol treats away from the underage, right?

Directions

In a saucepan, warm the wine on low heat. Put a thermometer in it and make sure it doesn't go much above 90 degrees. Wine boils at 159 degrees F, and so you want to keep it well below that so all the alcohol doesn't burn off. No thermometer? Just keep it on the lowest heat.

Add the gelatin one Tbsp at a time, and stir very well before adding more. While stirring the gelatin/wine with a whisk, it might get frothy. This is ok! It still works, and the froth gels too—but if you want your gummies not to have a little froth on the bottom, scoop it off.

After the gelatin has completely dissolved, add the other ingredients. Taste the mixture after adding each one—you'll have to use your taste buds as a gauge for how much sweetener to add! Keep in mind that the more sweetener you add, the less you'll taste the flavor of the wine! I prefer a little less sweet than a regular gummy bear.

Once your mixture is ready, either use a spoon to fill a mold or dump the whole batch into a pan (for cut gummies).

Put them in the fridge to set. You don't have to do this, but it speeds up the process. They'll be the texture of Jello jigglers pretty quickly—go ahead and eat them this way if you want to. But they get better if you wait. In fact, I recommend chilling for at least 2-3 hours. They really do become the texture of gummy bears.

When firm, cut the gummies into shapes of your choice. Hearts are a nice idea!

That caring spirit was evident at Christmas, when for the first time Keri launched an Angels program for 14 families needing assistance. Gail posted on Facebook about the need for volunteer adopters but didn't give a specific number. "I don't know how but I had 14 replies for 14 families. I call that a Godism!" Gail said.

More families were added to the list all the way up to Dec. 22, when a final Facebook post secured \$1,300 in donations for a family of eight kids. "We took care of 21 families for Christmas," Gail said. "Everybody got what they wanted."

Protective Mothers Justice currently is serving 10 mothers. The number varies from two to 20, and sometimes includes fathers who have been abused. The pandemic has resulted in a rise in domestic violence cases with the strains that come with economic hardship and confinement, Keri said.

Keri gets referrals from Flagstaff domestic violence shelters and Victim Witness Services for Coconino County, as well as the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, which assists victims seeking to relocate, she said.

"When they get out of the shelters, they are still scared," Keri said. "That's where I come into play and say, 'What do you need?""

Items for babies are always needed – diapers, formula, clothing, blankets, cribs and strollers. Clothing for older children – even teen-age boys – also is appreciated, along with food and household items. One traumatized 3-year-old girl eats only applesauce and macaroni and cheese, Gail said.

"I have some part-time Munds Park residents living in Phoenix who order through Costco and have things shipped to me," Gail said. "It's absolutely amazing what we receive!"

Keri hopes to establish Protective Mothers Justice as a nonprofit organization and is working now with a lawyer to accomplish that goal. She also plans to get the academic credentials needed to operate a shelter with programs to help mothers get back on their feet.

In the meantime, Keri will continue her volunteer service assisting families directly. Gail will coordinate the Munds Park donation center based on her front porch.

"I don't know these women personally, I never meet them," Gail said. "I hear just enough of their stories that I get sick to my stomach sometimes. I cry. I pray. I give my time. This is what I do. It gives me joy.'

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



Dog Sledding

"15 years and 20 dogs ago, my wife told me 'no more dogs," says Jim Feyen (pronounced 'fine') of Siberian Outpost in Malone, Wisconsin.

I look around at the eight dogs that are swarming around his feet. "How did you get by that?" I ask.

"What?" he says.

"How did you get over your wife's demand?" I repeat.

"What?" he smiles, cupping his hand to his ear.

Jim has been running Siberian Huskies and leading dog sledding tours for 27 years. His kennels are meticulously clean, his dogs are healthy and happy, and his sense of humor is unfailing.

Buckle up for adventure

I'm at this Wisconsin dog sledding tour outpost to learn more about sled dogs and mushing. And so we jump right into it by hitching up the team. Each soft-nylon harness is custom fit for the dog, and Jim calls out the name on the harness as he picks each up, "Coco, come!"

From the swarm of dogs wandering the heated kennel or running in the outdoor, fenced paddock, Coco appears. She stands for the harness.

"Left," barks Jim. Coco picks up her left foot, and the musher slides her leg into the harness.

'Right," he commands, and the pooch picks up the other foot, and the harness is on. During the process of harnessing 16 Siberian Huskies, Jim tells stories, all sprinkled with his sense of humor, of course. And the Huskies seem as playful as Jim.

