SEDONA VOTERS TOSS OUT PROPOSITION 483 WITHOUT A SECOND SIP

You could almost hear the collective exhale of relief from homeowners who've got their feet up on a mortgage—voters rejected the city's plan to rezone a park for local workers to stay overnight, shutting down what would have been Sedona's first "Safe Place to Park" program for the people who keep the town running. Proposition 483 wasn't some wild, revolutionary pitch; it was a pragmatic, pretty-much-bare-minimum solution: a city-owned parking lot for workers who make the cappuccinos, stack the shelves, guide the tourists. A place to safely sleep in their cars, a restroom, maybe even some dignity.

But 68% said no thanks. The city, "valuing the democratic process," won't be looking for other sites either. That was Sedona's polite way of saying, "We've heard the people loud and clear—just not the ones who can't afford a roof."

And now? It's back to cars and couches for the people who make Sedona work. It's all about what you want to see. For some, Sedona is red rocks and high-end galleries, yoga retreats and air-conditioned hotel rooms. But for others, it's a second shift and a back seat.

NEW OHV SAFETY COURSE REQUIREMENT STARTING 2025

Starting January 2025, Arizona off-highway vehicle (OHV) owners must complete a free online safety course through AZMVDNOW.gov before registering or renewing their vehicles. The 10-minute video and quick test, developed by the Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD), aim to improve OHV safety and awareness. Conveniently integrated into the Arizona Motor Vehicle Division (MVD) portal, this one-time requirement applies to residents, non-residents, and businesses registering OHVs until June 2027. Decals on vehicles will serve as proof of course completion for law enforcement. Visit azdot.gov/mvd/OHV for details.

A JOURNEY THROUGH CHRISTMAS FOODS THAT TIME LEFT BEHIND

As Christmas draws near, kitchens everywhere come alive with the comforting aromas of roasted turkey, creamy mashed potatoes, and the buttery sweetness of freshly baked pies. But what if we told you these familiar staples are just the latest chapters in a much older story? Come with us as we travel back through the ages and uncover the forgotten Christmas foods—each brimming with history, flavor, and a pinch of holiday magic.

Frumenty: The Festive Porridge of Yore

Imagine a frosty medieval

evening in the 14th century, the hearth crackling with warmth and a cauldron of frumenty bubbling away—a creamy blend of boiled wheat, milk, eggs, and the heady perfume of honey and spices. This ancient dish was no ordinary porridge; it symbolized abundance and comfort, transforming the simplest ingredients into a treasure worthy of the holiday table.

A staple on Christmas tables during the Middle Ages, frumenty was often flavored with cinnamon, nutmeg, and dried fruits. It served as an early predecessor to the modern Christmas pudding, capturing the sweetness of the season long before sugar became commonplace. By the 17th century, however, richer desserts like plum pudding began to take its place in festive feasts.

Though long absent from today's tables, frumenty remains a humble yet heartwarming reminder of Christmases past—a time when

the warmth of the hearth and the shared joy of a simple meal were as cherished as the feast itself.

The Yule Boar: Feast of Legends

Long before the turkey claimed its festive throne, the Yule boar reigned supreme as the star of the Christmas feast. This tradition can be traced back to pre-Christian Norse and Germanic cultures (500 BCE to 400 CE), where the boar was revered as a symbol of strength and prosperity. The custom endured well into the Middle Ages (12th to 15th centuries), with the boar's head becoming a celebrated centerpiece at English midwinter feasts.

Bore was served with great ceremony; the head was adorned with evergreen garlands and triumphantly carried into the dining hall as traditional carols echoed through the room. The feast symbolized triumph over the hardships of winter, seamlessly blending Pagan traditions with emerging Christian practices.

However, by the 18th to 19th centuries, the Yule boar fell out of favor. Turkey, introduced to Europe by Spanish explorers in the 16th century, gained popularity and became the festive choice during the reign of King George II in the 18th century. Yet, echoes of the Yule boar endure in old carols like The Boar's Head Carol—a lingering reminder of a time when feasts were as much about spectacle as sustenance.



