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



PUBLIC APPEAL PERIOD BEGINS FOR MUNDS PARK PRELIMINARY FLOOD MAPS

On January 23, 2024, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is expected to publish a second notice announcing the start of the 90-day public appeal period for the Munds Park preliminary flood maps. The flood maps, known as Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs), show the extent to which areas recently remapped in the Munds Park area are at risk of flooding. These flood maps update 30-year-old studies and help determine flood insurance and building requirements.

Citizens can view the preliminary maps at www.coconino.az.gov/3141/Munds-Park. FEMA developed the preliminary flood maps in partnership with Coconino County. The process included an extensive, multi-year review of the changes brought about by environmental, land use, and other forces. It used the best available science, including state-of-the-art aerial mapping, flood risk modeling techniques, and a comprehensive pre-release technical review.

Coconino County presented a virtual open house (a recording is available at

www.coconino.az.gov/3143/Munds-Park-Flood-Risk-Open-Houses) on September 13, 2023 to allow the public to review and discuss the preliminary flood maps. The County hosted an in-person flood risk open house on September 18, 2023. The updated FIRMs are still preliminary and have not been officially adopted and are not yet effective. This 90-day public appeal period allows property owners to formally submit appeals - which require analysis or scientific evidence showing the information on the preliminary map is scientifically or technically incorrect - and comments. More details about the appeals process can be found at www. coconino.az.gov/3147/If-You-Disagree-with-the-Preliminary-Flo. Once all appeals and comments are received and addressed, the county expects maps will become effective by early 2025. The new flood insurance and building requirements will take effect at that time.

SETTING THE RECORD STRAIGHT: NO EXPANSION FOR JANIS TRAIL GATE

A neighbor from the forest edge gave us a ring. He's selling his cabin, and guess what's throwing a wrench in the works? There is a story on the Rider Planet USA website about the Janis Trail cattle gate on Janis Place being super-sized for larger UTVs.

Understandably, such changes could significantly impact home values and disrupt the tranquility of the area. To clarify the situation, we contacted the Coconino Forest Service. In our conversation with Patrick McGervey from the Flagstaff Recreation Department, he assured us that there were no intentions to enlarge the cattle gate. He further explained that the Janis Trail is too narrow in many sections. If they were to widen the gate for larger UTVs, it would require the forest service to broaden not just the cattle gate but also the trail.

That's great news for our neighbor selling his home, the buyer, and the neighborhood!

We notified Rider Planet USA about this update, and they have corrected the information on their site.

OPERATIONS BEGIN AT PINYON PLAIN URANIUM MINE AT THE GRAND CANYON DESPITE ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS

Mining operations have commenced at the Pinyon Plain uranium mine, located south of Grand Canyon National Park, as announced by Energy Fuels Inc., a Canadian company. The Pinyon Plain Mine, previously known as the Canyon Mine, is positioned above the Redwall-Muav aquifer, which supplies water to the Grand Canyon and is the sole drinking water source for the Havasupai Tribe.

The mine has faced opposition from local tribes, especially the Havasupai, and conservation groups due to concerns over potential groundwater contamination. Despite these fears, Curtis Moore, Vice President of Marketing and Development at Energy Fuels, insists the mine operates under the highest standards and is heavily regulated to protect health and the environment.

The extent of uranium ore extraction at the mine remains unclear. Activist groups, including the Sierra Club, the Center for Biological Diversity, and Haul No, are monitoring the site. Leona Morgan, a Navajo activist with Haul No, notes increased operations but cannot confirm whether ore stockpiling has begun.

The recent increase in uranium prices has influenced the mine's operations. Prices have reached a 16-year high, largely due to geopolitical factors.

The mine's operation continues despite President Joe Biden's declaration of the Baaj Nwaavjo I'tah Kukveni – Ancestral Footprints of the Grand Canyon National Monument, which prohibited new uranium mining on nearly a million acres around the Grand Canyon. The Pinyon Plain Mine, however, was exempt due to existing valid mineral rights under the General Mining Act of 1872. The mine's rights were contested in court by environmental and tribal groups, but the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in favor of Energy Fuels. Moore expects the transportation of uranium ore from the mine to the White Mesa Mill in Utah to start sometime this year.