Most of Jim's dogs are rescues or surrenders. "Someone calls me and knows someone who must get rid of their Siberian or get evicted from their apartment," explains Jim. He

also works with an animal foster organization. "Right now, I have 16 running and two in retirement."

"The vet bills are a killer, and that's just for checkups," he says, patting Bear's head. Jim's dogs leave prints on his heart

I step back into the warming house while Jim finishes the harnessing. This is where Jim talks with school kids during field trips to Siberian Outpost. There is an antique dog sled, books, posters and photos of his beloved dogs. I'm looking high up at blue harnesses hanging near the rafters. Jim notices my interest when he comes to fetch me.

"Those are the retired jerseys," he explains. "Those are my dogs that I've lost over the last 27 years." I read the sign that says, "Our dogs have left paw prints on our hearts."

"They're excited and ready to run," announces Jim. "Time to get in the sled."

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














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

MINI-BUNDT CAKES

Another alcohol-flavored treat I've made is mini-bundt cakes with red wine batter and glaze. I put the extra cakes (glazed) into the freezer for a fast dessert in a few weeks.

The cake batter was very thick, and yes, the wine will curdle the milk, but that's okay! This cake isn't hard to make, but it does take paying attention as you will have several things going at once.

Red Wine Chocolate Cake with Red Wine Glaze

(makes 12 mini-bundts and 2 small bundt cakes)

Cake

- ½ cup sugar
- 1/3 cup butter, softened
- 1 whole egg + 1 white, lightly beaten
- 1 cup flour + 1 tablespoon
- ½ box sugar-free black cherry gelatin (heaping 1½ teaspoons)
- ½ cup cocoa powder
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ¼ teaspoon baking soda
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 2 ounces bittersweet chocolate
- ½ cup red wine (I used pinot noir)
- ¼ cup milk

Wine glaze

- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter, at room temperature
- ¼ cup red wine
- ½ cup confectioners' sugar, plus more for serving
- ¼ teaspoon pure vanilla extract

Red Wine Chocolate Cake

Preheat oven to 350°.

You are going to need one each of small, medium, large bowls.

In a medium bowl whisk together the flour, gelatin, cocoa powder, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Set aside.

Melt chocolate in the top of a double boiler over simmering water. When chocolate is melted remove from the pan of water and let cool 5 minutes.

In a small bowl, combine red wine and milk. Set aside.

In a large bowl, with an electric mixer, beat the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Add eggs. Beat well. Mix in the cooled chocolate.

When chocolate is well-blended, add wine mixture and flour mixture to the butter mixture. Beat well, for about 3 more minutes, using a spatula to scrape down batter from the side of the bowl.

Spoon batter into prepared 12 mini-bundt and 2 two small bundt pans. Bake for 20-22 minutes and test with an inserted toothpick. Bake up to 25 minutes, if required.

Red Wine Glaze

Add butter, wine, and confectioner's sugar to a medium sauce pan.

Whisk ingredients constantly as you bring to a boil.

You are making a reduction, so occasionally tilt the pan. When the wine sauce is glazing the bottom of the sauce pan, remove from the heat.

Whisk in vanilla. Set aside until time to glaze the cakes. Spoon glaze evenly over the warm bundt cakes and let sit to absorb some of the glaze. Pick up each cake so the glaze spreads across the plate. Set cakes back down on the glaze so they absorb from the bottom, too.

Ice cream anyone? Cake and ice cream makes an even more decadent finish to your Valentine's Day dinner. Here's my version of Cherry Garcia

Cherry Garcia CopyCat Ice Cream

Ingredients

- 2 cups heavy whipping cream
- ½ cup milk
- 14 ounce can sweetened condensed milk
- 3 teaspoons vanilla (if adding cocoa powder, omit vanilla)
- 2 tablespoons dark cocoa powder (optional)
- ½ cup shaved dark chocolate
- ½ cup frozen sweet dark cherries, quartered

Directions

Whisk for several minutes, all ingredients except shaved chocolate and cherries. You shouldn't be able to see any color variation from the sweetened condensed milk.

Pour into your ice cream maker and process as the directions say (about one half hour). When ice cream is thick, toward the end of processing, add shaved chocolate and dark cherries.

Put in a container and freeze for a couple of hours before serving. Hmm. Maybe some Jubilant Cherries on top?

