NIGHT SKIES OVER MUNDS PARK

OCTOBER-DECEMBER 2025 CELESTIAL HIGHLIGHTS

When the forest goes quiet and the air turns crisp, our night skies come alive. Munds Park isn't just any place to stargaze we're part of a certified Dark Sky community. That means porch lights are shielded, streetlights are limited, and the heavens get the spotlight they deserve.

The beauty of living here is that your own backyard is one of the best stargazing spots you'll ever find. No road trips, no crowded overlooks. Just step outside, give your eyes 20 minutes to adjust, and look up. Meteors streak brighter. The Milky Way stretches wider. Even casual observers get a front-row view to the cosmos that most people have to chase.

Here's what's worth watching in the skies above Munds Park this fall and early winter.



Full Beaver Moon – November 5

November's full moon gets its name from the busy season of beavers building their winter lodges and, historically, the time when traps were set before rivers froze. Expect a bright, cold light that evening—perfect for a moonlit walk, less ideal for faint meteor spotting.

Quick Tip: The darker the night sky, the better your odds of seeing faint objects. Around New Moon, the stars, Milky Way, and meteors shine their brightest. Around Full Moon, think moonlit landscapes and glowing treetops instead.

Winter Solstice – December 21


Mark your calendar for December 21 at 10:03 AM-the official start of winter in the Northern Hemisphere. It's the shortest day and longest night of the year, a natural reset that ancient cultures celebrated long before calendars told them to.

Meteor Showers to Watch

Fall brings a string of meteor showers, each with its own personality. Some offer a few brilliant streaks, others fill the sky like cosmic confetti. All are visible from Munds Park if skies are clear.

Meteor Shower	Peak	Best Viewing Time	Meteors/hr*	Why It's Worth Watching
Orionids	Oct 21–22	Before dawn	~15	Fast, bright streaks that seem to fly out of Orion. Perfectly timed with New Moon this year—great viewing.
Northern Taurids	Nov 9	Late evening	~3	A slow, steady shower known for dramatic fireballs. The bright moon will dull most, but the occasional big one can still surprise you.
Leonids	Nov 16–17	After midnight	10–15	Famous for their history of meteor "storms." This year's thin crescent moon makes for excellent viewing conditions.
Geminids	Dec 13–14	Late night	Up to 120	The season's showstopper. Even with some moonlight, the sheer number and brightness make this one worth the thermos and gloves.
Ursids	Dec 21–22	Night through dawn	5–10	A quiet but pretty shower that peaks near the solstice. With almost no moonlight this year, it's a great excuse to bundle up and stargaze.

Keep the lights low, keep your eyes up, and together we'll keep Munds Park's night skies shining bright.



COMMUNITY WATCH UPDATE

The Munds Park Community Watch meeting on Thursday, September 18 had a solid turnout. The room was filled with those who came to hear the latest from the county, and there was plenty to cover. For those who couldn't make it, here's the rundown.

The new firehouse is moving forward and is expected to open in the summer of 2026. County staff reported that our roads and forest are currently in good shape, areas that need help are being worked on, and as for the weather, we'll take it as it comes.

Wildfire insurance remains a tough issue. County officials recognize it's a financial strain and are working to help reduce costs, but much of the burden falls on homeowners. Ensure your property has a defensible space and is prepared in case the worst happens. Visit wildfireprepared. org to learn how to protect your home. In a mountain town, that responsibility starts with each homeowner.

The leash law discussion was direct. It is illegal to let your dog roam freely in our neighborhoods and in the forest. If an injury occurs because a dog was not leashed or properly contained, the county can prosecute and issue hefty fines. Please keep your pets secured for everyone's safety.

Short-term rentals are also drawing attention at the state level. Lawmakers are looking at 2026 for potential legislation that could give local governments more control, including the ability to set caps based on community needs. Progress is steady, but slow. If you are experiencing problems with an STR near your home, report it. Contact information is available in the back of the *Pinewood News*.

Crime and traffic stops remain steady but low—it's still "Mayberry USA" here. But one serious concern was raised: five suicide calls in just three months. That's a heartbreaking number for a community our size. Check in on your neighbors, make eye contact, lend a hand. Sometimes a simple conversation can make all the difference.

The next town hall is scheduled for Thursday, May 21, 2026, at 6:30 p.m. at the Pinewood Country Club. Community involvement keeps our town strong.