SUPERVISOR MATT RYAN RETIRES BOARD OF SUPERVISORS APPOINTS ADAM HESS TO REPRESENT DISTRICT 3

Adam Hess, a retired U.S. Army veteran with 27 years of service, has been appointed by the Coconino County Board of Supervisors to represent District 3. This decision was made at the Board's first meeting of 2024, following Supervisor Matt Ryan's retirement announcement in October 2023. Hess, a long-time Coconino County resident, was selected after a thorough recruitment process.

Hess will serve the remainder of Ryan's term, which ends on December 31, 2024. With all Supervisor positions up for re-election this year, Hess plans to run for a full 4-year term.

IS HIGH COUNTRY LIVING FOR YOU? KNOW BEFORE YOU MOVE.

Genna and I have sold our cabin in Munds Park, and our destination, we hope, is Rimrock, our neighbor down the hill. It offers the best of both worlds: the mild heat I am looking for and the slight chill Genna prefers. Leaving the Park was a difficult decision, but we're not moving far – Rimrock is about the same distance as Flagstaff. We still own the hometown paper, and we will continue to maintain our connection to the community and the great friends we've made. We're simply moving down the hill.

When we first moved to the Park, we didn't consider all that comes with mountain living. As Flatlanders from the Valley, we were novices and litteraly knew nothing about mountain life and had to learn on the fly.

Although Rimrock doesn't experience the same snowfall as Munds Park and differs in other ways, it still embodies remote mountain living, which requires careful consideration before making a move.

Living in the mountains has its perks, as any local Mundsie will tell you. However, it's not just about animal sightings and scenic views. If you're planning to move to a higher altitude, be sure you're aware of all the pros and cons. I wish Genna had done more research before our move to the Park. We would still have moved here, but we would have been better prepared.

Here are some factors to consider before moving to mountain country:

Pro: It's a natural paradise.

From forested slopes to beautiful meadows, if you're living in the mountains, you're living in a place of idyllic beauty. Animals roam freely on mountains, thriving among the sparse population and minimal housing and business sectors. This harmonious blend of nature and wildlife adds to the charm and allure of mountain life. However, part of embracing this stunning environment involves understanding and respecting the wildlife. It's both fascinating and essential to learn how to keep wildlife wild, ensure the safety of yourself and your loved ones, and manage your surroundings responsibly. 
Pro: Unbeatable views

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HOMEMADE & WONDERFUL A PASTA LOVER'S PARADISE!

I'm a pasta girl at heart. It's my 2nd favorite food behind tacos. I think that somewhere in my ancestral past there must be an Italian! However, growing up my mom did not serve pasta. My dad didn't like it. The only pasta we ever ate was in goulash and that was only when my dad wasn't going to be home. I have never been able to wrap my mind around that fact. What is not to like about pasta?! Pasta is one of the most versatile pantry items. It can be light served in a salad or it can be totally decadent served in a rich creamy sauce. Pasta can be an easy quick dinner or a more complicated 5-star dish. It pairs well with most anything, vegetable or meat. It can be a side dish or the main part of the dish. There are a myriad of ways to serve and eat pasta.

I have always wanted to learn how to make my own pasta. Fresh pasta is amazing and the flavor so different from the box of pasta you buy in the store. I even bought a pasta roller last year but have yet to try it out. It's a bit intimidating to me for some reason. So, the pasta roller sits on my shelf. I will get it out soon to give it a try, but it might be a while longer. You see, my husband bought me the most amazing gift for Christmas. He bought me a membership to the Pasta of the month club!!! It's from a New York pasta company and every 3 months I will receive 6 boxes of pastas. Each box will be a different type of pasta. Maybe different shapes, different types of flours, or even flavored. How fun is that?! Now I can try all these amazing types of pastas without making them from scratch! Depending on where you research, there are between 300-600 different pasta types. Yep, you read that right. And I will now get to try 24 of them by the end of the year!

So, in honor of this Christmas gift, I decided to give you some of my favorite pasta recipes. Since it is winter here, these recipes will be heavier and richer types. When summer comes, maybe I'll do a follow up article and give you some lighter recipes. In either case, I hope you will try them and find that pasta is not just for spaghetti and meat sauce. And maybe you'll get a little adventurous with it too! Enjoy!

TURMERIC REGINETTI PASTA WITH MOROCCAN MEATBALLS & TOMATO SAUCE

This recipe came from the pasta-of-themonth cookbook. I made this today and it was fantastic. I substituted ground chicken for lamb.