Minced Meat Pies: A Spicy History

Today's mince pies—tiny, sugary parcels filled with dried fruits and a hint of spice—have their roots in a surprising past. In Tudor England (late 15th to early 17th centuries), minced meat pies were hearty and savory creations, blending finely chopped meat, suet, dried fruits, and a medley of exotic spices introduced by explorers and traders from India and the Spice Islands.

These pies weren't just delicious; they were deeply symbolic. Often shaped into an oval or crib-like form to represent the Nativity, their spices—cinnamon, cloves, and nutmeg—were said to honor the gifts of the Magi. Over the course of the 17th century, tastes began to change. The meat content diminished, and sweetened fruits and brandy gradually became the dominant flavors.

By the Victorian era (mid-19th century), the fully sweet version of the mince pie had taken hold, becoming the treat we recognize today. Yet in every bite of a modern mince pie, there remains a faint echo of its adventurous origins—a nod to the daring explorers, resourceful cooks, and festive traditions of centuries past.

Wassail: The Cup That Brought a Community Together

"Waes hael!"—"Be in good health!"—was the joyous cry that accompanied the ancient custom of wassailing, a practice rooted in Anglo-Saxon England (5th to 11th centuries). Far more than just a drink, wassail embodied the spirit of communal celebration. This spiced ale or cider, made with apples, honey, and fragrant spices, was passed from hand to hand in a communal bowl, bringing warmth to the darkest days of winter.



The use of evergreen plants to symbolize everlasting life dates back to ancient civilizations. Egyptians, Chinese, and Hebrews decorated their homes with greenery like wreaths, garlands, and even small trees. European pagans, many of whom revered trees, adapted these beliefs even after converting to Christianity. It's widely thought that Christmas was timed to align with winter solstice festivities, where trees played an important role.

The modern Christmas tree tradition, however, is rooted in Germany, where December 24 was

celebrated as the feast day of Adam and Eve. A popular medieval play about the two featured a "paradise tree," a fir adorned with apples to represent the Tree of Knowledge. Wafers, symbolizing the eucharistic host, were also hung, later evolving into various holiday-shaped cookies.

The addition of lights to trees is often attributed to Protestant reformer Martin Luther. Legend has it that one evening, Luther noticed stars twinkling through tree branches on his walk home and wanted to

recreate this beauty by adding candles to his family's tree.

Christmas trees became fashionable in England in the mid-1800s. That's when Queen Victoria and her German-born husband, Prince Albert, showcased a Christmas tree in the Illustrated London News and the tradition quickly spread across the UK. German immigrants brought their Christmas tree customs to the United States around the same time.

The use of electric lights on trees began in 1882, thanks to Edward Johnson, an associate of Thomas Edison, who decorated his tree with small bulbs. Another story credits

Ralph Morris, who, after witnessing a candle nearly ignite his family's tree, used telephone switchboard lights for a safer display.



FLAMES, FRIENDS, & THE FINE LINE BETWEEN CHAOS & MAGIC

One Christmas Eve, my father shared the joy of Fire Falls with family and friends—and taught Genna how to make them to carry on the tradition.

My parents had a knack for creating magic out of ordinary evenings. They loved to entertain, and their friends—what a remarkable group they were—often became part of unforgettable nights filled with food, drinks, and lively debate. My mother, the gourmet, poured her heart into creating decadent appetizers. She used only the finest ingredients, not because it was trendy, but because it was her way of showing love. My father, meanwhile, was a skilled bartender, commanding not just one, but two fully stocked bars in our home. Together, they were a dream team.

The evenings with friends would start at home with cocktails and hors d'oeuvres. After a few rounds of laughter and libations, sometimes the if my mother wasn't crafting dinner, the group would head out to Scottsdale's Brown Derby, an upscale dining gem of the time. The restaurant, famous for its Hollywood roots and fine dining, brought a touch of glamour to the evening. It wasn't just a meal—it was an event. Scottsdale's Brown Derby carried forward the legacy of its Los Angeles counterpart, combining sophisticated dining with a splash of theatrics.