UPDATE FROM THE PINEWOOD SANITARY DISTRICT

Lateral Sewer Scopes

Effective immediately, Pinewood Sanitary District (PSD) will no longer require lateral sewer scopes during property transfers. While this inspection is no longer mandatory, PSD strongly recommends that both buyers and sellers consider having a lateral sewer scope performed. This proactive step can provide valuable peace of mind by identifying potential issues early and ensuring transparency in the transaction.

Construction

The Odell Lift Station Removal project is progressing smoothly, with only a few minor issues encountered—none of which have been significant. The local community has been exceptionally cooperative and supportive throughout the process. To date, neither PSD nor Summit Construction has received any complaints.

Winterizing Your Home with Propylene Glycol

Propylene glycol (PG) is a safe and effective antifreeze commonly used to winterize homes, particularly in plumbing systems and seasonal properties. It works by lowering the freezing point of water, helping to prevent pipes from freezing and bursting during cold weather.

When used properly, PG is non-toxic and environmentally friendly, making it the Pinewood Sanitary District's recommended choice for residential winterization. Before use, please ensure that any PG-based antifreeze is clearly labeled as non-toxic.

Notice to All Residents: Utility Easement Access Required for Sewer Main Repairs

PSD will be conducting essential sewer main repairs throughout the Park. These repairs are critical to repairing and restoring our infrastructure and preventing inflow and infiltration (I&I) issues. As many of you may be aware, PSD is currently under a Consent

Judgment obtained by the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) and the Attorney General's Office, which requires us to take prompt corrective action.

To complete this work, PSD must access utility easements, which are legally designated areas for public utilities. Unfortunately, many of these easements have become inappropriately obstructed by fences, sheds, boulders, and other personal property.

We respectfully ask all residents to:

- Clear all obstructions from utility easements adjacent to their property.
- Work cooperatively to ensure timely access for work crews.

Important: If PSD is required to remove any obstructions to access easements for PSD lines and equipment, the homeowner(s) will be responsible for any associated costs. In some cases, costs may be shared between neighbors on both sides of the utility easement, depending on the specific situation.

We appreciate your prompt attention and cooperation in this matter. Your support is vital to ensuring the reliability and safety of our sewer infrastructure.







BEEF & NOODLES

One glorious, bubbling cauldron of comfort.



Now, let's not pretend this is dainty fare. No, no. This is a stick-to-your-ribs, homemade goodness afare. We've taken the soul of a classic chicken and noodles dish and dialed up the goodness with beef. Because sometimes, darling, chicken just won't cut it.

What Exactly Is Stew Meat?

You may spot something labeled "beef stew meat"-handy little cubes, ready to toss in. But if you're like me, you like to choose your meat, looking for that perfect marbling. Grab a chuck roast or a top or bottom round. Take your knife and cube it into one-inch pieces. They should be generous enough to bite but small enough to surrender to the fork.

The Secret to That Rich, Velvety Texture?

Here is where the fun begins. First, the beef gets a dusting of flour before it hits the hot pan. When that flour toasts, it leaves behind flavor and a little magic that thickens the broth later. Second, the noodles cook directly in the pot. As they bubble, they release starch, giving you that rich, glossy stew that clings to the spoon. And don't you dare skip the frozen egg noodles if you can find them. Thick, chewy, satisfying — they hold their own in this glorious mix.

Directions

- 1. In a bowl, coat the beef cubes with flour, seasoned salt, and pepper.
- 2. Heat butter and olive oil in a large Dutch oven until the butter foams. Lav in the beef in a single layer and let it brown beautifully. Do not fuss with it; let it sizzle until golden, then turn. Remove the beef to a plate.
- 3. Into the same pot go the onions, mushrooms, and garlic. Stir, scrape, coat up every browned bit of goodness from the bottom. Cook for 7 minutes.
- Pour in the stock and Worcestershire, toss in the thyme, and return the beef to the pot. Bring it to a simmer, cover, and let it quietly transform for an hour and fifteen minutes.
- 5. Lift the lid, breathe in the aroma, and fish out the thyme. In go the noodles. Bring back the simmer, then lower the heat and let them cook until tender, about 20-25 minutes.
- 6. To the table it goes, piping hot, with a dollop of sour cream and a sprig of parsley if you want to be fancy.