Ingredients: Spice Mix

- 1 Tbl ground coriander
- 1 tsp ground black pepper corns

Ingredients: Meatballs:

- 1 sm yellow onion
- 1 bunch cilantro, chopped
- 1 bunch flat leaf parsley, chopped
- 1 lb ground lamb, turkey or chicken
- 2 tsp kosher salt
- 1 Tbl smoked paprika
- 1 ¹/₂ tsp toasted spice mix
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- For the sauce:
- 2 Tbl olive oil
- 1 yellow onion, thinly sliced



- 4 garlic cloves, microplane or finely minced
- 1 ¹/₂ tsp toasted spice mix
- 1 ¹/₂ tsp chili powder
- 1 tsp cumin
- 5 saffron threads (optional)
- 28 oz canned crushed tomatoes
- 2 tsp kosher salt
- 1 cup pitted green olives
- 12 oz turmeric Reginetti pasta (I used Sfoglini brand)

Directions

- 1. First mix the spice mix and set aside. Place a box grater on a plate and grate the small onion for the meatballs, reserving all liquid. In a large bowl, combine the grated onion and its liquid with the herbs, then add the rest of the ingredients for the meatballs. Gently mix thoroughly by hand. Roll into small meatballs, no bigger than a tablespoon and place on a plate.
- 2. In a large saute pan, heat the 2 tbl of olive oil over medium high heat. Add in the meatballs, being careful not to crowd the pan, to sear. Brown the meatballs on one side, then turn and brown on the other side, about 3 to 5 minutes on each side. As they finish browning, transfer to a plate and set aside.
- 3. Once the meatballs are all seared, turn the heat down to medium low and let the pan cool down slightly. To make the sauce, add in the sliced onions and stir well to coast in the fat (may need to add a bit more oil) and scrape up the browned bits form the meatballs. Once the onions are soft, about 2-5 minutes, stir in the garlic. Let it become fragrant, about a minute, then stir in the remaining spice mix, chili powder, cumin and saffron. Bloom the spices for just a minute, then add in the crushed tomatoes and stir well to combine. Season with salt, then add the meatballs back into the pan along with the green olives and stir to cover with the sauce. Bring to a simmer, then cover with a lid and lower the heat slightly. Cook for about 15 min until the meatballs are cooked through. Stir occasionally.
- 4. While the sauce is cooking, bring a pot of salted water to a boil. Cook the pasta to al dente, according to the package. Reserve 2 tbl of pasta water before draining and add both the past and the reserved water to the sauce. Stir well, so the pasta is coated in sauce. Then serve with a sparkling of chopped parsley.

COUNTRY-STYLE RIGATONI

This is one of my kids favorite pasta dishes that I made while they were growing up.

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup of olive oil
- 4 or 5 cloves of coarsely chopped garlic
- 1/2 of a thinly sliced white onion
- 1/2 to 3/4 lb. of Italian sausage with fennel, casings removed (I used Jimmy Dean sausage with sage)
- 8 large basil leaves, chopped (optional)
- One can of Cannellini Beans, drained and rinsed (I use navy beans)



- 2 cups of chicken stock
- 3tbl of butter
- 1 cup of grated romano cheese
- 3 slices of prosciutto rolled up and thinly sliced (optional)
- 12 ounces of dried rigatoni
- 10 broccoli spears, 3" long

Directions

- 1. Heat olive oil in a large saute pan, add the onions and garlic.
- 2. Add sausage, basil and parsley, cook till sausage is nice and brown. Raise heat, add stock and butter, bring to a boil, then simmer for about 5 minutes till sauce thickens a little. Stir in half of the grated cheese and cook for about 3 more minutes till sauce thickens. Add beans, sliced prosciutto, season with salt and pepper. Remove from heat.
- 3. Meanwhile, cook your pasta in salted boiling water for only 4 minutes. Add broccoli and cook another 3-4 more minutes. Pasta will be nicely al dente. It will cook more in the sauce so don't worry!
- 4. Drain pasta and broccoli, add to sauce, now add more cheese!
- 5. Salt and Pepper to taste.