The dogs are anxious to get going. Once I climb aboard, we take off to the woods. "We'll stay on the wooded trails to keep out of the wind," says Jim giving a few suitable pumps from his foot at the back of the sled. It's the musher's pedal, he says.

Then we're off!

The wind burns my cheeks as we pick up speed. The dogs dash through the woods on a tight, groomed trail. On his 37 acres of land, Jim has developed over three miles of trails.

"Back here, I have the nicest trails possible," he touts. "Every snowfall needs to be packed." Jim purchased a mini-snowmobile trail grooming machine to do the job. He also maintains the trails all summer long by hauling gravel and wood chips and cutting the brush away from the track.

I'm surprised at the feeling of euphoria as we glide over a frozen pond. Just watching the 16 dogs working in harmony and running effortlessly makes me joyful. If I'd known that dog sledding in Wisconsin was so fun, I would have done it sooner...and more frequently!

After the adrenaline-pumping ride with trees whizzing by, I hang out with the dogs. Siberian Outpost certainly created memories that will last with me forever. I learned so much about dog sledding in Wisconsin and dog handling in general.

At first, I'd been a little nervous being around so many dogs that I didn't know. But Jim quelled my fears right away.

"None of them bite," he assured me and then laughed. "I'm the only one around here that bites." He points to one of the Siberian Huskies' ears that has a bite mark out of it.

"The school kids love that one," he jokes.

Newspapers and magazines around the nation have featured stories about Jim's dog sledding tours. People

have traveled from Germany, Israel and Australia to go dog sledding at Siberian Outpost. Lucky for me, I didn't have to travel to Siberia to experience authentic dog sledding.

The Melvina Munds and Myron Carrier Family, Munds Park Pioneers

Park and were granted a patent to their homestead in the summer of 1891. Myron was partners with Oak Creek rancher Frank Owenby on a herd of cattle branded DC Bar, which ran in Munds Park's vicinity along with other Owenby cattle branded ONB.

Myron's two daughters came to the Verde to be with their father, and both married well. Nellie married colorful William Loy, the brother of Jim Mund's wife, Hattie. Ethel Jane married Lee Hawkins, the dashing first dentist in Jerome, known for his love of contraptions as well as owning the first automobile in the Verde Valley. Melvina and Myron also had two daughters, Hazel and Iva. Unfortunately, Hazel died in Jerome in the spring of 1892 and was buried next to her Uncle Neil here in Munds Park. Neil was killed while riding a bucking bronco at Willard Springs in 1886.

Jerome began to boom in the early 1890s. The Carriers

Munds Park in 1892.

moved into Jerome, where Myron served as the community
doctor with an office in the Red Cross Drug Store. He was soon appointed Jerome Health
Officer, which meant he had the authority to establish smallpox quarantines and regularly
inspect the prostitutes and cribs in Jerome. He also kept a horse and buggy at the ready
to make house calls from Clear Creek below Camp Verde to the upper end of Oak Creek.
Life in Jerome was a happy and fulfilling time for the Carriers. William Munds was
elected to be the first Mayor. Melvina, her stepmother Cornelia and her sister-in-law
Fannie all served in Diamond Chapter 7 of the Order of the Eastern Star, putting on plays
and doing other community service projects in the community.

In 1898 the Carriers sold their Munds Park Ranch to Flagstaff banker and sheepman E. S. Gosney, who soon sold to Charles H. Odell for whom Lake Odell is named. Most of the original Northernaire subdivision, the golf course, and the Pinewood Club House are situated on the original land homesteaded and loved by Melvina and Myron Carrier – Important Arizona Pioneers.

If you get out into our spectacular Northern Arizona backwoods, please try to make the place better for your presence - do not litter and try to leave the area cleaner than you found it.



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
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It's quiet out there Munds Park! I need you to submit questions about human communication and relationships so I can help. See below for my email, ask me a question, and I'll answer it in an upcoming column. Since I didn't get a question last month, I'm going to pick the topic this time...

Today I'm going to talk about silence as a communicative tool.

Some of us are familiar with the silent treatment and I am not talking about that. I do not recommend this type of punishment under any circumstances. Giving someone the silent treatment is never helpful and it's very detrimental to relationships.

Silence as a communicative tool can be helpful. Let's say you ask me something and I am quiet. I don't offer a verbal response right away like I usually do. It could mean several things. It could simply mean that I'm thinking as I ponder what you said. It could mean I'm actually giving you time to analyze and solve the problem on your own without my input. I could be giving you a particular look that complements my silence to indicate now is not the time to address this topic. You know the look. Mom or grandma can give it and we know exactly what she's saying without saying a word.