Ingredients

- 3 Tbsp. flour
- 1 tsp. seasoned salt, divided
- 1 tsp. ground black pepper, divided
- 1 ½ lb. beef stew meat (or chuck roast), cut into 1" cubes
- 2 Tbsp. butter
- 1 Tbsp. olive oil
- 1 yellow onion, chopped
- 12 oz. mushrooms, sliced
- 4 garlic cloves, chopped
- 1 gt. beef stock
- 2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 4 sprigs thyme
- 1 (12 oz.) bag frozen egg noodles (Reames, if you can find it!)
- Sour cream and chopped parsley, for serving

EPERNAY CHAMPAGNE Elegant Heritage with a Down-to-Earth Welcome

I stepped off the train in Épernay with a flutter of nerves. Everything I'd read about this Champagne capital conjured images of châteaux behind iron gates, manicured gardens and polished guests in flowing sundresses. I, on the other hand, wore hiking boots and my Camino shorts. Should I have ducked into a thrift store and bought a dress before boarding the train from Reims?

Those worries fizzled away with my first glass of bubbly. I quickly discovered that Épernay isn't a velvet-roped playground for insiders. It's a wine-soaked village eager to teach, taste and befriend, where curiosity counts more than couture.

Known as the "capital of Champagne," Épernay sits at the heart of the region's chalky hillsides, just a 90-minute train ride from Paris. Its main artery, Avenue de Champagne, is often called the richest avenue in the world—more than 200 million bottles slumber in cellars beneath its cobbles. UNESCO added the "Hillsides, Houses and Cellars of Champagne" to its World Heritage list in 2015, and 2025 marks the 10th anniversary of that inscription as well as the centennial of the street's official name.

Walking along the wide boulevard lined with ornate façades, I braced for exclusivity. Instead, doors were open. Guides waved visitors inside, tasting rooms bustled with travelers in sneakers, and a sign at the Office de Tourisme Épernay en Champagne pointed to free daily pours. The visitor center hosts a different producer each day from 10:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., giving visitors a chance to meet vignerons and sample cuvées at no charge. Staff happily book cellar tours, bicycle rides through vineyards or tickets to Pressoria, the new interactive museum in nearby Aÿ-Champagne. Even the Musée du Vin de Champagne et d'Archéologie Régionale welcomes you to sniff, swirl and learn—no tuxedo required.

For a more personal experience, Épernay Tourisme offers a free "Greeter" program that matches locals with visitors for informal tours. Through this service, I met up with Jean-Marie Régnier in Vertus, a

medieval walled village just a few clicks from Épernay. The volunteer promised to guide me around on foot, but instead pulled up in a Citroën van with a dashboard strewn with empty paper coffee cups and half-eaten bags of salty treats. "I am so sorry, Madame, but I speak no English," he said in perfect English—and then promptly switched to French. We relied on slow speech, hand gestures and laughter as he drove me down bumpy vineyard lanes.

Our first stop wasn't a grand tasting room, but a French version of Home Depot, stocked with stainless tanks, bottling supplies and electric pruning shears. Jean-Marie popped the trunk, pulled out a portable utility light with its cord trailing like a tail, and marched upstairs. I figured maybe our first "tour" was of the returns desk and that he was taking the work lamp in for a new part. While he chatted with the manager, I wandered the aisles like a kid in a candy store for vintners—small-batch fermentation tanks, labeling supplies and rolls of sheep fencing.

Then he motioned for me to follow. We wound past stacks of plastic sheeting and into a back corridor, ducked through a tight doorway and stepped into a dark space, the smell of damp stone wrapping around us. He plugged the light into a socket and, with a buzz, light flooded the space. I found myself standing inside a circular chamber with a vaulted stone ceiling constructed out of limestone blocks—a medieval cheese cellar hidden beneath the store. Surprise! My guide wasn't running errands at all; he was revealing Champagne's layers one at a time. In Champagne country, even a "hardware stop" can turn into a history

We continued our exploration of Vertus, the largest wine-producing town in the Côte des Blancs. Here, Chardonnay reigns supreme, lending local wines their elegant mineral brightness. I stayed at Hôtel le Relais du Vigneron, which arranges walking tours and tastings of its own Domaine Charles Pougeoise Champagnes. Dinner at the hotel's acclaimed Restaurant Terre de Craie became an edible adventure: a

playful amuse-bouche, steak tartare, duck with a surprising medley of corn, an abundant cheese trolley and a cheeky chocolate dessert paired with a drier Champagne. The chef's wink in every course delighted me.