PASTA CON BROCCOLI

This is a recipe I learned to make in Italy

Ingredients

- 1 large cup of broccoli per person
- 4 anchovy fillets or anchovy paste
- 2 cloves of garlic
- hot chili peppers or red pepper flakes
- 1 cup of parmesan cheese
- salt and extra virgin olive oil
- short pasta like penne, ziti, or fusilli

Directions

- 1. Paste with the blade of the knife the anchovies (in case you don't like anchovies, don't use them...) and melt them in 5 Tbl extra virgin olive oil in a frying pan (low heat). Add the pressed garlic and the chili.
- 2. In the boiling water for the pasta add salt and cook the broccoli florets for 3-4 min. Remove broccoli with a ladle and put into the frying pan





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with a ladle of water from the pasta. Cook pasta in the water and finish to cream the broccoli. Drain the pasta, put it in the frying pan, add parmesan and sautè.

3. "Finish to cream the broccoli" means that the broccoli needs to cook and "melt": we want a creamy sauce, so cook them down until soft, adding a little water from the pasta when needed (this pasta is not dry, but a little soupy)

BUTTERNUT SQUASH STUFFED SHELLS WITH SAGE BROWNED BUTTER

Ingredients

- 1 large butternut squash
- 1-2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 (12-ounce) package jumbo pasta shells, about 20-24 shells total
- 2 cups of part-skim ricotta cheese
- ¹/₃ cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 garlic cloves, finely minced
- ¹/₂ cup packed fresh spinach, chop after measuring
- 1 large egg
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ¹/₂ teaspoon pepper
- zest and juice of 1 lemon
- ¹/₂ cup butter
- 8-10 fresh sage leaves

Directions

1. Preheat the oven to 425 degrees F. Peel the butternut squash and chop the flesh into cubes. Toss the cubed squash in 1-2 tablespoons olive oil and roast in the oven for 15-20 minutes until the squash is fork tender. Scrape the warm squash into a bowl and mash with a fork until smooth. Let it cool to warm room temperature before using in the recipe (this step can be done 2-3 days in advance and the cooked, mashed squash can be stored, covered, in the refrigerator). Reduce the oven temperature to 400 degrees F.

THE BLACK CANYON HIGHWAY

Interstate 17 from Phoenix to Flagstaff is an efficient route - safe, fast, and scenic. You can now travel straight from the Sonoran desert of the Salt River Valley, speed through the chaparral vegetation between Bloody Basin and Horsethief Basin, fly past antelope grazing in the desert grassland above Cordes Junction, zip down into the Verde Valley, and whiz up to the clear blue sky and cool pines of Munds Park in a short two hours or less. It wasn't always so.

When the "Black Canyon Highway," as it was originally known was started in the early 1950s much of the area it traveled through was wild and remote. The roads that existed were mostly dirt and there was no direct route from Phoenix to Flagstaff. Why should there be?


As a child my family and I used to come from Phoenix up to the high country in an old 1937 Packard station wagon. It would take all day to get from Phoenix to our summer home at Mormon Lake. The route went through Black Canyon, Bumble Bee, Cordes, Mayer, Humboldt, Dewey, Prescott, Jerome, Clarkdale, Cottonwood, Sedona and Flagstaff. I can remember pestering my parents to stop so I could go swimming in Oak Creek or wherever there was water. On hot summer afternoons my dad would stop to let the radiator cool while the dog and I would splash in the lily pond at Rock Springs, wade in the Verde below Bridgeport or play in Oak Creek above Sedona.

As you speed up I-17 past New River, Table Mesa, over Deadman Wash and past Skunk Creek, you also pass Cordes, Orme, Dugus, Cherry, and McGuireville. These places were named for colorful, independent people like John Cordes, Fred Dugas, Mort Orme, Norval Cherry, and Eugene McGuire. They were the heads of pioneer families who eked out a living in the cattle business or operated small remote way stations and centers of commerce. When the road began these were just lone ranches and wide spots in the road. The country was all open range.

Black Canyon, Bumble Bee, and Cordes had been rest stops on the old Black Canyon Stage line where horses were changed on the dusty bone jarring trip from Prescott to Phoenix. Later these were quaint places for radiator water and Barg's root beer. Camp Verde, Cottonwood, Sedona, and Rimrock were very small agricultural communities. The valley was served by Highway

89-A up over Mingus Mountain through the once booming mining town of Jerome and up the switch backs above Oak Creek into Flagstaff. The valley was also served by Fossil Creek Road, once a trail used to carry the mail on horseback from the Verde to Payson.