Some people use silence just to be mean. Please don't be that person. If you don't want to talk about something, or you need time to think, tell the person that! Don't just ignore them. Humans HATE being ignored. If you ask me something or try to engage me in conversation and it's not a good time, I should tell you "hey, can we talk later, I'm exhausted." That is so much healthier than simply ignoring you.

Sometimes we use silence when we are texting. For example, you text me something and I don't respond. Silence. Crickets. There could be many reasons for this including maybe I didn't have my phone on me. (This is such an older person thing. The younger generation has their device surgically attached and are never away from it.) The key is that I didn't ignore you because I'm punishing you (which is the silent treatment), but because I am actually not able to respond. Maybe my phone is in the other room. Maybe I am actually thinking about what you just sent me and need time to organize my thoughts before I respond.

Don't be quick to assume that silence is a bad thing. Be patient when you're waiting on a response from someone. And don't EVER use silence to punish someone by ignoring them.

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


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
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WINTER BIRDING ACTIVITIES

In my last column I said I would report on the "Big Sit!", but due to COVID, the planned trip was delayed until April. The "Big Sit!" is an annual, international, noncompetitive birding event founded by the New Haven Bird Club in Connecticut. The goal is to count as many bird species as possible while staying within a circle of 17 feet in diameter. The "Big Sit!" is a birding and social event, held sometimes during the early morning, sometimes at happy hour time, usually with no limit to participants. Our destination in April will be the Granite Reef Recreation Area on the lower Salt River.

In the meantime, what activities can we birders participate in during the winter, when birds are not migrating or building nests and raising young? Here are a few suggestions:

- Coming up in February, the Great Backyard Bird Count will be held Friday, February 12, through Monday, February 15, 2021. Anyone can participate, it's free, and you provide important birding information by reporting what you saw and heard from your own back yard. Visit birdcount.org to learn how easy it is to participate. Wouldn't it be great to have multiple Great Backyard Bird Count reports from Munds Park?
- Remote, online meetings from organizations like the Northern Arizona Audubon Society (NAAS) are COVID-inspired ways to connect to birding from the comfort of your own home. This past week I sat in (via Zoom) on the January meeting of NAAS, and the speaker, Chuck LaRue, gave a very informative presentation on the Puebloan peoples in the Colorado Plateau and their relationships with birds in art, ceramics, jewelry, and even feathers found in artifacts. The Maricopa Audubon Society also hosts similar on-line meetings, and the March one will be on Primates of the Amazon. For those of you who enjoy nature and hearing from live speakers, these presentations are wonderful ways to learn. There is no cost, but of course if you live in northern Arizona, joining NAAS for an annual fee of \$25 is a great way to stay involved and informed. Visit the organizations' websites to learn more.
- Field trips by bird groups have generally been canceled for now, but you can go birding on your own or with a friend. Kachina Wetlands is an excellent birding site on a nice winter day, especially when the sun is out and the wind is minimal. I recently took two day trips with friends, driving in separate cars, and on the first saw three species of thrashers I had never seen before, so they were "lifers". We were way out past the APS nuclear power plants in west Maricopa County. The following Saturday I participated in the Fish and Game Urban Waterfowl annual bird count, and our assigned area was south Scottsdale. We counted waterfowl (like Canada Geese, Wood Ducks, American Widgeons, Neotropic and Double-crested Cormorants) and reported our findings so Fish and Game can monitor our wintering waterfowl. The Phoenix area is a great place for wintering waterfowl: no frozen-over ponds.
- Perhaps this is a good time to plan your spring birding activities, whether from your own home or at a new location to explore. Places nearby to go birding in Northern Arizona are found in a free, on-line book on the NAAS website, and excellent where-to-go guides for southern Arizona or Maricopa County can be purchased from Buteo Books or from the Tucson Audubon Society's online store. I'm planning a trip in May to central Oregon to look for the White-headed Woodpecker, among other species. Half the fun is in the planning!

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Please Don't Feed



It is essential that people do NOT feed wildlife!

Feeding, attracting, or enticing wildlife (except birds and tree squirrels) is illegal in Pima, Pinal and Maricopa counties. Violations can result in up to a \$300 fine.

Several other cities and counties in Arizona also have restrictions on feeding wildlife with varying penalties. Check your local city or county ordinances for more information.