Of course, no visit to Épernay is complete without a stroll along Avenue de Champagne. Moët et Chandon established itself here in 1746, Perrier-Jouët in 1813, and many others built château-like headquarters during the Belle Époque. Touring these cellars feels like stepping into a living museum of French architecture. Yet even in these glittering salons, hikers are welcome.

At Maison Boizel I descended 11 meters underground with our guide Georgie to see traditional wooden barrels, chalk-walled passages and racks of bottles turned upside down by hand over seven weeks. At Maison de Venoge I tasted in an 1837 formal salon dripping with chandeliers. Sunlight danced on parquet floors as I sipped Princes de Venoge Champagne with Directeur Commercial Philippe Manfreedini. French elegance, old-world grandeur and me still in my hiking shorts. No one batted an eye.

I arrived in Épernay worried about my wardrobe. I left feeling embraced—by guides, vignerons and chefs who care more about sharing tradition than enforcing dress codes. Whether you're sipping in a glittering maison or a humble tasting room, Champagne Épernay delivers both elegance and authenticity. Pack your curiosity, not your couture, and wander fearlessly.



SOLVING THE PUZZLE How Crosswords Became a Newspaper Tradition

Crosswords may feel like they have always belonged in newspapers, but the familiar black-and-white grid is just over a century old. The very first modern crossword appeared on December 21, 1913, in the New York World. Arthur Wynne, an editor for the paper's "Fun" section, had a hole to fill on the page. Inspired by older word games such as acrostics, which are puzzles where the first letters of each line or clue spell out a hidden word or phrase, Wynne invented what he called a 'word-cross."

It was simple in design, shaped like a diamond, but readers loved it. When a typesetting error switched the name to "crossword," the mistake stuck and history had its new pastime.

At first, critics dismissed crosswords as a fad. When Wynne suggested the New York World copyright his creation, the paper refused, calling it too much trouble for something they expected to disappear. By 1924, the New York Times piled on, calling them "a primitive sort of mental exercise."

The public disagreed. That same year, Richard Simon and Max Schuster spotted an opportunity. If people could not get enough of crosswords, why not put them in a book? Their first crossword collection was an overnight hit and launched the publishing house Simon & Schuster. It even came with a free pencil, proof they knew exactly what readers wanted.

Crosswords eventually became more polished. Grids shifted from diamonds to the square patterns we recognize today, and rules about symmetry and clue style emerged. Margaret Farrar, the first crossword editor of The New York Times, set many of these standards and helped transform the puzzle into the form we know now.

Ironically, the Times, the same paper that once sneered, did not run its first crossword until 1942. The country had just entered World War II, and an editor argued that readers might soon face long blackout hours and would need a little escape. The crossword was born in the Times' Sunday edition and quickly became a cultural institution. Today, the Times crossword is considered the gold standard worldwide.

Crosswords have since crossed borders, languages, and formats, finding a home in nearly every daily newspaper. They have been studied by psychologists, celebrated in documentaries, and even competed over in tournaments like the American Crossword Puzzle Tournament, first held in 1978.

As Farrar once said, "You cannot think of your troubles while solving a cross-word." A century later, millions of solvers still agree.







THE BOULEVARDIER

You don't stumble upon a Boulevardier. Someone has to hand you one, usually with a story.

It began in Paris, sometime after the Great War and before we forgot how to dress for dinner. The cafés in Montparnasse were full of American expats ducking Prohibition, chasing the myth of themselves in jazz clubs and crowded back rooms. One of them was Erskine Gwynne, a Southern aristocrat by birth, a writer by ambition, and the kind of man who wore his overcoat like a crown.

In 1927, Gwynne partnered with Arthur Moss to publish The Boulevardier, a Parisian monthly patterned after The New Yorker. The name itself—Boulevardier—comes from the French term for a fashionable man-about-town, someone who strolls the

streets of Paris with charm, purpose, and time to spare. Gwynne fit the part. He was well-connected, well-dressed, and had the good sense to frequent Harry's New York Bar, a smoky little joint on Rue Daunou known for serving real drinks with no apologies.

It was there he requested a variation on the Negroni, swapping gin for bourbon. Warmer. Stronger. American, but with manners.

The result was the Boulevardier: a drink that doesn't flirt, doesn't dance, doesn't sparkle. It leans in. Bourbon gives it its soul. Sweet vermouth lays down spice and complexity. Campari tightens it with bitterness, like a well-delivered truth.