After dinner, the festivities didn't end. Back at my parents' house, the group would gather again for hours of conversation that spilled into the early morning. As a child, I'd be awakened by bursts of laughter or the

unmistakable sound of raised voices. Curiosity always got the better of me, and I'd sneak out to see what I was missing.

There they were, gathered around our large, low coffee table, the shag carpeting beneath them a bold swirl of yellow and gold. The room was alive with the era's signature touches—macramé plant hangers dangling ivy and ferns in every corner, art splashed across the walls, and a soft, warm glow from a pottery lamp my father crafted.

The coffee table itself was a chaotic masterpiece: glasses clinked against bottles, half-empty appetizer plates teetered on the edges, and ashtrays brimmed with the remnants of fiery conversation. Friends sat cross-legged on the floor, the plush carpet softening their casual seating arrangements. They leaned in close, their animated expressions revealing the story of fiery debates, neck veins straining as they passionately argued politics. Democrats and Republicans clashed in spirited exchanges, voices rising and falling like the hum of the stereo spinning Fleetwood Mac in the background. But no matter how heated it got, nobody ever stormed off.

Even religion wasn't off-limits. My parents' group of friends included Jews, evangelistic Christians, Catholics, and an agnostic, all exchanging views on theology with a mix of respect and curiosity. When the night finally wound down, they'd embrace, express their affection for one another, and eagerly plan the next gathering.

Growing up in this environment, I learned to appreciate the value of open, spirited discussions—especially about the topics many people tend to avoid. I've always found meaning in exchanging ideas, even when there's disagreement. It's a skill I hold dear, one that feels especially relevant in today's political and religious climate. But those lessons didn't just come from the debates around our coffee table—they extended to the little rituals and moments that made these evenings unforgettable.

One such moment came during a visit to the Brown Derby, a place that seemed to inspire its own kind of magic. My father, always observant and intrigued by new experiences, noticed a bartender performing an extraordinary tableside presentation: the Fire Fall. The bartender warmed a brandy snifter over an open flame, carefully poured in several liqueurs, and ignited the drink. With dramatic flair, he raised the flaming drink high before dropping it into another snifter, extinguishing the fire in a dazzling swirl. My father, utterly captivated, approached the bartender and asked to learn the art of the Fire Fall.

The bartender, generous with his craft, came to their table and walked my father through the process step by step. Before long, Dad was serving Fire Falls to their delighted party, a tradition that followed him home. From that night on, the Fire Fall became a holiday staple in our family. Watching my father prepare it—a flickering display of warmth and hospitality—never failed to impress.

If you love entertaining and want to add a touch of theatrics to your gatherings, the Fire Fall is a drink worth mastering. It's the perfect companion on cold winter nights, guaranteed to warm not just the glass, but the hearts of those lucky enough to share in the experience.

The Art of Fire Falls

Gather Your Tools

- Metaxa The Original Greek
 Spirit 7 Stars
- Galliano L'Autentico
- Tia Maria Coffee Liqueur
- 3 shot glasses
- 2 large brandy snifters
- A can of Sterno

The Method

Prepare for the Performance: Line up your liqueurs, measured at 2/3 of a shot each. Light your Sterno, and place two brandy snifters front and center—they'll soon be the stars of this fiery show.

Warm Up the Act: Take the first snifter and gently warm it over the Sterno flame by rotating the glass. Let the heat kiss the glass before introducing the Metaxa. Pour it in, then warm it by rotating the snifter over the flame, coaxing the flavors to bloom.

Build the Layers: Add your second liqueur, Galliano, letting it blend seamlessly into the Metaxa. Rotate and warm again, then bring the final ingredient, Tia Maria. Keep the rotation going until the liquid is perfectly warmed and ready for the grand finale.

Ignite the Fire: Hold the snifter with the liqueurs in your dominant hand and tip it slightly over the Sterno flame. Watch as the vapors ignite into a flickering blue flame.

Create the Fire Fall: With your empty snifter in your non-dominant hand, lift the flaming glass high and pour the liquid in a slow, steady stream, creating the spectacular cascade of light and heat we call the Fire Fall.