Keep wildlife wild and healthy with these tips:

- Do not intentionally feed wildlife; animals quickly associate access to food with humans.
- Keep bird seed off the ground and out of reach of other wildlife. A platform can be attached to the bottom of most feeders to catch spilled seed.
- Store all garbage securely. Do not discard edible garbage where javelina, bears, coyotes and other wildlife can get to it. Garbage cans should be put out on the morning of collection and secured as soon as possible to avoid animal scavenging.
- Feed pets indoors or remove leftover food immediately.



Keep Trash Cans from Spilling



Don't let your pets roam free.



Keep bird seed off the ground and out of reach of other wildlife.

 Fence your garden or yard to provide a physical barrier to exclude wildlife. Poultry wire laid horizontally and buried just below the soil surface can prevent some wildlife from digging.

Securely close all openings to spaces under buildings and mobile homes. This is most critical in the spring when wildlife like foxes and skunks are looking for den sites.

Don't let your pets roam free – they may end up a meal for coyotes, hawks, owls, bobcats and other predators, or come into conflict with javelina and skunks. Keep your pets on a leash whenever they are out of the yard, and always supervise small pets when outdoors.

Trim shrubs up from the ground so they don't create hiding places for wildlife.

Plant native vegetation instead of tempting non-

native ornamentals. Contact your nearest Arizona Game and Fish Department offices for a list of javelina-resistant plants.

Discourage wildlife presence. You can often do wildlife a favor by going out of your way to make them uncomfortable. If wildlife maintain their natural fear of people, they are less likely to become a nuisance and more likely to live a longer life. Make wildlife feel uncomfortable by making loud noises, throwing rocks, etc.

Ask your neighbors to follow these steps (and share this information with them). Wildlife that are attracted to one home often visit adjoining lots. Neighbors working together are most effective.

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
EVERGREENS CAN SAVE YOUR LIFE

Get To Know Your Trees

Numerous evergreen species can provide us with useful supplies. The trees mentioned here are all conifers, meaning that they bear cones for reproduction. If the tree you are trying to identify has berries of any color, it is not a conifer, and it may be toxic. These three genera are:

Pine: These conifer trees have needles that are typically longer than spruce or fir. Pines generally have needles in bunches numbering



Spruce: An easy way to remember these conifer species is "sharp, square spruce." These trees have solitary needles with square shafts and a sharp point on the tip.

Fir: Remember this: "flat, friendly fir." The needles of a fir tree do not have sharp pointed tips, and their needles tend to grow on each side of the twig, giving the greenery a flat feather-like appearance.

Tree Facts: Pine needles can grow as solitary needles (like fir and spruce) but they generally grow in bunches of two, three or five needles. These grow from a little cup-like structure called a fascicle, which grows from a small bud on the pine twig shoot. Short-lived needles live for about a year and half, while hardier needles can live up to 40 years.

Eight Ways To Use Evergreen Trees

1. Make needle tea

The idea of bringing fresh greenery into our homes is nothing new. The ancient Egyptians would bring greenery indoors at winter solstice as symbol of rebirth, and other Old World ancestors would string evergreen boughs over their doors and windows to ward off evil spirits and illness. We can also bring this greenery indoors in the winter to make pine needle tea. Make a positive identification of a favorable fir, spruce or



pine species (I prefer white pine, Pinus strobus), and chop up one tablespoon of needles. Add these to eight ounces of scalding hot water, cover the container and allow it to sit for 10 minutes. Strain out the needles, sweeten with a little honey and enjoy a drink that contains roughly four times your USDA daily allowance of vitamin C. Be advised that there is some conflicting information about the loblolly pine and ponderosa pine species (they may be too toxic to safely consume), and that no pine needle tea is recommended for women who are pregnant or might be pregnant (due to the abortive compounds they may contain).

2. Build a fire in any weather

Most needle bearing trees produce a sticky sap that is loaded with turpentine. This flammable substance is a blend of burnable resins and volatile oils, which seep into every part of the tree. Once a tree (or a part of it) dies, the water leaves and the turpentine can burn freely. Loaded with this extra fuel, the dead dry needles of evergreen trees are one of my favorite tinder materials (especially when conditions are wet).



Likewise, any dead dry twigs and branches from a "tannenbaum" will also make fine kindling material for wet weather fires. When the conditions are damp, I go to evergreens and collect the bounty underneath them. Thanks to the umbrella-like greenery overhead, the materials underneath usually stay dry. With their "booster" of turpentine, these dead needles and sticks will be even more flammable.