I save it for fall. When the light goes gold by five. When the air smells like firewood and dry leaves. It's not a summer sipper or a holiday showpiece. It's for October nights when you want your drink to keep pace with your thoughts.

Serve it over a large cube in a weighty glass. No garnish necessary, unless you're the type who likes to dress up even when no one's looking. And sip it slowly. This isn't one for the background.

The Boulevardier is the kind of drink that feels like company. Old company. The kind that lets you talk or stay quiet and never takes it personally.



The Method

Ingredients:

- 1 oz bourbon (or rye, if you prefer a sharper edge)
- 1 oz sweet vermouth
- 1 oz Campari

Instructions:

- 1. Add all ingredients to a mixing glass with ice.
- 2. Stir until chilled and just slightly diluted.
- Strain into a rocks glass over one large cube.
- Optional: garnish with an orange twist, but only if it feels right.







HEALING AMERICA'S DIVIDE How Citizens Can Stop the Cycle of Hate

Bridging divides starts with simple gestures.

America is fracturing under the weight of political anger. Families argue, friendships strain, online strangers hurl insults, and sometimes even threaten violence. Too often, we stop seeing each other as fellow citizens and start seeing "the other side" as something less than human.

Yet democracy depends on recognition of shared humanity. If hatred becomes normalized, the consequences can be severe. The good news is that each of us can act now to slow and reverse that trend.

The Psychology Behind Division & How We Stop Seeing Each Other as People

One of the key forces that enables large-scale hatred is dehumanization, when we start treating people as less than fully human. Psychologists trace it back to classic prejudice theory (Gordon Alport 1954) and contemporary research confirms that it's a powerful mechanism for moral exclusion.

When people are dehumanized:

- They're denied complex emotions, moral agency, or individuality.
- Empathy toward them diminishes, making cruelty easier.
- Language shifts: metaphors compare "them" to animals, vermin, objects, or machines.
- Social norms erode: when enough people dehumanize a group, cruelty becomes more acceptable.

As the Stanford Encyclopedia of Philosophy notes, dehumanization often involves denying to others the mental states or attributes we consider uniquely human, such as agency, emotion, and self-reflection, thus excluding them from full moral status.

The risk is that political opponents aren't merely wrong, but "less than human," which enables more extreme reactions such as social exclusion, vilification, or even violence.

How Hatred Spreads Through Influence, Messaging, & Conditioning

We can't discuss large-scale change without understanding persuasion. Manuals and training programs (like The Behavior Operations Manual) describe how repeated messaging, emotional triggers, framing, and social reinforcement shape beliefs and behavior. While such tools can be used for positive ends like conflict resolution or public health, they also carry risks when misused to amplify outrage.

Some danger patterns include:

- Emotional triggers and framing: Messages framed as existential threats ("they'll destroy us") create fear responses.
- Repetition and echo chambers: Hearing the same extreme claims from multiple sources reinforces them as truths.
- Social validation: Approval (likes, shares, agreement) reinforces radical statements and discourages nuance.
- Polarizing narratives: Framing politics as a Manichaean struggle (good vs evil) leaves no middle ground.

Unchecked, these dynamics condition groups to distrust, fear, and hate "the other side."

Eight Steps Citizens Can Take Toward Healing

Here are practical things any person can do, regardless of political identity, to help cool the heat, restore empathy, and resist escalation.

Refuse the Dehumanizing Language





"animals," or "monsters." Words matter. When language marks a group as subhuman, empathy vanishes.

Expose Yourself to Credible, Differing Sources

Read one news source or essay you disagree with. It challenges your assumptions, helps you see human motives behind arguments, and interrupts the echo chamber.

Ask "How did you get there?" Before "Why are you wrong?" In conversations, asking for thought process, not just disagreement, lowers emotional defenses. This simple pause can open space for reason over reactive rejection.

Humanize Public Figures & Political Opponents

Even those you oppose have stories, struggles, families. Recognizing them as human doesn't commit you to agreement, but it resists the slide into absolute vilification.

Join Bridge-building Efforts

Organizations like Braver Angels and Turning Point USA bring conservatives, liberals, and moderates together in structured conversations aiming to reduce polarization. Many cities now host Braver Angels workshops to help citizens bridge divides.

Model Calm, Especially When Others Don't

In family arguments, online debates, or group settings, choosing a measured tone and patience can defuse tension. You might become the only calm voice in the room.