Seal the Moment: As the flames dance in the second glass, use the now-empty snifter to cap the drink. The flame will bow out gracefully, leaving behind a drink that's as warm and inviting as a holiday hearth.

Savor the Glory: Pause to appreciate the creation before you. Don't lean in too close—your nose might not appreciate the heat! Instead, breathe lightly through your mouth to take in the toasty, rich aroma. Sip slowly, and let the warmth and flavors carry you into the season's magic.

amazement. The house was clean, cookies were cooling on the counter, and the tree twinkled like magic.


"Charlie, did you do all this?" she asked, tears welling up.

"Not all of it," Charlie said with a grin. "Santa helped a little."


They laughed, and his mom hugged him tight. "You've made this the best Christmas ever."

DORD OF THE WAY

No, our editor didn't go on strike. Yes, the title is correct. Ladies and gentlemen of Punds Mark, please welcome our December Word of the Day – Spoonerism – one of the finest linguistic gems in the treasure chest of language bloopers. For those unfamiliar with this delightful little phenomenon, a spoonerism is when you accidentally (or sometimes not-so-accidentally) swap the first letters or sounds of two words in a sentence, creating a hilariously awkward phrase.

DEFINITION: spoon-er-ism /'spoon-en-iz(-e)m/ noun

a verbal error in which a speaker accidentally transposes the initial sounds or letters of two or more words, often to humorous effect, as in the sentence you have hissed the mystery lectures, accidentally spoken instead of the intended sentence you have missed the history lectures.

Other fun examples include: "Belly jeans" for "jelly beans", "Bunny phone" for "funny bone", "Shake a tower" for "take a shower", "Snail tracks" for "trail snacks", "Plaster man" for "master plan", "Caking a bake" for "baking a cake", "Fighting a liar" for "lighting a fire"

The name spoonerism comes from the Reverend William Archibald Spooner, a 19th-century clergyman and New College of Oxford University dean and professor. He was known for his remarkable ability to scramble words on a regular basis. He frequently mispronounced phrases, switching parts of words during speeches and gatherings. Because he mispronounced words so frequently, people eventually started calling these verbal errors "spoonerisms." Whether it was his stuttering tendencies, his sharp wit, or just a love for creating verbal chaos, Spooner managed to gift the world with an entire category of linguistic humor. His best-known blunder? He once intended to say, "You have wasted the whole term," but accidentally said, "You have

tasted the whole worm." While it may have been an innocent mistake, it set the stage for centuries of silly little spoonerism nuggets. If he were around today, he'd be a TikTok sensation.

Spoonerisms can occur in any language, but they are especially common in English. They can happen when the brain's speech center is confused and switches a phrase's sounds as a person verbalizes them or when a person loses focus while speaking. They may also be more common when someone is tired, stressed, or distracted. A nervous tick, dyslexia, or speaking in a non-native tongue may also increase the frequency of their presence.

Oftentimes, spoonerisms are mistaken for other types of verbal errors, including eggcorns, malapropisms, Freudian slips, and mondegreens. But there are key differences between them, as well as interesting origin stories for each! Follow along for a few quick grammar/history fun facts...

An eggcorn is a word or phrase that sounds like another word or phrase and is sometimes mistakenly used in place of the latter in a way that seems logical or plausible. An example might be a writer describing an order to seize and desist rather than the proper term cease and desist, the occasional instance of mute point instead of moot point, cold slaw instead of coleslaw, or someone mishearing the word scapegoat as escape goat. The term eggcorn—itself an alteration of acorn—is a recent invention, coined by the linguist Geoffrey Pullum to describe the phenomenon.

Malapropisms have a lot in common with eggcorns—they involve one word being improperly used in place of another. In contrast to an eggcorn, however, there isn't much logic behind a malapropism; it usually results in nothing more than a ridiculous or nonsensical expression. The term

derives from Mrs. Malaprop, the name of a character in Richard Brinsley Sheridan's play The Rivals. The character is noted for using words ineptly for humorous effect, as when she calls a gentleman "the very pineapple"—rather than pinnacle—"of politeness," and apologizes for having little "affluence"—rather than influence—over her niece. Frequently, malapropisms involve words of elevated vocabulary.