Let's clarify this one right off the bat. We're not talking about eating the crusty or corky outer layer of tree bark. We're talking about the living layer of inner bark, and only from certain species. The inner tree bark of tamarack, most pine species, Balsam fir, and spruces can be eaten after it's shaved away from the wood and processed (to make it chewable). Most traditional methods call for slicing the bark into strips and drying it, then



later grinding it into flour for cooking. Other methods call for frying the strips in oil to make them crispy. However you try it, shave down through the outer bark, slice off the soft rubbery inner bark and leave the underlying wood behind. This can be done on the trunk or branches. By focusing on bark removal from branches, you won't kill the tree (which would happen by removing too much from the trunk). This dried bark powder contains more than 500 calories per pound. We use it for cookies in my household.

4. Weave a basket

Basket weaving isn't just for college students anymore. Many survivalists have warmed up to the idea of weaving their own containers, since it's a useful skill in long term survival situations. There are many weaving techniques that are done with many materials throughout the world. Vines and strips of wood are two of the most common basket materials, used for wicker and splint basket styles. But don't forget about pine needles



and coil baskets. The coil basketry technique can be done with longer pine needles (like longleaf pine and loblolly pine). These baskets begin by gathering a bundle of recently deceased pine needles, a large sewing needle and some cordage material. Wrap a slender bundle of pine needles with your cord, then coil the bundle into a tight spiral. Thread the needle onto your cordage and use it between the "coils" to stitch the coils together. Keep extending your coil with more pine needles and cordage wraps until your basket is large enough for the intended use.

5. Create pitch glue

When turpentine is present in evergreen tree sap, this "pitch" is sticky and soft. If we get rid of the turpentine, however, the sap will be rock hard. This is the secret of pitch glue. Collect some old crusty dried evergreen sap or fresh sticky flowing sap (or a blend of both). Place it in a can you don't care about, and cook the sap over a medium heat, stirring often. It may flame up, but don't be alarmed. You're getting



rid of the turpentine. When it has cooked for more than ten minutes (you'll need more cooking time for larger batches), add some powdered charcoal to the hot sap and stir it in thoroughly. This can cool down for storage or be used immediately. Preheat the objects you intend to glue together, apply the hot glue and let the "glue job" cool completely before handling. Pitch glue makes a strong adhesive that is largely waterproof, though it can be brittle and it will melt if used near a hot fire.

6. Filter water

One of the strangest water filters being currently researched is a wooden water filter. Pine and similar evergreens are the most common test species. Blocks of these woods are porous enough to let water drip through, but dense enough to filter out many of the larger pathogens. Most bacteria are one to 10 microns in

length, and the gaps in the woody tissues are small enough to catch them. Cut a $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch long and $\frac{3}{4}$ inch wide plug from your tree, insert it into a vinyl tube and clamp it into place. Hook this hose to a water container and allow the water to drip. If tightly clamped, the water should flow only through the woody tissues, not around the plug. This makeshift filter has been documented to screen out E. coli and larger microorganisms.

7. Eat the seeds

If you want to eat a pine tree, there's more than just bark. Globally, there are about two-dozen pine species with seeds large enough to merit the trouble of harvesting. Many of these are native to Europe and Asia, but there are three available in the western United States. This group is called pinyon pine, and the three main species for nut production are the Colorado pinyon, the single-leaf pinyon, and the Mexican pinyon. These small seeds are fatty, soft, and delicious. They can be eaten raw or cooked. One hundred grams of pine nuts have approximately 640 calories and 10 percent of your daily allowance of potassium.

8. Burn the boughs for smoke

When you've gotten lost in the wild, (but your friends and family know where you went) local search and rescue crews can be on the job with astonishing speed. Help them find you by signaling your whereabouts with a controlled smoke signal. Build a large fire in a prominent place (this can be done with the help of dead evergreen materials. Then toss on a massive pile of live evergreen boughs and needles. Their high water content will prevent them from burning quickly. This will cause them to smolder, producing a large column of whitish smoke. This may not be as noticeable on overcast days, but on a clear day your signal can be seen far and wide.



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


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GOD IS A BETTER GOD THAN YOU

Be secure enough in your role as a follower, stay out of God's way, and let Him do what He does best. He promises impossible things and does them to show you that your faith and trust are well-placed in Him. Let Him be God.

The family asks that in lieu of flowers, please make donations to the Kidney Foundation. Their organization paid for his dialysis for several years and without that support we would have lost him much sooner.

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