So the next time your cruising out of the rat race of the valley and heading up the hill for Munds Park consider yourself lucky that the highway even comes this way. In the days before the right-of-way was finally decided, there was a major political effort by the Clarkdale and Williams Chambers of Commerce to run the highway through Cherry, Clarkdale, Perkinsville and Williams - logically the straightest route from Phoenix to the Grand Canyon. In that case Williams would have been the biggest town in Northern Arizona and had the Walmart. Flagstaff would have remained a small quaint logging town, and who knows, they might still be raising potatoes and beans down by the ninth hole here in Munds Park.



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



- 2. Cook the jumbo pasta shells according to package directions and drain. In a medium bowl, combine the squash, ricotta cheese, Parmesan, garlic, spinach, egg, salt and pepper and fresh lemon zest. Stir well. Stuff the cooked pasta shells with the squash/ricotta mixture and place them in a lightly greased 9X13-inch baking dish (depending on how full you fill the shells, you may not use all of them). Bake the shells for 18-20 minutes, until they are hot all the way through.
- 3. While the shells are baking, prepare the brown butter sauce by melting the butter in a saucepan or skillet over medium-low heat until the butter is golden brown, about 10-12 minutes. Watch carefully as the butter can go from browned to burned in a short time. Add the sage leaves and cook until the leaves are slightly crisp (the butter should be hot and bubbly when adding the leaves so that the sage cooks quickly). Remove the pan from the heat and squeeze in the juice of 1 lemon.
- 4. Drizzle the sauce over the cooked shells and top with additional grated Parmesan, if desired. Serve the shells with 1-2 crisp sage leaves on top.

DIG UP THE FUN: GARDENING WITH YOUR KIDS

Nowadays, it seems like an uphill battle to pry our children away from the screens in their lives; televisions, computers, tablets, and phones increasingly dominate their free time. Creating opportunities for family time - preferably outdoors in the fresh air and sunshine - often feels like a challenge.

But the simple act of planning out your garden, planting it, and maintaining

it offers a wealth of benefits for both children and adults. Teaching your children to garden is a gift that impacts their physical, mental, and emotional well-being. (And as a bonus, you can sneak in some math and science classes while they are having fun in the dirt.)

Gardening with your children fosters a love of nature. From planting seeds and seeing them sprout, to watching the birds, bees, butterflies and other pollinators visit, your garden becomes a living laboratory for your children to explore.

You'll be able to teach them about the environment, the responsible use of water, the life cycle of plants, and why some flowers are annuals that only last a season, while others bloom year after year. There are math concepts to learn as well - counting seeds, measuring the distance between plants so they aren't overcrowded, and calculating when you should plant based on how long a seed needs to germinate are all great STEM-related topics.

If you are looking for a good guide on gardening activities to do with your children, we highly recommend kidsgardening.org. It has dozens of resources that you can download for free for a wide range of ages.

When you garden with your kids, you instill in them a respect for the delicate balance of ecosystems that makes life on our planet sustainable, such as why pollinators are so important for growing much of the food we eat. Having that firsthand experience in the garden will help establish a sense of responsibility to the earth and encourage the next generation to be

good stewards of the environment. Or to put it another way, when you give them green thumbs you are also encouraging green values.

A garden also teaches valuable lessons in patience and responsibility. Children learn that nurturing life takes time and effort, not to mention that their actions (or lack thereof) will have consequences. Forget to water the

> tomato plants and they will shrivel up. Neglect to weed and your flowers might be overrun. But be a responsible gardener and you'll get to enjoy all the goodies, from beautiful flowers to fabulous food.

Gardening is also good for your entire family's health. Digging, weeding, watering, and planting all involve exercise and coordination. Plus the foods you grow by your own hand will be a nutritious and delicious alternative to typical snacks. Your child's mental health will also benefit; growing a veggie patch or flowers will give them a sense of accomplishment and time spent outside playing in the dirt is always a healthy way to relieve stress.

Gardening is a shared experience that gives families time to bond and create something beautiful together - and gives you cherished memories for years to come.

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


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
BOOK REVIEW BLACK SHEEP

This page-turning thriller explores the possible and unintended dangers of the efforts to resurrect long-extinct animals.

Situated on a 100-acre valley high up in the Colorado Rockies, Erebus Resort created a new technology to de-extinct wooly mammoths, Irish elk, giant sloths, and other extinct creatures.