A Freudian slip is an instance of misspeaking that is believed to be motivated by information lurking in the speaker's unconscious mind that is often revealed by the utterance. Sigmund Freud identified the concept of the slip (which Freud himself referred to as "Fehlleistungen," —German for "faulty actions) and argued that such involuntary actions can be attributed to an unconscious mental process, such as from knowledge or impulse that has been repressed. One of the most famous Freudian slips occurred during a speech by President George H.W. Bush. He intended to say, "We've had triumphs, we've made some mistakes, we've had some setbacks," but he said something else. A quick google search will tell you what he said instead.

Mondegreens are very much like eggcorns but are more likely to come from a written source, such as lyrics from songs or poems, as in "There's the bathroom on the right" instead of "There's a bad moon on the rise" from Creedence Clearwater Revival's "Bad Moon Rising," or "And there's a wino down the road" in place of "And as we wind on down the road" in Led Zeppelin's "Stairway to Heaven." In the same meta-way as eggcorn, mondegreen originated as a mondegreen itself. The term comes from a Scottish ballad, "The Bonny Earl o' Moray." The first verse of the song ends with the line, "They have slain the Earl o' Moray / And layd him on the green," but the last line was often misheard as "Lady Mondegreen." After mishearing the line herself, American journalist Sylvia Wright coined the term in Harper's Magazine in 1954.

We've all experienced that moment when we open our mouths, and the words just sort of... tumble out in a way we didn't expect. While these verbal slip-ups can make you sound like a babbling fool, they also carry a certain charm that makes us love them. After all, they can either provide us with moments of pure, unintentional comedy or they can serve as a comedic shortcut that makes your bloopers seem intentional, like you've entered a higher plane of linguistic humor.

The next time you find yourself saying something that didn't quite come out right, just embrace it. Maybe you meant to say... "I have a lot of chores to do," but hey, "I have a lot of doors to chew" can be the start to an interesting discussion. After all, lignophagia is a significantly more interesting topic of conversation than that of domestic household duties.

Spoonerisms remind us that language is a playground. It doesn't always have to be serious or perfect. Sometimes, little mix-ups can offer us our most hilarious and memorable moments.

Remember: Fanguage is lun, fistakes are munny, and in the end de all wie anyway.





When she was ten, Vivvy Bouchet made a prediction and saved a boy's life. The boy she saved, now a Fort Worth cop, has always believed she is psychic. Vivvy doesn't disagree. She guesses her talent is possibly inherited from her mother, who hung her shingle as a psychic and was infamous for discovering a dead body buried in the yard of their house when Vivvy was just a girl.

Today Vivvy's a brilliant astrophysicist who just wants to be left in peace to scan the dark desert sky with her telescopes. Known for her intelligent, analytical mind, she has trained her telescopes to identify a mysterious, unknown light source that she recently glimpsed. Her colleagues are hopeful about what this potential discovery could mean for the future of science and space exploration.

But the detective, Mike, her former teen crush and now her brother-in-law, is begging for her help on a cold case, and she can't turn him down.

In the past decade, Lizzie Solomon and the Victorian mansion where she disappeared have taken on an almost mythic status. Conspiracy theorists say Lizzie is still buried in the walls, while her mother protests her innocence while sitting in prison convicted of killing her.

Vivvy reluctantly agrees to work with Mike's skeptical colleague, Jesse Sharp. Sharp is the stereotypical tough, brooding Texas cop that she must try to decipher.

When a vicious podcaster, Bubba Guns, sets his sights on Vivvy and her own secrets, as well as those of the vanished girl, Vivvy's life starts to unravel as he zeroes in on discrediting her professional reputation as well as her psychic claims.