Teach Historical Humility

Encourage awareness that every society believes "this won't happen here" until it does. Remind youth (and yourself) that hatred often arrives slowly, clothed in familiar language.

Care for Your Emotional Resilience

Fatigue, fear, and isolation make us more vulnerable to influence. Rest, exercise, in-person connection, and time off social media strengthen your internal boundaries. Understanding and knowledge are our armor.

Why Small Actions Matter

One person might feel powerless. But when many people choose to act differently, to pause, to humanize, to question, to resist outrage, the cultural trajectory can shift.

In Germany after WWII, recovery from mass hatred didn't happen overnight. It took decades of truth-telling, memorialization, reformed education, and a shared commitment to confronting the past. Over time, society rebuilt norms that strongly reject overt hate.

Here in America, we're at an earlier stage. The turning point is possible, but it requires each citizen to be part of the solution.

Final Word

Hate doesn't need to win, not if enough people refuse to feed it.

If you care about democracy, family, community, and the next generation, your responsibility is not just to your own beliefs, but to the dignity of every American. Be the person who refuses dehumanization. Be the calm voice. Be the citizen who sees others' humanity first. Our future depends on it.


PLANT NOW FOR SPRING BEAUTY & CELEBRATE FALL AT WARNER'S

FINAL THOUGHT

GRACE AT THE COUNTER

As publisher of The *Pinewood News*, I get a behind-the-scenes look at what local businesses navigate every day to serve this community. Over the years, I've had countless conversations with owners, managers, and front-line staff. What they share isn't gossip—it's honest feedback with one common thread: it's tough out there when people forget how to treat one another.

I've had this article in mind for a while. I just never sat down to write it. But after one too many stories about staff being yelled at, dismissed, or treated poorly, I figured it was time. So here we are. This is what I've learned from the people who show up day after day to keep Munds Park running, asking for nothing more than basic human decency.

Munds Park isn't Phoenix; things move a little slower here, and that's part of the charm. We're not built for rush hours or city-scale service. We're built on community, patience, and mutual respect.

But lately, I've heard too many accounts of small business owners and workers being treated like they're beneath the people they serve. That's not the spirit of this place. Folks come here for the quiet, the slower pace, and the connection to nature. You'd think that energy would carry over into how we treat each other, but sometimes it doesn't.

This isn't aimed at the good eggs who show gratitude and good manners. It's for those who've forgotten—or occasionally forget—including me.

Being a good customer isn't just about placing an order or booking a service. It's about how you show up as a fellow human being. Are you making someone's day harder, or easier?

A slower pace often comes with fewer hands on deck. Most of our businesses run lean, especially in the winter months. In the summer, when it gets busy, things can back up. Orders take longer. Lines get longer. And the pressure lands squarely on the staff doing their best to keep up.

Here's the part most people don't see: these workers want to do a good job. They show up early, stay late, work weekends, and roll with the chaos. What makes their jobs harder isn't the rush; it's being treated like they don't matter.

I've heard stories of customers snapping fingers, yelling across counters, tossing money instead of handing it over, or acting like basic kindness is optional. These aren't just bad manners; they chip away at the spirit of what makes this little corner of the world special.

And in a small town, the person behind the counter isn't a stranger.

They might be your neighbor. Your friend's kid. The person who helped you last week when your car wouldn't start. Or maybe they're just another human being doing their best. Either way, they deserve respect.

Business owners deserve it, too. If you see them out with family or friends, that's not the time to bring up business. If you're up early, working late, or thinking about a project on a weekend, that's the time to send an email or wait until regular business hours. Respect their time the way you'd want yours to be respected. And remember, most businesses in Munds Park are owner-operated. They are the secretary, the finance office, the IT department, and everything in between. If they don't pick up the phone on the first ring, be patient.

And unless you've walked in their shoes, resist the urge to tell them how to run their business. If you have feedback, share it in the right setting, not by shouting on Facebook or venting to neighbors. If it's constructive, say it directly to them, in person or by email. And above all, keep it kind.

Respect works best when it runs both ways. Sure, the people providing a service should be polite, but customers play a role too. The folks behind the counter have their own challenges, their own pride in what they do, and their own limits. Dignity and patience aren't extras; they're the basics of being decent to one another.

So the next time you're waiting longer than expected, or something's not quite right, try grace first. Try eye contact. A smile. A simple thank you. It might not speed up the line, but it will make someone's day better—including yours.

And in a world that often feels hurried and divided, that's no small thing.