The resort grabbed the attention of a billionaire's son and his

new wife who decided to spend their honeymoon at the resort. While out camping with their guide, the couple disappears, leaving behind a pool of blood. Colorado Bureau of Investigation Agent Frances Cash partners with the county sheriff James Colcord to help investigate the couple's disappearance.

More violent events occur. What is going on at Erebus Resort? Who killed the young couple?

As the killings escalate and the valley is evacuated, Cash and Colcord must confront an ancient, intelligent, and murderous presence at Erebus.

I like most of the books that Douglas Preston writes and this is no exception. He has been creating wild stories for decades, by taking a possible reality and developing a story around it.

The plot is well-written, intense, and keeps your interest. The only problem is finding a place to put it down. The characters are mostly likeable. The pace is intense and escalates through the final pages.

While the idea of bringing back extinct species is not a new idea, it isn't totally science fiction any longer. The Afterward of the book states, as man pushes further and further into the arena of resurrection biology, who can say what our future might bring? Preston says this book was influenced by the real-life effort to resurrect the wooly mammoth, and he incorporated enough real science to give credibility and depth to his story.

But unlike Jurassic Park, the huge de-extincted creatures were not the dangerous predators. That twist was enough to keep the ending interesting for me.

This was an action packed rid of a book, and I'd recommend it to Preston fans or those who like realistic sci-fi thrillers.

JUST SAY THE WORD

Do you remember the "Can You Hear Me Now?" guy from the Verizon commercials? He would take a step and utter the now famous question and the assumed answer was "yes". He would take another step, ask the question, smile, then move again. Don't you wish he would have walked around Munds Park to discover how frustrated we have been with our cell coverage.

The commercials were a hit. They ran for over a year. There have even been knock-offs that were used long after. On top of that, the actor, Paul Marcarelli switched companies and recorded similar commercials for Sprint. That is, back when Sprint still had cell service before T-Mobile bought them.

The TV and print ads would assure us that the service worked everywhere. Except, there is always the miniature asterisk disclaimer paragraph at the bottom of the screen that lasts only seconds that no one could read that tells us some areas do not get the same coverage. Thank you very much. We could have told them that!

Does it drive you crazy when someone claims something, or promises something, and then they do not deliver? It saps whatever faith we may have in all of humanity; or at least the businesses that we pay to provide services for us.

Right up front in the Gospel that John wrote, he made a claim about Jesus.

"Through him (Jesus) all things were made, without Him, nothing was made that has been made." (John 1:3)

In Genesis 1, when God created everything, it says God spoke and it happened. What John is saying is that it was Jesus who did the speaking on His Father's behalf.

That is a pretty wild claim. The guy they saw and walked around with was the guy who spoke and created everything long before. He brought everything to life. If we are going to place our faith in Him to save us, how can we be sure that the claim is correct?

The first miracle John recorded in the first part of ch.2 is when Jesus turned the water into wine. It is a pretty famous story. Even people who do not know much about the bible probably know about this miracle.

The story goes that Jesus and a group of friends and family were attending a wedding and a potentially embarrassing situation arose. They ran out of wine. Mary asked Jesus to do something about it. "Nearby stood six stone water jars, ... each holding from twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, 'Fill the jars with water.' ... 'Now draw some out and take it to the master of the banquet." (John 2:6-8)

This was a private miracle. No one knew what had happened except the servants. When the master of the banquet tasted the wine, he was astonished that it appeared the host family saved the good stuff till then. Usually, the opposite was done. The good stuff was served first and after the guests' taste buds dulled from the alcohol, they brought out the cheap stuff, or watered down the good stuff.


It is easy to skip over some of the significance of what Jesus was communicating in what He did here. He created wine that had already aged. Can Jesus create something with the appearance of age that might confuse our carbon dating system? Certainly. The earth may be younger than science seems to indicate.

Only the servants knew what happened. Why not the religious leadership, the host family, or even the civic leaders? Christianity is a movement among slaves, servants. We are bond-slaves of God. He specializes in giving lower-class people upper-class positions and opportunities. Among other reasons, we cannot claim that we did any of this on our own. We do not have the resources. We need Jesus.

And, finally, Jesus created the juice of a living vine from inanimate water. So, can Jesus create life with a word? Well, He did it at the wedding without a word. There is no mention of what He said other than to fill the water pots and give their contents to the master of the banquet.

Jesus proved the claim that He can bring something to life, he can create it new with the appearance of age, and servants were given special insight and position in His work.