I enjoyed the juxtaposition of science and mystical, the known and the unknown. In fact, it was fun to watch Vivvy doubt herself even as she tracks down suspects and puts herself in increasingly dangerous situations, as she tries to solve the decadelong mystery of Lizzie Solomon's disappearance. To make things worse, Jesse Sharp follows her all over town, hoping to intimidate her into 'confessing' that she's a con artist while protecting her from the raving Bubba Guns and his followers. I'm sure we all can name a barking mad Bubba Guns style character whose views defy logic and fact while he's bullying his slavish followers to adopt his opinions and conspiracy theories. The dialogue is especially good when Bubba's around (real-life excluded).

In truth, the insidious nature of conspiracy theories and our urge to believe them, especially when it comes to sensationalized cases, was an intriguing subplot of the book for me. Vivvy's journey is one that enthralled me from the beginning. Her nerdy yet brilliant mind, her passion for scientific facts coupled with her eccentric tactics, blurred the lines between science and the supernatural. If, like me, you are an avid fan of supernatural thrillers and twisty crime mysteries, I wholeheartedly recommend Night Will Find You.





WHAT DO YOU WANT FOR CHRISTMAS?

What do you want? Do you know what you want? Maybe you haven't written your letter to Santa, yet. But do you at least have an idea in your mind?

It seems, the older we get the less 'what' we want. When we are younger, the list is longer. But there always seems to be something that we feel like we are lacking that if we had it, then our life would be much better, even perfect and complete.

Here are a few thoughts. We want our way. We have a plan for the family during the holidays, and if everyone would just stick to our plan, then everything would go great. Except, it usually does not because everyone comes in with their own plan. Nobody gets their way. Too often, when we get our way, we only get in our own way and nothing works out the way we planned it.

We want to always feel comfortable, pleasure. But pleasure is addictive. If we always get what makes us feel good, then eventually it no longer makes us feel that way but it controls it because we are afraid we will lose the good feeling.

We want to do what we want to do. And we want everyone around us to do it, too. But they want what they want to do. And if we always do what we want to do we will end up where we do not want to be. No one else will be there with us because they did what they wanted to do.

We may not know what we want, but we know when we want it. We want it now. But the problem with this is, what we want now may not be what we want later. And later is longer. Now that I have what I wanted, I wish I had something else.

Regret always begins with, "I want." I regret I ever got it. I wish life had a rewind button and I could go back and not say, "I do." Not sign that contract. Not take that job, make that move.

I have what I wanted but as result I do not have what I want because I got what I wanted which is not really what I want.

The holidays also always seem to be a period of conflict. Conflict with family and friends. We are together during this season more than the rest of the year and the air always seems to be thick with tension

James, the brother of Jesus, wrote one of the letters toward the back of your New Testament and he had something to say about getting what we really want and why we fight during the holidays.

"What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you? You desire but do not have, so you kill. You covet but you cannot get what you want, so you quarrel and fight. You do not have because you do not ask God. When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures." (James 4:1-3)

Why do we fight during the holidays? Because of the things we want. There is a battle being waged within each one of us for control of getting what we want. Everyone in your house, around your table, will be waging the same internal battle.

When we do not get what we want, we fight. We put expectations on relationships, jobs, experiences that are too heavy for them to bear so they collapse, and we lose them. If we do not rein in our desires, we have the potential to destroy everything important in our lives.

We covet things. We pursue them, hotly. But we cannot get them, so we argue. Or we get what we wanted only to discover it is not what we want any more because it does not satisfy us the way it did. Regret.

Getting what we want causes problems. But then, not getting what we want causes problems. So, now what?

Maybe asking Santa Claus is the wrong approach. James wrote that we do not get what we want, because when we ask, we ask with badly. The English translation is 'wrong motives.' But the Greek language literally means we ask for the wrong things. We ask for things that only satisfy temporarily.

So, when we ask for the wrong things, God is very unlikely to give them to us. So, we blame God for our lack of comfort and the conflict around our table. But God wants so much more for us.

This Christmas, rather than asking Santa for what you want, ask God for what you truly value. And the most valuable things in our lives are the relationships we have with the people we love. They are lasting, satisfying, deeply gratifying, never going out of style, and never fail to provide the comfort and security we really want.
